Poverty-Stricken Artist-Suicide's Works Now Worth \$5,000,000

SAN FRANCISCO, Friday, April 24.—The \$5,000,000 Van Gogh art collection of 105 drawings and paintings will arrive here tomorrow from the East and with a full police escort and surrounded by various sorts of protection will be taken to the California Palace of the Legion of Honor for a month-long stay. No admission will be charged to see the paintings. In the other four cities where the pictures have been displayed—New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Cleveland—the public was required to pay a door fee part of the time. Forty-six years ago Vincent van Gogh, poverty-stricken and hopeless, committed suicide. The first week of the present show in New York, the "gate" was \$30,000, more than 17,000 persons crowding the Museum of Modern Art to see the pictures.

Irving Stone, whose biographical novel of Van Gogh's life, "Lust for Life," has been widely read, is here for the opening of the display.
