

Explaining the decision of Superior Judge Everett Smith of last Saturday, escheating to the state 240 acres of valuable farmland near Duvall, Prosecutor Douglas said the decision means that leases of land to aliens still in fefect are invalid, although made before the law took effect.

He said it had been called to his attention that many allens intent on evading the law are now posing as addy laborers on farms which they actually control and that they are keeping time books which would be used to deceive juries if an attempt is made to escheat the land.



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

The Puget Sound Power & Light Company has increased the voltage of its transmission line from 22,500 to 45,000. In order to carry this higher voltage, new substations have been built at Tenino, Budoca, Naparine, Winlock, Vader and Kelso, the improvements representing a considerable expenditure. A line has been built connecting the system in the Centralia territory to that on Puget Sound. A bank of transformers, 1,500 K. W. in capacity, has been installed at Tenino, together with lighting arrestors.
