HILL PREPARES ORDINANCE FOR AURORA BALLOT

Resolution Will Ask County Election Board for Permission to Use Polls Early in November.

Final preparations were being made at the City Hall today to give Seattle citizens opportunity to decide by special vote at the November election whether Aurora Avenue Park should be slashed through Woodland Park to provide a beach to the new Lake Union Bridge.

Acting upon a formal report by City Comptroller Harry W. Carroll that far more money has been signed on the Aurora Avenue referendum petition than were required to force the extension question to a public vote, Councilman George W. Hill was rushing a resolution and ordinance needed to place the matter on the ballot.

In the Hill resolution the Council will ask the county election officials to permit a special vote on the approach problem at the coming election which otherwise would be confined to county and state affairs. The ordinance will be required to legalize the special election by order of the Council in keeping with the demands of those who are striving to save the park from invasion.

"In a short space of time the Association has accomplished much for the benefit of the central business district and the city itself. The Second Avenue extension and other projects will improve access to the city. These were parts of the program.

"The program outlined as the work which this enlarged and better equipped organization will do can be briefly stated as comprising three major phases:

1. Taxation and legislation. 2. Civic and sectional development, with the problems they bring and their favorable or unfavorable effects upon business properties. 3. Actual building management operations, which include, of course, income-producing factors, service and operating methods and devices.

OLYMPIC FOREST RESERVED CLOSED BY FIRE HAZARD

Travel No Longer Allowed in Large Sections; Stubborn Old Blazes Checked, but Still Give Trouble.

Federal forestry officials have closed a large section of the northern part of the Olympic reserve to travel because of extreme fire hazard, trespassers being subject to a fine of from \$10 to \$100 or ninety days' imprisonment for violation of the order. Only permanent residents and those engaged in industrial operations will be allowed in the district, the closing order going into effect immediately.

The forester's action closes the Morse Creek and Malden Creek watersheds. Ennis Creek trail, Deer Park trail, the trail leading from Hurricane Ridge into Cooc's valley and Cooc's trail are closed, but the trail from Elwha ranger station over Hurricane Ridge up to Obstruction Creek remains open. Continued dry weather and the danger of fire from the carelessness of campers, fishermen or casual visitors led to the order.

1,000 Acres Covered

Fire on 1,000 acres of land near Beaver Lake in King County, which have been covered by a blaze which started August 24, was reported to have been practically blown out today. An old highway bridge has been destroyed.

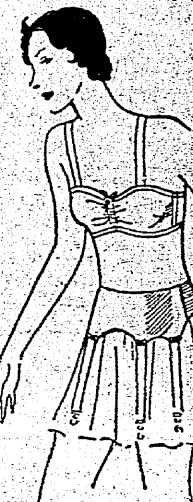
