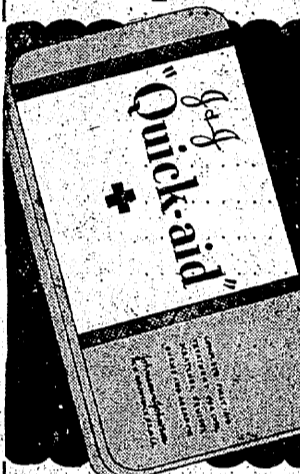

## SOUTH NOT SOLID, SAYS MACFARLANE

Mackintosh Manager Sees Victory for Hoover in Florida and North Carolina.

Despite contrary conclusions of some eastern political observers, Robert S. Macfarlane, in charge of the King County campaign of Kenneth Mackintosh for United States senator, returned to Seattle yesterday from an extended transcontinental trip convinced that Herbert Hoover has an excellent chance of breaking into the Democratic "Solid South." He said the probabilities are that the Republican national nominees will carry Florida and North Carolina.

Mr. Macfarlane, as past, exalted ruler of Seattle Lodge, B. P. O. E., attended the Elks' annual convention in Miami, Fla., and afterwards made a study of political conditions in the South and Middle West. "On my way to New York," he said, "I stopped at Washington, D. C., and saw Mr. Hoover by appointment, reporting to him the result of my survey. I told him that I found sentiment strong for him in the West and that probably, for the first time, the 'Solid South' will be broken, most likely in Florida and North Carolina."

"I also told Mr. Hoover that his old friend and classmate at Stanford, Kenneth Mackintosh, would be nominated for United States senator and would be running with him in the State of Washington this fall. I assured him this ticket would win. My conference with Mr. Hoover covered many confidential political matters.

"While deeply interested in Washington, it is not likely that Mr. Hoover will come to this state during the campaign," Mr. Macfarlane asserted.

"The Republican national ticket will carry Washington by 75,000 to 100,000. Mr. Hoover's presence is more needed elsewhere," he said.

## COLVIN EXTENDS HUNT FOR MISSING MAN INTO ALASKA

Prosecutor and Aides Believe Swan Johnson Dead but Decide to Trace Possible Clue Into North.

Although believing Swan Johnson, missing Bothell rancher, is dead, Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin announced this afternoon that search for Johnson has been extended to Alaska. Previously the search has been confined to the Pacific Northwest, he said.

"We have not found any trace of Johnson," Mr. Colvin said, "and although the officers working on the case are convinced he is dead, we must find the body before any criminal action can be taken. Before definitely concluding that he is dead, however, we must learn whether or not he is in Alaska."

John Johnson, Swan's brother, is an Alaskan miner, and is said by relatives to have sent more than \$30,000 to Swan Johnson in Seattle for investment during the past fifteen years.

## DR. E. ROSCOE LYDA IS CONVENTION SPEAKER

Seattle Osteopath Is En Route to Association Gathering at Kirksville, Mo.

DR. E. ROSCOE LYDA, Seattle osteopath, will be a speaker at the centennial convention of the American Osteopathic Association to be held in Kirksville, Mo., August 6 to 11, according to a program of the national sessions received here today.

Dr. Lyda will speak before the technical division of the association at the meeting of Tuesday, August 7, on the subject, "Scientific Basis of Osteopathy." He will be the main body of the convention on the following Friday on "The Old Doctor's Methods of Investigation."

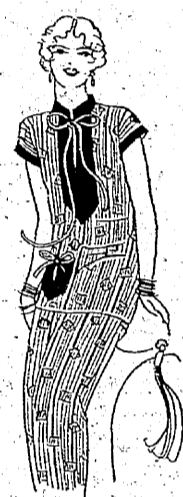
