

# CHADWICK WOMAN RETURNS TO OHIO

## Immense Crowd Witnesses the Arrival of Adventuress in Cleveland.

### Grand Jury Finds Five More Indictments Against the Fair Prisoner.

### President Beckwith and Cashier Spear Must Plead to Four True Bills.

CLEVELAND, O., Wednesday, Dec. 14.—Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick arrived here this afternoon after an uneventful trip from New York. She was met by her son, Emil, who is leaving New York for the representative of the Associated Press and gave him a two-hour interview, during which she discussed many important phases of her case.

She consented to meet the various newspaper men on the train, and for half an hour she chatted pleasantly, although she declined to go into her affairs.

At Ashtabula Mrs. Chadwick was joined by her son, Emil, and the remainder of the trip she was in close conference with him. She was particularly interested in learning the public feeling at Cleveland.

Before leaving Ashtabula Mrs. Chadwick summoned the Associated Press representative and to him dictated "A Statement to the People of Ohio," as follows:

**Mrs. Chadwick's Statement.**  
"Hearing on my side of the story, all that I have to say is that I am innocent of the crime of which I am accused. It ought to be sufficient proof to you of my good faith to face my creditors and to have lived in Cleveland for many years, and outside of negotiating some large loans, which I have made in Cleveland, I have done nothing that I may have done which may not be considered good business. I do not think one who will attempt to accuse me of any wrong, I ask the people of Ohio to suspend judgment until the case is all heard."

**CASSIE L. CHADWICK.**  
Upon drawing near Cleveland Mrs. Chadwick's spirits perceptibly rose and she expressed the greatest delight at getting near home.

During the long wait for the train at the depot the crowd in front of the train arrived there were at least 10,000 people crowded about the passageway. As the train drew in the crowd was broken up and the passengers were immediately suppressed by the police. When Mrs. Chadwick was placed in the Pullman car carrying her to the Federal Building, Emil, her son, and Freda, the maid, followed in a carriage.

Escorted by the deputy marshals who accompanied her from New York, Mrs. Chadwick crossed the platform slowly, and carried a small black bag and a Federal building.

furnish me any amount of bail that would be wanted. I have had at least half a dozen prominent persons offer me bail today," continued the woman. "There was no one here to take my case."

"I am not going to answer any questions," said Mrs. Chadwick when one of the reporters asked her to identify the person who made the offer.

"I was told before, I am a wreck. The way my son and maid have been harassed by you young men is absolutely unbearable. I am going home. I want to understand that I am going home simply because it is the place where I belong."

"I shall not give bail when I get to Cleveland. I have the best motive in the world for not doing so. The history of this case from beginning to end will soon be published in a certain newspaper."

**Names Will Be Mentioned.**  
"You will call names, won't you?" interrupted Mr. Carpenter.

"I am not going to be questioned," she replied. "I have nothing to say about Mr. Carnegie and nothing to say about anyone else. I want to say emphatically that I have not done anything wrong in Cleveland. If the grand jury had indicted me fifty times I would have gone back just the same. I would go to Wall Street."

"The result was that I did not get off," she continued. "I feel a little better about it now. I can stand up and nervous and I can hardly stand on my feet."

# MAKES REPORT ON THE CITIZENS' ALLIANCE

## Chamber of Commerce Withholds Its Unqualified Endorsement.

### Recognizes Right of Person to Sell Labor for Greatest Price.

### No Man or Organization Has Right to Criticize Such Action.

**THE** special committee appointed by the chamber of commerce to investigate the Citizens' Alliance and report on the advisability of endorsement by the chamber, as requested by the organization, presented its report this afternoon to the chamber. In its opinion an endorsement of the requested cannot in fairness be unqualifiedly given to the chamber for the following reasons:

**Reasons Given.**  
First—Because however good any organization may be in principle its methods may at some time be unwise and the chamber should not be of record as endorsing them.

**Rights of Laboring Men.**  
Resolved, that this chamber endorses the right of every man to sell his labor wherever he may be able to do so to his best advantage without interference on the part of any one, and that all men have the right to do so on equal terms with the conditions become unsatisfactory to them without being criticized for so doing.

**MARKLE'S HOUSE SOLD**  
Portland Palace, Which Cost \$100,000, Brings but Quarter of That Sum.

**PORTLAND, OR., Wednesday, Dec. 14.**  
There was a sale of the house occupying perhaps the most slightly spot in all Portland and known to everyone as the Markle mansion. It was sold for its extreme beauty. But \$25,000 was necessary to buy the residence of George B. Markle, a well known promoter, now a Pennsylvania coal magnate, who cost a fortune in its construction. More than \$100,000 was expended on the palace, which overlooked Portland and the passing of Markle's Portland glory, his splendid mansion passed into a decadent state. His grand and airy structure were destroyed by vandals and his lavans were trampled by sight-seers.

**Gold Bought for Germany.**  
NEW YORK, Wednesday, Dec. 14.—Goldman, Sachs & Co. have engaged \$1,600,000 in gold coin for shipment to Germany tomorrow.

# RUSSIANS DREAM OF VICTORY

## Czar's Officer Says He Is Satisfied With Situation in Manchuria.

### Muscovite Army at Mukden Is Constantly Receiving Reinforcements.

**SOLDIERS LITERALLY BLOWN TO PIECES AT PORT ARTHUR.**  
NEAR PORT ARTHUR WITH THE THIR JAPANESE ARMY, Via Fusan, Wednesday, Dec. 14.—The effect of dynamite used as an offensive weapon in the form of hand grenades is instanced in an appalling manner by the condition of the dead bodies, which are torn and unrecognizable masses of flesh and bone. Fragments of hundreds of killed and mangled men are scattered about the earthed from the filled-in Russian trenches. The bodies are in a state of horror. The heavy timbers and steel plates of the bombproofs were torn to splinters by shells and dynamite.

**RUSSIANS RESIST ATTACKS ON BATTLESHIP SEVASTOPOL.**  
TOKYO, Wednesday, Dec. 14.—Vice-Admiral Togo reports a series of torpedo attacks on the Russian battleship Sevastopol, but no results were ascertained. The admiral says, vigorously resisting the attacks.

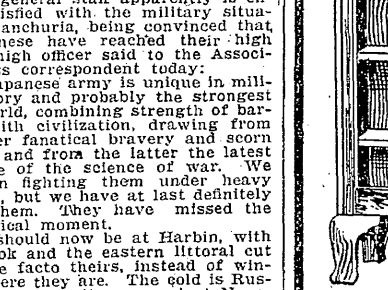
**MRS. CLARA PATTEN DEAD.**

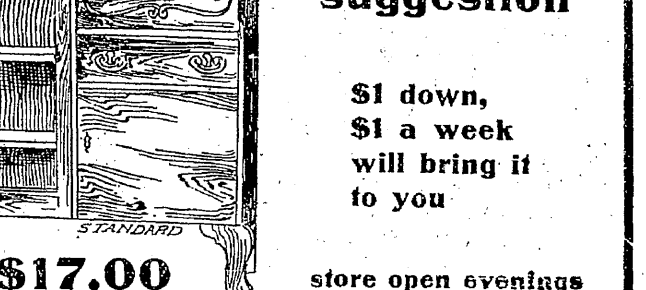
