GIVAN, FINLAY TO START LATE BEGIN AT 10:45

Tacoma Entry Last Man to Leave in Tomorrow's 18-Hole Round; Two Days to Determine Match Draw.

THE draw for qualifying play in the National Public Links championship at Jacksonville, Fla., tomorrow and Wednesday being given over to one round each of medal scoring, finds Seattle's two entries, Clyde Finlay and Harry Givan not forced to get up too early to keep their starting engagements.

Finlay plays at 10:45 tomorrow with Charles Descenter of Cleveland, and at 11:35 Wednesday with the same companion, while Givan starts at 11:05 tomorrow and 11:35 Wednesday with Percy Swanberg of Chicago.

The other pairings of Pacific Northwest entrants bring together Russell C. Mendel, Portland, with John K. Amann, New York City; Dr. W. A. Norby, Portland, with Anthony Crocock, Buffalo; Lloyd Meada, Portland, with Joe F. Houck, Little Rock; Bill Blaufuss, Portland, with M. W. Gallo, Pittsburgh; James Eustang, Portland, with Walter Barton, Akron, and George F. Tacoma, with George Klippinger, St. Louis.

Pease is the last to start tomorrow, at 1:40 p. m., but on Wednesday he is the first off, at 9 a. m.


Nick Waddell To Battle Sailor Here This Week

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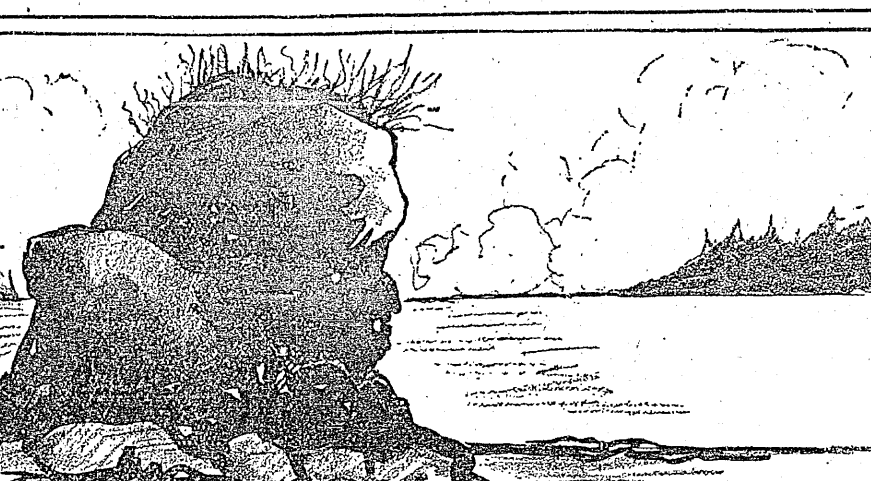

Ruth Hits His Homer No. 40 And Moves Up

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Monday, Aug. 4.—Except for Bill Terry and Babe Ruth, the Big Six had another bad day at bat yesterday. Terry found no trouble in Dazzy Vance's delivery and made three of the few Giant hits against Brooklyn as he made four trips to the plate. The blows moved him up three points in the averages and put him into second place in the Big Six, ahead of Frank O'Doul, who did not appear in the Phillies' line-up.

Ruth made only one hit, his fortieth homer of the year, but he had only two official trips to the plate and lifted his average a point to .364. The leader, Chuck Klein, hit only twice in eight times up and dropped three points to .406. Lou Gehrig lost two points as he failed to hit in three times at bat, while Al Simmons lost one point by getting one hit in three tries.

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Genung Does Half-Mile In 1:54.9; Sets Record

All existing half-mile records at the University of Washington were shattered Saturday afternoon on the varsity oval when Ed Genung, Husky middle distance star, stepped 880 yards in 1:54.9.

No half miler who has ever run under the colors of the U. of W. and no half miler of any other institution or club has ever covered two laps of the Stadium oval in as fast time as did Genung.

The trial was the final test under the direction of Hec Edmundson, for the National A. A. U. track and field championships at Pittsburgh August 22 and 23 in which Genung, Rufus Kiser, miler; Pat Jessup, weight star, and Steve Anderson, hurdler, will compete as representatives of the Washington Athletic Club.

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TWO THOUSAND BOYS LISTED IN PLAY LOT LOOPS

Exhibition: The act of exhibiting, presenting to view, or manifesting, public display of productions, such as an exhibition of wild animals. A spectacle.

Mr. Floyd Musgrave, exhibitor, and Messrs. Everett Marshall and John Freberg, exhibitors, obey to the letter the edicts of our learned Seattle Athletic Commission, the above is what fans will see tomorrow evening, when the Coast Athletic Club presents its wrestling show at the Civic Auditorium.

The commission says that it must be an exhibition. Under the ruling it will probably be all right when, as Mr. Marshall steps on Mr. Freberg's bare toes, Mr. Freberg manifests extreme pain.

Or, when Mr. Freberg tweeks Mr. Marshall's ear, it will be splendid if Mr. Marshall presents to view an irritated expression. Or, when Mr. Freberg chases Mr. Marshall outside of the ropes, it will be a public display, such as an exhibition of wild animals, and that, too, will be okay.

However, there was considerable doubt at press time as to the reaction of the commission if Mr. Marshall raises Mr. Freberg for an airplane spin, or if Mr. Freberg attempts a body slam or clamps on a headlock. That might be considered wrestling as in a match or contest, and that, the commission says, is very, very wrong.

At any rate, both Mr. Marshall and Mr. Freberg are in town, girded for their "exhibition" the first of its kind since the athletic commission refused to sanction a match or a contest. Thus the commission protected the Seattle public from the wolves of the wrestling game.

To prepare for the "exhibition," which will go eight ten-minute rounds, "Bull" Montana, a husky sailor, and Bob Kruse of Portland will go five rounds, and Harry Demetrius of Chicago and Chet Willes of Portland will grapple for three rounds.

Three cheers for the "rasslers!" Bring on the exhibition.

Queen Anne's double-header at the Civic Stadium will see the start of the playoff.

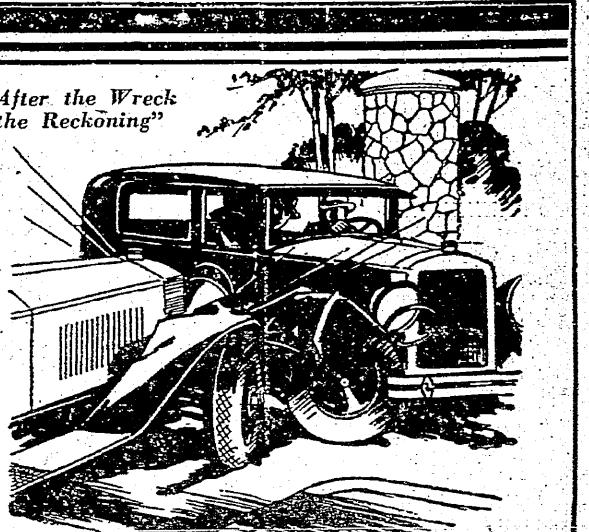
