

JAPANESE FOUND NEAR ARSENAL

DAVENPORT, Iowa, Wednesday, Sept. 9.—(AP)—A man and a woman who gave their names as Nobuzana Tsunura, 29 years old, of Denver, and Miss Toniye Yanari, 22, of Platteville, Colo., were held today for investigation by Davenport police.

They were taken into custody this morning on Forest Road, Davenport, directly across the Mississippi River from the Rock Island Arsenal. A camera, which police stated was found in their possession, was turned over to Col. G. A. Gillespie, commandant of the Arsenal, for examination.

No charges have been filed against the couple.

Colonel Gillespie declined comment until the arsenal laboratory completes the examination of the film taken from the camera.

Hollywood Girl Most Talented In Beauty Race

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Wednesday, Sept. 9.—(AP)—"Miss California," 19-year-old Phyllis Dobson of Hollywood, was deemed "most talented" of the thirteen beauties judged last night in the national beauty pageant.

Forty-seven girls from various sections of the country and competing for the title, "Miss America," but only a third underwent the scrutiny of ten judges—men and women of the art and theatrical world.

"Miss California" won by a narrow margin over "Miss Chester," "Miss New Hampshire" and "Miss Western New York."

One-third of the girls were also tested for appearance in evening gowns and bathing suits, but the judges, choosing the five best, kept their decision secret.

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Sourdough Wettrick, Iceman Magnuson Vie for Congress

A 31-year-old former "Iceman" and a former Alaska "sourdough" probably will fight it out in the general election November 3 for the job of representing the First Congressional District in the United States House of Representatives.

The one-time ice delivery man is Warren Grant Magnuson, who has been in public office almost from the day he was graduated from the University of Washington. The "sourdough" is Frederick J. Wettrick, Seattle attorney.

Magnuson sprinted away from the Democratic field yesterday to win the nomination and Wettrick was leading Bert C. Ross in a close finish in the Republican race.

There still was a chance, however, that Ross, a Seattle attorney, might nose out Wettrick.

In the general election the voters will choose a successor to the late Congressman Marion A. Zioncheck.

Magnuson in Legislature

Magnuson came to Seattle from Minnesota. While at the University he delivered ice and joined the Teamsters' Union, working his way through school. In 1932 he was elected to the State Legislature from the Capitol Hill District, after he had won a name for himself the same year as a special prosecuting attorney for King County.

After the 1932 legislative session, Magnuson became an assistant United States attorney.

Magnuson won the office of King County prosecutor in 1934. He still has until January, 1939, to serve in that office, but should he be elected congressman in November, the Board of County Commissioners would appoint his successor.

Won Liberal Vote

Magnuson's runaway in yesterday's election was attributed to his cornering much of the liberal vote through his indorsement by the Washington Commonwealth Federation, his acquiring the greater share of the Scandinavian vote and attracting much labor support because of his membership in the Teamsters' Union.

Wettrick has been an attorney more than twenty years. Formerly he taught school in Alaska. He has served as president of the Seattle Sourdough Club and is a past commander of Seattle Post No. 1, American Legion.

Wettrick was the keynote speaker at the King County Republican convention. He based his campaign on pledges to aid the Puget Sound Navy Yard and to seek adequate defense for the Puget Sound area, a flood control program and "a sane system of public relief."

COSTIGAN NAMED BY THIRD PARTY

The Washington Commonwealth Federation yesterday nominated its executive director, Howard G. Costigan for governor to run as a third party candidate if final returns indicate the defeat of John C. Stevenson for the Democratic nomination.

Plans for the mass convention held yesterday in the Moose Temple were made last July at the state convention of the Commonwealth Federation. The announced purpose was to defeat Gov. Clarence D. Martin in November, should he win over Stevenson in the Democratic primary.

A mild contest for the distinction of carrying the Commonwealth banner developed between Costigan and Prof. R. G. Tyler of the University of Washington. Costigan won the nomination by a vote of 35 to 13. Tyler then was nominated for state superintendent of public instruction. The only other nomination for a state office went to O. M. Cook of Olympia for attorney general.

A committee consisting of Charles Legg, Earl Carter, Eugene Dennett, Melvin McKenny and William Dobbins was given authority to file the Commonwealth ticket with the secretary of state should the election return warrant such action.

The mass convention yesterday followed an advisory convention of the Commonwealth Party. Delegates to the mass convention were selected from citizens who did not participate in either the Republican or Democratic primaries. Only thirty-nine delegates were present.

In addition to the nominations for state offices, nominations for legislative positions in five districts were made. They were: 31st District, F. J. Jenkins and T. R. Kenney; 34th District, John M. Fox and Byron King; 35th District, Melvin I. Cole; 44th District, Mrs. Charles Legg and F. H. Vanderhoof; 46th District, L. G. Gundersen. Cyrus E. Woodward, president of the Commonwealth Federation, was permanent chairman of the mass convention.

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FIRE RAGES IN GREEN TIMBER

VANCOUVER, Wash., Wednesday, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Fire officials here reported a serious forest fire on Major Creek, 10 miles east of White Salmon in Klickitat County.

The blaze has covered more than fifty acres and is still raging in green timber and brush with a strong wind blowing. A crew of twelve state fire guards was fighting it. The woods are dry.

Harvard to Learn Century-Old Secret

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Wednesday, Sept. 9.—(AP)—President James B. Conant of Harvard University, in a private ceremony attended only by college and alumni officials, today broke the seals on an age-yellowed package that has reposed in the Harvard vaults for 100 years.

The package, placed in the archives by President Josiah Quincy when Harvard celebrated its bi-centennial in 1836, is believed to contain letters from eminent Harvard alumni of a century ago.

MORE WATER ON MORNING FIRE
