

EAST AND MIDWEST FACE ICY WEEK-END

NEW WAVE MAY HIT PRAIRIES

CHICAGO, Saturday, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Slight moderation in the Arctic-like weather which has held most of the nation in an icy grasp for several days was forecast today as the tabulated list of dead in the worst subzero siege of the Twentieth Century exceeded 150.

Iowa with a new fall of snow up to 10 inches, reported minus 5 at midnight. The official forecast was for a rise to above zero today, but added: "Relief will end Sunday with a new sub-zero plunge."

Minnesota's Twin Cities reported the weather had warmed up to only 20 below at midnight, but there was an ominous air about today's forecast: "Snow with colder weather in Northern Minnesota."

Chicago Forecast International Falls on the Canadian border is in Northern Minnesota and it was from there that readings of 56 below came Thursday to establish its claim to the doubtful honor of the coldest spot in the United States.

At Sherrard, W. Va., rescue crews cut through mountainous drifts today with welcome fuel, food and medicine for 300 snow-bound residents, isolated since Sunday.

Oklahoma Normal Oklahoma was back to normal. Subfreezing was forecast for Texas. Most of the states east of Illinois reported slight let-ups in climatic conditions.

SENATORS SPLIT ON BONUS TAXES

Senator Clark, Democrat, Missouri, expressed the opinion that no more than a score of Senators would vote to sustain the President's veto.

Senator Steiwer, Republican, Oregon, one of the measures' authors, said: "This colorless veto message is not in keeping with the vigorous effort which the President puts forth when he earnestly desires to influence the actions of Congress."

VAN VLACK TRIAL NEARS CLIMAX

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Saturday, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Prosecution of Douglas Van Vlack of Tacoma on a charge of murder moved swiftly to completion today with the state prepared to call its remaining nine witnesses and give the case to the defense before nightfall.

Throughout the questioning of state's witnesses yesterday the defense raised few objections and cross-examined but briefly. Dr. Royal B. Tracy, Seattle psychiatrist, who will testify in behalf of Van Vlack in an effort to establish that the accused killer is a mentally defective said after yesterday's session that "the defense does not intend to do much cross-examining."

When the state called Mrs. Joseph Hook, the mother of the dead girl, Teats asked but one question in cross examining her. "Did Mildred seek to obtain an interlocutory divorce the day after she told you she and Douglas were married?" Teats asked.

They're Harborview County Hospital's switchboard operators, sitting in their small office off the long, silent halls, where footsteps are only a padded stillness and anxious-faced men and women enter and reenter the doors.

With Modulated Voices Each time the switchboard buzzes they swing into activity, their voices modulated and in keeping with the atmosphere of respectful quiet: "No, Mr. Jones, it's twins. Yes, I imagine you feel much better now that it's all over."

Never Monotonous Blond Miss Agnes Kirksmith adjusted her headbands today and smilingly talked of her work. "It's never humdrum or monotonous, at any rate," she said. "We know the condition of every patient every minute of the day, receiving new reports at every change, and anybody is welcome to call at any time of the night or day."

Sympathy for Patients "Many times there are so many calls about a patient that we become greatly interested ourselves. When we come on shift we say to ourselves: 'I hope Mr. Smith pulled through last night all right, and I'll have good news for his mother today.' It seems a part of your work—this sympathy with the people whom you've never seen, but whom you feel you know well."

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AL SMITH WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

WASHINGTON, Saturday, Jan. 25.—(AP)—A feeling that a history-making episode may occur tonight was current in the capital today as Alfred E. Smith traveled here to address an American Liberty League dinner and a radio audience at 10 p. m., Eastern Standard Time (7 p. m., Seattle time).

Political leaders were excited over the possibility of a declaration of Smith's course in the presidential campaign. They felt the speech might indicate whether Smith intends to take off his coat and fight the New Deal in the political wars to come.
