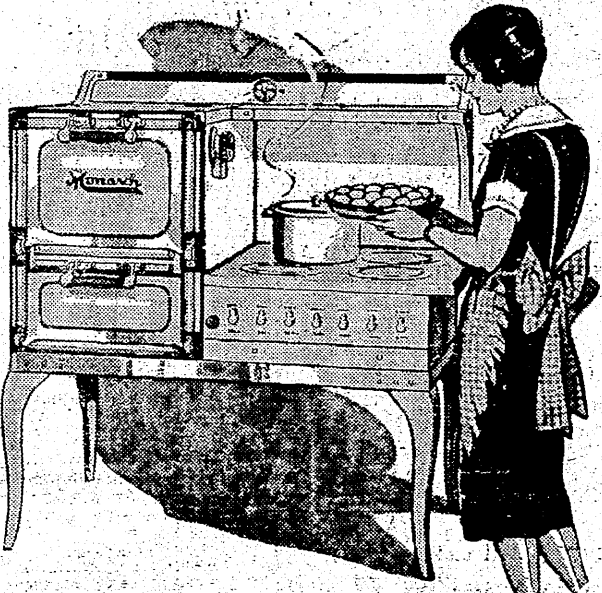

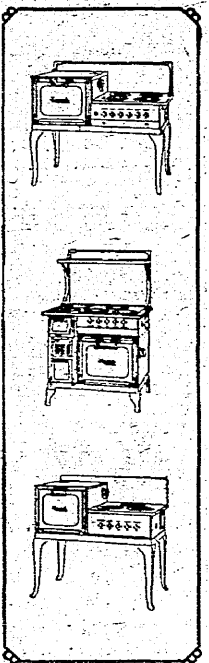

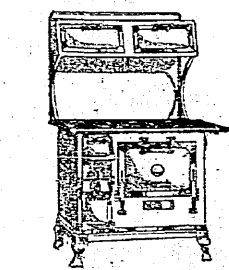

PLANNING BODY HEARS PLEA FOR NEW SHORT ROAD

Cross-Town Artery Connecting Ballard, University District Asked; Consider Tunnel, Surface Route

Citizens interested in the proposed new cross-town highway connecting the Ballard district with the Wallingford and University districts were given hearing by the City Planning Commission in the City Council Chamber this afternoon.

Two plans for the improvement have been formulated. One calls for a tunnel approximately 3,000 feet long with a grade of 3 per cent, to cost, with the approaches, more than a million dollars. The other calls for a surface street eighty feet wide with a maximum grade of 7 per cent, at a comparatively low cost.

The cost of the tunnel project, it has been pointed out, would be too great to permit it being financed by local improvement assessments.

The tunnel plan calls for boring through Rainier Ridge beginning at a point on North 45th Street.

The surface street route, as proposed, would begin at West 53rd Street and Fourth Avenue Northwest, cross Third Avenue Northwest near Ballard Boulevard and extend, in a southerly and southeasterly direction, over West 45th Street, West 53rd Street, Palmer Drive, and First Avenue Northwest to West 47th Street, where a diagonal cut through the block would complete the extension into North 46th Street at Greenwood Avenue.

It is proposed to have an undercrossing at Aurora, it is suggested, at a block of steep grade to the east of Aurora.

SAND POINT HIGHWAY COMES STEP NEARER

Condensation Awards for Right-of-Way Filed With City Council.

Construction of the city's unit of Sand Point Way, the 100-foot wide highway to Sand Point Aviation Field, came a step nearer today when the condemnation awards for the right of way were filed with the City Council.

The awards cover fifty-eight tracts and total \$63,242.66. The next step is for the awards to be referred to the Eminent Domain Commission for preparation of a condemnation assessment roll. If no unusual delay is encountered, work could begin in the late summer or fall.

King County let the contract for its unit of the highway, from the city limits east to the field, last fall. The work will be completed some time in the summer, it is expected.

The city section of the highway will begin at East 45th Street and 35th Avenue Northeast and extend northwesterly to the eastern city limits at East 6th Street and 31st Avenue Northeast, a distance of approximately 1.75 miles. At no place along the route will the grade exceed 5 per cent and there will be no sharp curves.

Later it is proposed to build a branch road south from Sand Point Way on East 6th Street to Lake Washington.

DELEGATES PLAN FOR YAKIMA CONVENTION

County convention delegates from the Thirty-second senatorial district will caucus at 8 o'clock this evening at the Fremont Odd Fellows' Temple and decide upon a plan of action for Saturday's Republican gathering.

The Thirty-second district has approximately two-fifths of the 1,031 delegates to the county convention and will take the King County's 214 delegates in the state convention at Yakima, May 5. The meeting tonight will nominate these 81 state delegates, take a stand on the candidacy of Herbert Hoover for President, on that of State Senator R. W. Condon of Kitsap County for national committee man and probably endorse a district delegate to the Republican national convention.

Hoover Supporter Suggested.

At a meeting of steering committees of the Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Fremont Branches last evening the names of Charles E. Allen and William Lofflan for district delegate to Kansas City were brought forward, but voting was deferred until tonight. Mr. Allen is a strong Hoover supporter and is Hoover sentiment predominant. His friends are claiming victory.

There will be no dearth of King County delegate aspirants at the Yakima convention. Victor H. Elfenfeld is slated for one delegate at-large, and Mrs. Thomas G. Hathaway, vice president of the King County Hoover Club, for another.

Mr. A. J. Sullivan, George H. Rummens and H. A. P. Myers are others who are anxious to assist the Hoover cause in the national convention.

A complete check-up of last Saturday's Republican convention and of the results of prior meetings shows Hoover running away from Frank O. Lowden. It is estimated that the former will have at least 750 of the 990 delegates at Yakima.

SERUM RUSHED HERE IN FIGHT FOR LIFE

Air Mail and Fast Train Bring Medicine From Detroit as Last Resort to Defeat Death.

SERUM ordered in Detroit, Sunday as a last resort in the fight to save the life of William T. Beeks, former collector of internal revenue, critically ill at his home here, was expected to arrive in Seattle by train late today from Pasco.

The serum sped through the air in an air mail plane yesterday, arriving at Pasco this morning. There it was placed on a fast train bound for Seattle.

William T. Beeks, according to his son, William T. Beeks, Jr., is beyond medical aid. The serum was ordered as a last resort.

Mr. Beeks is a prominent attorney and is president of the state organization of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Young Stimson And Mother Agree On Allowance Figure

NOTICE that Frederick F. Stimson, 27 years old, son of the late F. S. Stimson, Seattle lumberman and capitalist, has reached an agreement with his mother regarding an allowance which he is to receive for the next six months, was filed in the Superior Court this afternoon.

The agreement, attorneys said, precluded any action young Stimson might have contemplated to set aside his guardianship, now a local bank which was designated by the court two years ago when his mother filed notice that she was incompetent to handle his \$300,000 share of his father's estate.

Young Stimson at present is studying aviation at the University of Washington and is engaged to marry a girl he met while attending preparatory school in the East three years ago. The girl is at present in Europe with her family.

Superior Judge Adam Beeler, who yesterday assumed the bench vacated by Judge Walter Beeler upon the latter's elevation to the Supreme Court bench, today was in the midst of his third case. Yesterday he decided a divorce case and took under advisement a dispute over a lumber purchase and today was hearing testimony in the suit of the Hime-Rolph Investment Company, which is seeking to compel James Griffiths to execute a purchase agreement to buy the sailing vessel William T. Lewis.

U. S. HIGH COURT UPHOLDS STATE'S ALIEN LAND LAW

Forty Acres Belonging to S. Katsuno, Japanese, in White River Gardens Case, Is Ordered Forfeited

The Washington alien land law, denying an alien the right to own land in the state, today had been upheld by the United States Supreme Court after a six years' contest that had run the gamut of state court.

The court, through Chief Justice William Taft, found that S. Katsuno, Japanese, had attempted to own forty acres of White River Valley garden lands through subterfuge, and informed Ewing D. Colvin, King County prosecutor, that it was unnecessary for him to reply to arguments made in behalf of Katsuno by Frederic E. Fuller, counsel for the White River Gardens, Inc. Company "Dummy."

Katsuno had purchased land owned by the corporation and transferred his stock to his daughter, who was an American citizen, having been born in this country. The state contended that the corporation was merely a dummy designed to mask Katsuno's ownership.

The state's claims were upheld in the lower courts and the United States Supreme Court, where it had gone six times on various phases of the litigation.

Property to State.

As a result of the decision the disputed property will revert to the state.

Mr. Colvin wired today from Washington that he had filed a brief against the application of Wallace C. (Bob) Gaines to obtain a review of the evidence on which he was convicted in the Superior Court here of the rape of his daughter, Sylvia, Smith College girl.
