### San Francisco Flour Millers Cut Price

### IMPRISONED TOO SOON

C. FAIRCHILD MAY BE RETURNED FROM PENITENTIARY. Attorney for Policeman's Slayer Declares Appeal Is Pending to Supreme Court.

Although Charles Fairchild, convicted of the manslaughter of Patrolman R. L. Litsey, was taken to Walla Walla state prison ten days ago to serve a long sentence, it developed today that this transfer may have been illegal and he may be returned to the King County jail.

Attorney John F. Dora said he would take court action within a few days to require the return of Fairchild, basing it on the fact that an appeal to the state Supreme Court in the case was filed before Fairchild was taken to the penitentiary and that Fairchild cannot be confined in the prison while the appeal is pending.

Deputy Prosecutor Allen Peyer said that "there probably was some mistake in taking Fairchild to prison, although I didn't know he had been taken there."

The appeal is directed at the sentence imposed by Judge Hall and not at the jury's verdict of manslaughter.

### WANTS BAKER TRIAL SET

CROWN PROSECUTOR KEEPS PRISONERS APART. Men Accused of Bery G. Hijacking and Murder Will Be in Court Again Tomorrow.

Special to The Times. VICTORIA, B. C., Tuesday, March 17.—Owen B. Baker and Harry F. Sowash, charged with the murder of Capt. William Gillis and his son during the hijacking of the gasboat Beryl G last September, will be taken before Magistrate George Jay here tomorrow for another hearing. The two men appeared before Magistrate Jay last Tuesday, but were remanded to Oakalla prison for an eight-day period.

It is expected that Crown Prosecutor A. M. Johnson will ask that the date for preliminary hearing on the charges against the two men be set at tomorrow's hearing. The two men will be given no opportunity to confer with each other at tomorrow's hearing. Baker will be taken before the magistrate at 11:30 o'clock and Sowash, who is charged under the name H. Fred Myers, will not appear until a half hour later. Prosecutor Johnson said that he had outlined his case against each man, and that he was taking no chance of having them communicate with each other, even by sign, until after they have been committed for trial.

Charles Morris, accused of being a third member of the band of liquor pirates, is held in custody in Seattle and is fighting extradition to Canada. Paul Strampinski, a fourth suspect, whose confession to provincial police resulted in the arrest of the other men, is in Oakalla prison.

### JAPANESE CHILD WINS

AMERICAN-BORN SON OF ORIENTAL HOLDS LAND. Supreme Court Upholds Right but Denies Incorporated Holding Company's Claim.

Real property rights in Washington acquired by American-born Japanese children through the establishment of trust funds by their parents, transferred to the property was made by the father, Choski Kosal, on June 7, 1921, three days before the alien land law went into effect, to Pierce Lowergan, Seattle attorney, for himself and himself as trustee for the benefit of the child. The father continued to work the land as an employee of the trust.

The first case involved the ownership of a plot of property transferred to trustees for Frank Kosal, an American-born Japanese minor and, therefore, a citizen of the state. Transfer of the property was made by the father, Choski Kosal, on June 7, 1921, three days before the alien land law went into effect, to Pierce Lowergan, Seattle attorney, for himself and himself as trustee for the benefit of the child. The father continued to work the land as an employee of the trust.

This arrangement, it was contended by Prosecutor Colvin, constituted a fraud in that it was done to evade the law. The court here, however, held that the child, being a citizen of the state, was entitled to the protection of the law and that to deny its ownership would be to confiscate the property of a citizen. Must Deal Justly.

"The state, although mighty, cannot insist upon the allegiance of all its citizens unless it deals justly with all its citizens and it cannot deal justly if it confiscates the property of its own citizens without just reason," the court declared.

Prosecutor Colvin pointed out that under the decision any Japanese parent may establish a trust fund for the purchase of property for his children and that in this way the bars are let down to extensive acquisition of property which in effect will be held by aliens, through their children.

Mr. Lowergan, who represented the trustees acting for the minor, set forth that this was a case of a fundamental trust law and constitutional law; that it was within the right of the parent to set aside funds for the purchase of property for his children who are citizens and therefore entitled to hold property and that there was no evasion of the law in so doing.

"There is no danger that this decision will let open the flood gates to Japanese ownership of property in the state," Mr. Lowergan said today. "It does establish the rights of American-born Japanese children in this state. The state is not interested in acquiring property here to the extent that they will come in in great droves and acquire property for their children under this decision."

The second case involved the question of whether a corporation, the capital stock of which is principally owned by aliens, could hold lands in trust for aliens. The court held that this was an evasion of the law and affirmed judgment handed down by Superior Judge Calvin S. Hall in this county for the escheat of valuable gas lands in the White River Valley held in the name of the White River Gardens, Inc. It was established that S. Katano and his wife had acquired 1,987 shares of 1,000 shares of stock in the company and then had assigned them to their son, a minor, for love and affection. This transfer was held to be subterfuge.

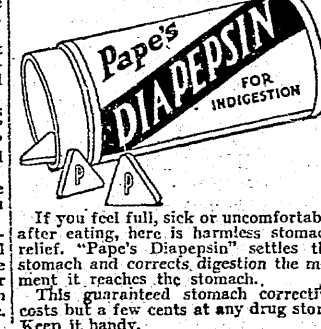

### ARGUE NEW SCHOOL LAW

OREGON CASE STILL BEFORE SUPREME COURT.

Council for State Again Emphasizes Contention That Police Powers Cover Education.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Tuesday, March 17.—Oral argument was resumed today in the Supreme Court in the appeals brought by Oregon to have sustained its law which would require children between the age of 5 and 18 to attend schools conducted by the state.

Counsel for the state again emphasized the contention advanced yesterday that the police powers of the state were equally as potent in matters of education as those of morals and health, and insisted that the state and parochial schools could be conducted under the new law in teaching children before or after they had completed the graded public schools.

High efficiency of the public schools of the state was asserted and the court was urged that it should respect the decision of the people at the polls in adopting the new law.

### Marine Corps League Meets Tomorrow Night

"Once a Marine, always a Marine," says the Marine Corps men. To prove it the newly formed Marine Corps League, which today announced its second meeting for 8 o'clock tomorrow evening in 204 Maynard Building, expects to better the record of 300 members established by the Boston detachment of the national organization. The Seattle league's charter will not be closed until after tomorrow night's meeting, when officers will be elected. Membership in the league is open to all former Marines and present members of the service. The purpose of the organization is to keep together the old and new sea soldiers.

### Clerks and Department Heads in Brick Shower

Clerks and department heads, floor men and stock boys of Fraser-Patterson Company participated in a "brick shower" held last Saturday in the store. To clear away 250 bricks accumulated after contractors had torn out a portion of the sub-basement to make room for additional elevator equipment, each employee of the store visited the sub-basement where they were presented two bricks by Harry Leach, chief engineer of the store. The bricks were relayed by Andy Duwall, superintendent of the delivery room, where they were disposed of by the company's delivery equipment.

### Narcotics Seller Fined; User Goes to Jail

First instance in the Federal Court in Seattle where the purchaser of narcotics received a jail sentence while the seller escaped with a fine was announced yesterday by federal officials when Alice Williams, an addict, was sentenced to serve ninety days in King County jail by Judge E. E. Cushman. William A. Woodcock, a druggist, indicted by the federal grand jury for selling narcotics to the Williams woman, paid a fine in compromise, federal officials announced.
