

JEALOUS WIFE SLAYS HUSBAND

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Daisy Alexander Root, pretty 30-year-old blonde, tossed on a jail cot today facing a charge of murder for the slaying of her husband, Brenton Root, over the affections of a red-haired cigarette girl.

Root, 32, investigator for a Memphis wholesale concern and son of a Chicago minister, was shot to death at his home early yesterday after a party with his wife and friends at the hotel where the girl, Miss Lucille Underwood, 21, was employed.

Miss Underwood told officers she once went with Root for three months, but avoided him after she learned he was married. She denied she caused the estrangement of the couple.

"I didn't love him," she said. "Bereaved Parents Sympathetic"

Parents of the slain man, the Rev. and Mrs. Benjamin Franklin Root, were sympathetic with the wife in their grief.

"We will do all we can to make her burden easier," the mother-in-law of the prisoner said. "She hardly realized what she was doing. We don't feel harshly toward her."

Mr. Root, rector of St. Simon's Protestant Episcopal Church in Chicago, wept and said, "I suppose this woman must be tried."

The wife was quoted by officers as saying she and her husband, from whom she separated about six weeks ago, went to the hotel with three other couples and they saw Miss Underwood.

She had caused me lots of trouble," Mrs. Root declared. She said she resented her husband's attentions to the girl, and left, asking another couple to take her home.

Stunned Husband's Face
Patrolmen Bert Hatch and H. B. Martin quoted her as saying she got out the pistol which "Brenton had taught me to shoot," went to his home and "killed him."

Miss Underwood said she saw Mrs. Root for the first time at the hotel. "She told Brett (Brenton Root), 'There's your cigarette girl, why don't you buy me a package of cigarettes,'" Miss Underwood said. "Brett called me 'honey,' and Mrs. Root grabbed my arm and slapped me. He told her, 'You can keep me from buying a pack of cigarettes from her, but you can't stop me from loving her.'"

She said she left the place after that.

Mrs. Roosevelt Called No. 1 Pacifist of U. S.

INDIANAPOLIS, Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. O. D. Oliphant of Trenton, N. J., described Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt as "the No. 1 pacifist in this country" at opening sessions yesterday of a two-day conference of American Legion auxiliary department officers. Mrs. Oliphant is a past national president of the auxiliary department officers.

GREEK VOTERS RESTORE KING

ATHENS, Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Greek people voted overwhelmingly for the recall of former King George to the throne, it was announced officially today, with nation-wide results from yesterday's plebiscite giving 1,491,992 for the monarchy to 32,454 for the republic.

The foreign minister communicated the results to the former monarch, now in London, and announced that a delegation was proceeding to London.

As the counting proceeded crowds continued nightlong celebrations in the streets and cafes of many cities and towns.

Monarch 'Delighted'

All were waiting for a message from George in London, where news of the Royalist victory had been dispatched by Gen. George Kondylis, regent, who took over the government October 10 in a bloodless coup.

(In London, the monarch said: "I am delighted that my people went me to return to them.")

(The former king received his English friends and Greek royalties, who showered him with congratulations. Messages poured into his hotel, making it necessary to enlist additional aides to handle them.)

Warship Will Sail

By their vote, the Greek population nullified the action of their monoclod king when he stepped down from the throne December 18, 1923, in response to demands from army and navy officers.

Thursday a delegation will sail aboard a Greek warship to present the official request for King George to return. The delegation is to include Minister of War Papagos, Minister of Communications Mayimichalis and President of the National Assembly Balanos.

Ex-Queen Shuns Return to Greece

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Former Queen Elizabeth of Greece has indicated she is not interested in returning to the Greek throne, despite the sweeping victory of monarchists in yesterday's Greek plebiscite.

Divorced from George II, who is expected to be restored to the throne as the result of the nationwide voting, she apparently has no regrets and prefers to remain a farmer in Rumania instead of again becoming Queen of Greece.

Veterans Again To Urge War Draft for All

WASHINGTON, Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Campaigns for the "universal draft" and for conscription of capital in wartime were snapping up today for the next session of Congress.

The American Legion, an official said today, will renew its fourteen-year fight for the "universal draft" plan, providing for nonprofit wartime service by all classes.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars announced support of a plan to conscript capital and industry "on the same basis as armed forces."

The V. F. W. also will push a program designed to strengthen American neutrality, to bring about federal control or regulation of the munitions industry and to require political candidates to make public their "position on foreign entanglements."

Victor E. Devereaux, director of the V. F. W. department of Americanism, said today that European nations "are apparently on the verge of a new war inspired solely for greed for territory."

He said the organization would seek to have Congress "repudiate any responsibility on the part of the United States in the protection of American investments in foreign nations" or of any citizen "who deliberately travels aboard a foreign ship that is open to attack by an enemy."

CHICK ORDERS SWAMP EGG MEN

BELLINGHAM, Monday, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Guy E. Van Horn of Marietta, president of the Washington Chick Association, said orders for chicks are coming so rapidly his association "cannot handle them."

The association will have two hatcheries operating, at Vancouver and Spokane, increasing its capacity to 1,400,000 eggs. During the past season the association sold 1,157,000 chicks.

Britain's 'Most Perfect Woman' Challenges Girls of America

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Monday, Nov. 4.—Rosemary Andree, who won a contest for Great Britain's "most perfect woman," challenged American women today to match her physical perfection for a \$5,000 stake.

"The judges, when they selected me from 50,000 English women, told me I had a perfect physical figure," the ninety-four-pound blond dancer said, "and in the interest of health I'm willing to bet \$5,000 on their decision."

The gamble is all on her side, she explained. "My money and my reputation are at stake. I ask them to put up nothing."

The feminine member of the continental dance team of Gaston and Andree prefers her nickname of "the Pocket Venus" to any other.

"Sometimes people call me 'the china doll,'" she said with an expression of distaste. "After all, I do have some brains, and I do not like to be thought of as doll-like."
