MIAM, Fis., Monday, Feb. 20. After consultation with the five physicians attending Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago, Dr. Frederick Tice, Chicago heart specialist, issued a statement saying: "I believe we may look forward to

full recovery of the mayor."

Mrs. Joe H. Gill of Miami, also seriously wounded by the assassin who attempted to kill President-elect Roosevelt, rested fairly well, hospital

attendants said.

It was stated at the hospital that both Mayor Cermak and Mrs. Gill should pass their crises by tomorrow night. The other three victims of the assassin's bullets were definitely

assassing outless were definitely headed for recovery. Gov. Henry Horner of Illinois, who made a hurried trip and arrived at Mayor Cermak's bedside Saturuay night, departed for Springfield today with assurances the mayor's condi-

tion was improved.

The governor, who found Mr. Cer-mak propped up on an elbow turning the pages of a book last night, said

the mayor "realizes now he is mak-ing a winning fight."

An official bulletin issued by the live attending physicians before they left the hospital last night said Mr. Cermak's pulse was 84, respiration 20 and temperature 100. The tempera-ture was held due to absorption from injured tissue and had dropped from 100.4 earlier in the night.
