### STATE LOSES SUITS TO ESCHEAT LANDS

Supreme Court Rules No Japanese Ownership Was Shown in King County Cases.

OLYMPIA, Wednesday, Nov. 4.—Two actions brought by the prosecuting attorney of King County under the alien land law for the escheat to the State of Washington of lands which it was contended were being held for Japanese, have been decided by the Supreme Court against the state in decisions handed down yesterday afternoon.

In one of these, directed against J. T. Kusumi, S. Hayashi, S. Enterprise Investment Company and the Japanese Commercial Bank of Seattle, the lower court had held against the defendants and gave judgment for escheat, which judgment is now reversed.

In the second case, in which Ryoten Kurita and the Enterprise Investment Company are respondents, the lower court held for defendants, and this judgment is accordingly affirmed.

**Japanese as Tenants.** The Supreme Court recites that the facts in both cases are strikingly similar. In the Kusumi case three Japanese had taken over a lease on a tract of land in 1917 containing an option of purchase and at termination of the lease sought an extension, but were granted only a month-to-month tenancy. They went to Walter A. Keene, a lawyer in good standing who, after inspection, decided to buy the place and lease it to the Japanese, and Kusumi loaned him \$3,500 which he applied in the purchase of the tract, taking title in the name of the Western American Realty Company, and giving the note of that company for the amount borrowed.

Several other transactions followed, vesting record title in the Enterprise Investment Company, Kusumi and associates remaining as tenants and paying rent.

**Consistent With Honest Purpose.** The high court states the lower court refused to accept the explanation given by Kusumi and Hayashi as their reason for going \$3,000 to Mr. Keene with which to purchase the property, and considered the deal a subterfuge; but the Supreme Court says that if the testimony is to be disregarded, then the case stands upon the record of facts, and holds the facts and circumstances are lawful in themselves and in the way they were then doing. The case is reversed and remanded for dismissal.

Both decisions were written by Judge Main and signed by Judges Parker and Holcomb, with Judge Tolman dissenting.

### NEW OLYMPIC ROAD TAPS RICH DISTRICT

PORT TOWNSEND, Wednesday, Nov. 4.—Work on the extension of the Olympic Highway south from the Jefferson County line will be continued through the winter months, by contractors Holmberg & Norman, it being hoped by the firm that the original contract for the construction of 10.8 miles will be entirely finished by late spring.

The district in which the Olympic Highway is being built is one of the last frontiers of the United States. Its isolation has prevented settlers from making their homes there in the past years, but the coming of the highway is bringing a vast number of inquiries from land seekers who ask for maps and blue prints of the district.

In the district in which the Olympic Harbor Railroad and Light & Power Company expects to develop an enormous hydroelectric plant, the early drilling for foundation tests have been satisfactory. The carrying out of this project will create a new lake when the dam is completed, a body of water twenty miles long, of crescent shape formed by the backwaters of the Hoh and Quilts Rivers.

Enormous areas of pulp wood are tributary to the proposed development and the lumber lands there are said to total 200,000 acres in Jefferson County, having a value at conservative estimate in excess of \$16,000,000.

### Seattle Firm Gets Dredging Contract At Port Angeles

PORT ANGELES, Wednesday, Nov. 4.—The Pacific Dredging & Construction Company of Seattle was awarded the contract by the Port Commission of the Port of Port Angeles for moving and grading 500,000 yards of sand from Port Angeles harbor as part of the building of a port terminal here.

The company bid on a rental basis of \$825 a day, furnishing the crews. The dredge Portland No. 2 will be used in the work; which is to take approximately 100 days with a guaranteed yardage of 5,000 yards a day, the total cost to be approximately \$86,000.

The sand is to be used for making a fill behind a bulkhead at the dock site. Other companies bidding on the job were the Puget Sound Dredging & Construction Company of Seattle, Longview Dredging & Construction Company and the Port of Astoria. Work is to start within ten days.

### Report on Wynoochee Water Supply Ready

ABERDEEN, Wednesday, Nov. 4.—Surveys sent to the Wynoochee basin north of here last April to make reports of the water and power development possibilities of the Wynoochee, have returned, and an early decision on further development is expected from the city council. Water Superintendent Sam Watkins, a proponent of both water and hydroelectric development, will make a report to the council at its meeting tonight. The power issue has been quiet since Mayor O'Neil took office, and announcement of his attitude is awaited with interest.

### SUZZALLO ADDRESSES ALUMNI AT YAKIMA

YAKIMA, Wednesday, Nov. 4.—Dr. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington, addressing the Yakima Valley Alumni Association in the Commercial Hotel last night, said he hoped the alumni would go forth as ambassadors for the public schools and especially for their alma mater, the University of Washington, teaching its high ideals, intellectual, moral and spiritual, to the people in their communities.

"Every University man is expected to give something greater to the commonwealth than other men," he said. Comparing the material products of science and manufacture, he declared: "The greatest producer is he who takes a raw ignorant boy and makes of him a polished intellectual man."

Dr. Suzzallo made an eloquent appeal for the alumni to show in their several communities the inspirational benefit of university training. He recounted the needs of the university and declared "there are men mean enough to complain because I have gone to the government of Ottawa and the government at Washington, using my vacation to beg money to carry on the work and save the expense to the state."

He had a scholarship for forestry. All we have to do is to supply the building, while the state whose great forests are here, failed to supply it."

Elon Gilbert, president of the local alumni, presided and talks were made by Charles Gaches, president of the State Alumni Association and Edward Allen, Seattle, member of the executive board of the state alumni. Today Dr. Suzzallo was to address the Flexible Club here.
