By United Press. RENO, Wednesday, Aug. 5.—Jack Dempsey threw aside all care today, confident that he will make \$500,000 from his exhibition boxing tour, and departed with a company of notables for a six-day hunting trip.

A high wind was whipping scores about as the first forty players in the Washington State Amateur finished their 18-hole qualifying round at Broadmoor, and the best score submitted was that of Ralph Whaley of Broadmoor, with 75. Scotty Campbell of Jefferson Park and Harry Givan of the Olympic Club were tied with 77s. Fred Hopkins of Tacoma and Warren Winston of Spokane were tied with 80s.

The first appearance of the Yankee track team will be Saturday at Cape Town. The second meet will be August 11 at Queenstown and the third at Durban, August 15. This meet will be followed by additional games at Johannesburg, Bloemfontein and Kimberley before sailing for home.

Little is known of the competition the Americans will meet on their tour, but S. J. Atkinson, the man who beat Steve Anderson to the tape in the 1928 Olympics at Amsterdam, is still in the game in South Africa, and is due to meet Jim Hatfield, the Yankee hurdler, in one or two of the meets.
