## Red Executioners 'Liquidate' SCHACHT, BLUN KILLS PRISONER Fascists' Leaders at Madrid

One thousand determined Spanish rebels stormed the mountain defense of Irun, government-held city near the Frankco-Spanish border, in a bitter hand-to-hand battle today, but apparently defenders were holding their positions.

Meanwhile, French newspapers quoted refugees from Spain today as saying 100 Feasist rebels, many of them formerly high in the Spanish government, were executed in Madrid as a reprisal for an attempt to burn a jail where Fascist prisoners were held.

The refugees said those executed neluded Gen. Oswaldo Fernando Capaz, former military commander in Morocco; Admiral Francisca Salas, former minister of marine, Rico Avello, former minister of treasury and high commissioner in Morocco; Dr. Jose Maria Albinana, leader of the National Tradi-tionalist Party; the Marquis de Urqujo, a banker, and Fernando Primo de Rivera, cousin of the Fascist leader; Jose Martinez de Valasco, former foreign minister, and Melguiades Alvarez, former

A rebel scouling plane, in a spec-tacular aerial battle over the French frontier, drove two government bombers back to their bases today with bullets which spattered French soil.

The Spanish bombers were roaring over the fighting front toward rebel positions when the insurgent plane dived out of the clouds to meet them, 5,000 feet above the Bidasson River, forcing them down to 1,000 feet. They escaped over French territory.

The radio station at Jerez de la Frontera, near Cadiz, announced "a Madrid personality, now in Tetuan, Spanish Morocco, declared that in two nights the Marxists killed 2,000 persons in Madrid."

Two thousand government militiamen comprised the forces reported only twenty-five miles from Burgos. The swift march on the rebel center followed by one day an important insurgent advance which dominated the Lozoya Valley, some forty miles north of Madrid.

Outside of Spain, Pascist Italy completed her adherence to the international neutrality pact by declaring a formal embargo on arms shipments to either side. The Span-The rebel chieftains who would shipments to either side. The Span-rule Spain disclosed today they ish government has accused Italy of helping the rebels, and says Il Duce will continue to do so, along with Germany and Portugal, despite the pact. Officially, however, Germany already has declared an arms embargo and Portugal has taken similar action.

At Washington, the United States State Department acknowledged Madrid's "profound regret" that official mail addressed to the American embassy in the Security and the Secu in the Spanish capital had been opened. It will not happen again, the Spaniards said.




