

# NEWS IN SEATTLE CHURCHES

## CHRISTMAS SERMONS, MUSIC PLANNED FOR SERVICES TOMORROW

Yule sermons and programs will be presented in nearly all Seattle churches tomorrow. Cantatas, oratorios, candlelight devotions and Christmas messages are among the features to be offered at services throughout the day.

Churches of the Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist Episcopal, Congregational, Christian and Unitarian denominations will observe the Feast of the Nativity tomorrow instead of Tuesday. The color and ceremony of the religious calendar's most joyous feast day will prevail at their services.

Yuletide services in Catholic, Episcopal and Lutheran churches will not be held until Monday night and Tuesday.

**PRESBYTERIAN**

## Alien Land Law Cases in Arizona Are Dismissed

PHOENIX, Ariz., Saturday, Dec. 22.—Alien land law complaints naming fourteen defendants were dismissed yesterday by Superior Judge J. C. Niles on motion of the county attorney.

One complaint listed seven Japanese as defendants.

Another named two Japanese, E. A. Marshall, American, and the Marshall Mortgage & Trust Company as defendants.

The motion to dismiss was based on insufficient evidence to prosecute. In trial of another alien land law action, Judge Niles granted a defense motion for dismissal of three defendants.

The various cases grew out of recent efforts of white farmers to drive Japanese farmers from the valley.

## HOUSE TO HAVE FEWER G. O. P. ON COMMITTEES

WASHINGTON, Saturday, Dec. 22.—Democratic leaders have proposed that their party assume greater control over the drafting of legislation by taking over more committee posts. The move brought quick protest from Republicans.

Representative Byrns of Tennessee, Democratic floor leader who is expected to be next Speaker, advanced it as his personal belief Democratic committees should be increased and Republican membership reduced.

"They (Republicans) have got about one-fourth of the membership," Byrns said, "so why should they have one-third, or thereabouts, of the committee places? It's our responsibility and we're competent to handle it."

Representative Mapes of Michigan, a Republican leader, remarked: "The Republicans got about 46 per cent of the popular vote in the last election. Those voters are entitled to representation on legislative committees."

"But if the Democrats want to change things, they've got the brute strength to do it." The Democrats have 322 members in the next House while Republicans have 102. The number of Republicans and Democrats on committees has not been changed since Democrats took over the House in 1933 with a four-vote majority.

In the last House Democrats had 614 committee posts, and Republicans 276, a number of members serving on two or more committees.

Miss Kate Nevins, a sister-in-law, said she heard a shot while at his home last night and found Bannister lying on a bed in his room with a revolver nearby. He has been ill the past year.

He was president of the lumber concern from 1921 until 1923 when he resigned.


