

INDIAN AGENTS RAID BEER BARS

Opening a campaign "to halt widespread violation by Seattle beer taverns of the law against sale of intoxicants to Indians," a squad of officers led by Thomas F. Claggett, special officer of the United States Indian Bureau, last night arrested seven tavern proprietors and bartenders in scattered parts of the city.

"This is only the beginning of the drive," Claggett said today.

Spend Night in Jail

Three of those arrested were held in the county jail over night and were to be taken before a United States commissioner today for preliminary hearing. They are their names as Madesto Colasurdo, 45 years old, proprietor of the Madesto Tavern, in First Avenue near Pike Street; Axel Lee, 40, proprietor of The Hoist, tavern in Western Avenue, and George Oars, proprietor of a beer tavern in Ballard.

Cases Continued

The others, released on their personal recognizance, were Paul Kukutchka and Mrs. Mary Corak, bartenders in the Empire Tavern, in Western Avenue; William McPhee, bartender in the Mecca Tavern, in First Avenue, and Adella Lindsay, bartender in the Madesto Tavern. A. L. Maslin, appearing as attorney for McPhee, and Sylvester Garvin, counsel for Kukutchka and Mrs. Corak, obtained the continuances of their cases.

Oriental Here Ready to Fight In Far East

Two hundred stalwart young Chinese in Seattle stand ready to cross the Pacific and fight for their native land if in the Orient demands more man-power than China can supply, according to Law Kay, Seattle importer.

Several Japanese in Seattle, the "younger generation in Seattle" would be glad to fight "if necessary," but doubted the occasion would arise.

"The Chinese of Seattle are much excited over the situation in China," said Kay. "The aggression of the Japanese is unwarranted. All up and down the Pacific Coast meetings are being held secretly. The young Chinese are preparing to leave if they must. There are plenty of soldiers in China, but if more are needed we are ready."

Situation Watched

Although Kay himself is well over the 30-year-old age limit for China's fighting men, there are several hundred Chinese in Seattle less than 30, eager and willing to go. "The Chinese Patriotic Association of Seattle is watching every move in the Orient," Kay said.

"Some have already left for China," Kay said. "These are the fighting men who studied aviation in this country and now in China are ready for anything. Young people who are left are watching China closely. They will do anything to help. They are ready to back their country to the limit."

Secret Meetings Here

Kay said Chinese are meeting secretly in Seattle, and the young Orientals who are ready to take up arms against Japan prefer not to make their preparations public.

Leaders in Japanese circles here pointed out that their countrymen who were born in Japan are "young old" to fight, and most young Japanese in Seattle are American-born citizens who probably never will be called to action for Japan.

Five Missionaries Here From N. Y.

Five young Maryknoll missionaries arrived here this morning from the Catholic Foreign Mission Society at Maryknoll, N. Y. They will stay tonight at the Seattle Maryknoll Fathers' Home, 1603 Jefferson St., and embark tomorrow from Vancouver, B. C., on the Empress of Canada for mission posts in China, Japan and Manchoukuo.

Woman Lawyer Convicted

LOS ANGELES, Friday, Aug. 6. (AP)—Convicted on seven felony counts, Catherine McKenna, who has practiced law here for twenty-five years, will be sentenced next Monday. She was found guilty of offering false evidence and forgery of documents in a civil suit.

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FALLERS SENT TO FIRE FRONT

As sixty Seattle timber fallers today joined a weary crew of 1,700 other fire fighters who have been battling the three-mile-long Spud Hill fire in the Columbia National Forest near Randle, Lewis County, the Forest Service began mobilizing more men and equipment.

The fire, which has spread in two days from a thirty-acre fire to one blazing over more than 2,000 acres, gained last night with a west wind and today was threatening 2,000 acres more, the Associated Press said.

Some relief was promised by rain today.

Forest men say the fire is the worst in the Pacific Northwest since a blaze a year ago destroyed thousands of dollars' worth of timber in the Bandon, Or., area.

The Spud Hill fire is in the Cispus district, half way between Mount Rainier and Mount Adams, about ten miles south of Randle. It started from lightning July 27.

Britain, Italy Plan Parley To Mend Relations

ROME, Friday, Aug. 6.—The Italian government announced today that British and Italian diplomats would meet in Rome for formal conversations to settle differences between the two countries.

Count Dino Grandi, Italian ambassador to London, proposed the conversations to British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, who recently exchanged friendship letters with Premier Mussolini.

Yesterday, the government said, Sir Robert Vansittart, British permanent undersecretary of foreign affairs, notified Count Grandi the proposal had been accepted.

Rome and London have been at odds since Britain insisted on imposition of sanctions against Italy during Italian conquest of Ethiopia. The tension was renewed with the outbreak of the Spanish civil war.

The Italian government announced that it had lifted its three-month-old ban on British newspapers.

Prominently displayed accounts of Italian defeats in Spain in the British papers led to the ban and the recall of all Italian newspaper correspondents from London on May 8, prior to the coronation of King George VI.

The correspondents were authorized to return to London earlier this week.

Efficient Navy Yard Needed, Says Edison, Here on Visit

Charles Edison, assistant secretary of the Navy, who visualizes his job as industrial manager for Uncle Sam's sea defenses, arrived in Seattle this morning on an inspection tour of Pacific Coast shore stations. Traveling with the secretary are Mrs. Edison, Comdr. H. J. Nelson, his aide, and Douglas Johnson, secretary.

Secretary Edison, son of the late Thomas A. Edison, electrical genius, is 47 years old, but looks younger. He has twinkling, blue eyes and smiles frequently. His aides assert that he inherited from his illustrious father an enormous capacity for hard work.

Officers Greet Chief

Secretary Edison, who was greeted at King Street Station by a group of high-ranking naval officers, departed at once for Bremerton, where he began at once his task of inspecting the Navy Yard, the torpedo station at Keyport and the ammunition depot near by. Tomorrow he will visit the Navy's Sand Point Air Base.

"I cannot say now what plans are contemplated for the Bremerton Navy Yard or for the enlargement of Sand Point," Edison said. It is important that the yard be kept up to the highest degree of efficiency to construct and repair ships. The Navy Department recognizes no sectional or regional interests, but regards our sea defense as belonging to the entire country. The shore establishments in the Pacific Northwest are just as important as those on the Atlantic seaboard."

First Inspection Here

During the World War Edison was in charge of manufacture of war material for the United States government. His education includes four years at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. His home is at Llewellyn Park, West Orange, N. J.

Measurable rain fell in Seattle this morning for the first time since Saturday, on which day .05 of an inch was reported by the United States Weather Bureau. This morning's precipitation was .03 of an inch.

Saturday Beer Sales to Stop At Midnight

The Sunday ban on beer and wine sales, effective day after tomorrow, also will affect late Saturday night celebrants. It was disclosed today. Liquor Board orders forbid sales after midnight tomorrow night until 6 o'clock Monday morning.

The order also prevents any tavern from selling beer between 12 o'clock midnight Sunday and 1 o'clock Monday morning.

Sunday sales have been forbidden in Seattle by ordinance. A recent State Supreme Court decision made the ban statewide. Sales have been permitted in King County outside Seattle's city limits.
