naming that as "whether we shall have sound business conditions or uncertainty and confusion: whether we shall have prosperity and prograss or unrest. stagnant trade and unemployment."

"When the Republican administration came into power in March, 1921, it inherited the most serious difficulties at home and abroad." Secretary Hughes asserted. "There was business depression and unemployment. The responsibility lay, so far as governmental action was concerned, with the Democratic administration and its




