**MILK INTERESTS MEET**

**CITY HEALTH CHIEF PRESIDES AT GATHERING HERE.**

Attempt Made to Settle Controversies, but Slight Progress Is Accomplished.

With Dr. George N. McLoughlin, city health commissioner, presiding, representatives of the Seattle Milk Shippers' Association, Snohomish County Dairymen's Association and others interested, met in the L. C. Smith Building Restaurant last night in an effort to end the controversy over the Seattle milk supply.

"Not very much was accomplished, but I believe the conflicting interests made a start toward a better understanding," said Dr. McLoughlin. "I don't know who called the meeting but I was asked to preside and I did so merely because of my interest in seeing that Seattle has a supply of good milk. One difficulty in the way of a settlement last night was the fact that the representatives of the interests involved were not authorized to take any definite action."

Members of the emergency committee, appointed by a group of the Seattle Milk Shippers' Association opposed to the policy of the present board, were refused admission to last night's meeting because, Dr. McLoughlin said, it was believed their presence could not be conducive to harmony. The question of admitting them was put to a vote and resulted in a tie. The matter was then put up to the chairman and Dr. McLoughlin decided against admitting the emergency committee.

The controversy, which the different interests are now trying to settle, is the result of the action of the directors of the Seattle Milk Shippers' Association in certifying a supply of milk about six weeks ago. The price was cut in an effort to prevent Snohomish farmers shipping milk to the Seattle market.



**G. O. P. Aids Sound Business Hughes Strikes at Opposition**

Secretary of State Tears to Pieces Platforms of Democrats and Third Party in Buffalo Speech.

By Associated Press. BUFFALO, N. Y., Thursday, Oct. 30.—Secretary of State Charles E. Hughes, in a political address here last night, alluded to the national Democratic program as "sterile" and declared the La Follette Party to be "running away from the platform they so deliberately prepared."

Mr. Hughes named the Washington conference and the Dawes plan as the "greatest contributions in the interest of peace in the recent difficult years."

He digressed at the beginning of his address to endorse the candidacy of Col. Theodore Roosevelt for governor of New York State.

"It will be a good omen," he said, "to have the victory of Roosevelt crown the victory of Coolidge."

Turning to the national campaign, Mr. Hughes said the American people were alive to the paramount issue, naming that as "whether we shall have sound business conditions or uncertainty and confusion; whether we shall have prosperity and progress or unrest, stagnant trade and unemployment."

"When the Republican administration came to power in March, 1921, it inherited the most serious difficulties at home and abroad," Secretary Hughes asserted. "There was business depression and unemployment. The responsibility lay, so far as governmental action was concerned, with the Democratic administration and its unwise treasury policy. The Democratic administration resorted to deliberate inflation of the armistice, which encouraged appalling profiteering and speculation."

"This was in 1919 and continued into the early part of 1920. Realizing the disastrous result of this unwise policy, they proceeded to a sudden and drastic deflation, which brought about a crash."

Mr. Hughes cited increased production in mining and manufacturing, decrease in retail food prices, increase in wholesale prices paid to farmers and reduction in governmental expenditures by more than \$2,000,000,000, as accomplishments of the Republican administration.

These accomplishments, he said, were achieved "by upright, courageous and determined executives in the face of greatest difficulties."

"President Harding," he added, "organized the bureau of the budget and called to this supreme effort an honest, experienced and most zealous servant of the public welfare, Gen. Charles G. Dawes."

"Credit for tax reduction," he added, "belongs to the Republican administration because it saved the money and made tax reduction possible."

"It proposes to save still more," he continued. "President Coolidge's plan will be carried out and the new depression and unemployment, the oppressive tax burden is to give President Coolidge the opportunity to carry out his program."

**TRY TO SHOW SUBSIDY MAJEWSKI SEEKS DUTY**

G. O. P. COUNSEL QUIZZES BROTHERHOOD CHIEF.

Organized Support of La Follette Ticket Charged to Railroad Orders.

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Thursday, Oct. 30.—Through L. E. Sheppard, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, counsel for the Republican national committee sought to show today before the Chicago section of the senate campaign committee, that "the La Follette campaign is subsidized by the railroad brotherhoods."

Sheppard objected to being questioned regarding letters he had written to members of his order, including one to Fred Stewart of Oakland, Cal., saying that he wanted protection from the committee going into matters that might cause controversy with his organization.

Weymouth Kirkland insisted on having the correspondence, saying he thought the committee should be interested in getting at the facts and that he thought it would be interesting. He added that he wanted to show that the railway labor organizations were interested in future legislation as to government ownership of the railroads and "laws affecting the use of the injunction in labor disputes."

Sheppard said the total membership of these organizations was 500,000 the campaign they are conducting in that they paid the expense of dependent of the La Follette national organization.

Sheppard said he was not personally in accord with all of the provisions of the La Follette platform; that he had not got as many ideas of his own into it as possible and had accepted the remainder on the theory of "majority rule."

Kirkland inquired into the methods of the support of "Labor," a Washington publication. Sheppard said the members paid \$1 a year for the paper by their own vote.

"Have you coerced any members of the organization to support any candidate or to contribute to campaign funds?" asked Chairman Borah.

"On the contrary, we have told them they could support whom they wished," Sheppard said. "The organization has endorsed Senator La Follette."

—to extend credit to nearly everyone and to advertise this was pretty radical talk in those days. The logic was unanswerable—but such things simply weren't being done—and it was with many misgivings that the elder Schoenfeld consented to the adoption of the new policy and the slogan, "Your Credit Is Good."

—needless to say, the change quickly proved itself a complete success—and, in fact, the furniture dealers all over the country have been compelled to follow suit until today statistics will show that 90 persons out of every 100 buy all their furniture on credit.

—at the same time that the slogan was adopted, the Schoenfelds entered upon an elaborate and vigorous advertising campaign, built around their slogan and this has been continued ever since with the result that even the stranger is instantly aware that "his credit is good."

—to illustrate, as far back as 1911, a distinguished visitor remarked in addressing a Rotary Club banquet:

"I was assured of the hospitality of the people in Seattle when I alighted from the train, and, going from the depot, saw a great circular sign assuring me that my credit was good in the city of Seattle. I can readily imagine that this appeal has met with the approval of many strangers who locate permanently here."

—all of which goes to show that good business isn't purely selfish—and the growth of the Standard Furniture Company has always aided the growth and development of the rest of the city.

—to get back to the chronicle, however—the business grew so rapidly that a Tacoma branch was found necessary and one was opened at Eleventh and A Streets in the city December 11, 1902. **U. S. Rests Case In Doherty Lease Suit**

LOS ANGELES, Thursday, Oct. 30.—The government today rested its case against the Pan-American Petroleum & Transportation Company for cancellation of the leases and contracts on the Elk Hills naval oil reserve in California.

The unexpected completion of the prosecution's testimony in the suit charging E. L. Doherty with paying \$100,000 to Albert B. Fall, then secretary of the interior, to get leases and contracts worth \$100,000,000, found several witnesses subpoenaed by the government but not heard.

Frank J. Hogan, attorney for the defense, started immediately to present the defense of the case.

**Japanese Mission On Land Survey in Mexico**

MEXICO CITY, Thursday, Oct. 30.—A Japanese mission, headed by M. Uchiyama, has arrived here to make a study of the country's agricultural possibilities. The mission afterward will visit South America.

Six prominent members of the Japanese colony in California also have arrived, seeking lands in the northern states for the transplantation of vines grown in California. Both groups are the guests of the Japanese legation.
