Two Special Ceremonies Scheduled Christian Endeavor Folk Adjourn Mission Series Opens at St. James'

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR TO CLOSE SESSION TONIGHT AT INSTALLATION RITES

CULMINATING Christian Endeavor anniversary festivities begun in Seattle two weeks ago in observance of the forty-ninth anniversary of the organization's existence, a final business session this evening at University Christian Church was to include announcement of new officers for the coming year and their ensuing installation during solemn exercises.

Another significant event of the closing period was to be presentation of the Seattle District Service Cup, awarded annually to the society representing virtually every denomination and coming from various Northwestern Washington communities.
