PURCHASE OF PARK TO BE CELEBRATED

Clubwomen Will Meet at Winthrop Hotel in Tacoma for Luncheon Tuesday.

At a no-host luncheon Tuesday at 1 o'clock at the Winthrop Hotel, Tacoma, prominent clubwomen of the state will celebrate the acquisition by the State Federation of Women's Clubs of a sixty-two acre tract of virgin timber to be set aside as a permanent state park.

Purchase of the tract has been made possible solely through the efforts of the clubwomen who recently completed a several months' "Save a Tree" campaign to raise a \$30,000 fund with which to acquire the land. The tract is located on the Sunset Highway near the summit of Snoqualmie Pass.

According to the plans announced yesterday by Mrs. Thomas Greenlee, state chairman of the conservation committee in charge of the campaign, the deed to the property will be transferred to the state federation with appropriate ceremonies. The land is owned by the Snoqualmie Lumber Company. George S. Long, president of the company, will present the deed.

The committee in charge of the luncheon arrangements includes Mrs. Charles W. Orton of Sumner, Mrs. Victor Nash of Tacoma and Mrs. E. K. Pirret of Tacoma.

All persons interested in the "Save a Tree" campaign are invited to attend the luncheon.

India's Expert at Snoqualmie. SNOQUALMIE, Saturday, Dec. 31.—Dr. S. N. Kapur, Forest Research Institute, Dehra Dun, India, visited the office of the Snoqualmie National Forest recently. He has been sent to the United States by his government to make a study of sawmill equipment. He has been giving much of his time to the study of dry kilning in the region of Seattle.

KING COUNTY RICHES GAIN \$19,215,000

Total Wealth Is Fixed at \$691,959,552 by County Assessor Melvin Wooster.

King County gained \$19,215,000 in property holdings during 1927 over the preceding year, giving the county a total wealth of \$691,959,552, according to figures released today by Melvin S. Wooster, county assessor.

An indication of the county's growth in population also is shown in the fact that 10,000 more personal tax sheets were required during the year just closed, making a total of 71,000 required.

Fifty-Five Additions. Fifty-five additions, acreage platted into lots, increased the number of land segregations from 610,000 to 620,000.

In the city limits of Seattle alone, 9,314 buildings of all types were erected, while in the county outside the city limits, 2,412 were erected during 1927. There also was an increase of 5,000 deeds over the 30,000 last year that passed through the segregation department of the assessor's office.

Serves 30,000 Persons. The county assessor also revealed that his office had served 30,000 persons seeking information about property holdings in addition to 8,000 queries answered by mail.

In commenting on the closing of the year book, Mr. Wooster said that his department had been given a very creditable rating by the state tax commission in showing that 48 per cent of the possible 50 per cent of King County property had been taxed.

Last Rites for J. F. Pierce. MOUNT VERNON, Saturday, Dec. 31.—Last rites for James F. Pierce, who died here Tuesday, will be held tomorrow from the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. J. E. Neff, singer, pastor of the church, officiating. Masons will conduct rites.

WHILE Seattle is celebrating New Year's, today will have particular significance for the city's residents whose native land is Japan, for New Year's is the day of all days to the Japanese, who celebrate it more generally than any other day of the year.

Last year on the Japanese islands there was no celebration on account of the nation being in mourning for their former emperor. This year, however, the royal palace will be thrown wide open and royalty will entertain.

Ancient Custom Renewed. In Seattle, the Japanese residents, separated from their native land by the broad Pacific, will follow the ancient custom of their ancestors. New Year's to them is the annual visiting day and the Oriental Easter.

Old clothes are discarded and replacement new raiment is donned, while the day is spent in a round of visits to the homes of friends. In Japan the women wear the finest silk-embroidered kimonos, while the men wear a more somber black, but all are brand new. Here the kimonos will appear, but only in the homes.

At every home a feast is spread and as the callers arrive they sample the delicacies. "Back to nature" is one of the keynotes of the Japanese New Year observance. Fancy or highly seasoned modern dishes are frowned upon and the bill of fare dates back thousands of years.

Orthodox Japanese Menu. Here is the orthodox menu that may be found on the tables of many Japanese homes in Seattle today:

- Tara Sulmono (Salted codfish soup).
- Tamago Sake (Dried salmon eggs).
- Ebi (Lobster).
- Mochi (Dried rice cakes).
- Mame (Boiled peas).
- Kaki-Mikan (Persimmons and oranges).

Old scores are wiped out, old clothes cast off, and the Japanese begin a real new year with their "shimen de omedeto" (a new year of happiness), the universal greeting.

A pan-Pacific conference on advertising and marketing will be held in connection with the annual convention of the Pacific Advertising Club Association at Honolulu next June, Richard P.
