Opening a campaing "to halt widespread violation by Seattle beer taverns of the law against sale of intoxicants to Indians," a squad of officers led by Thomas F. Claggett, special officer of the United States Indian Bureau, last night arrested seven tavern proprietors and bartenders in scattered parts of the city.

"This is only the beginning of the drive," Claggett said today.

Three of those arrested were held in the county jail over night and were to be taken before a United States commissioner today for preliminary hearing. They their names as Madesto Colasurdo, 45 years old, proprietor of the Madesta Tavern, in First Avenue near Pike Street; Axel Lee, 40, proprie-tor of The Hoist, tavern in West-ern Avenue, and George Oars, pro-prietor of a beer tavern in Ballard.

personal recognizance, were Paul Kukutcha and Mrs. Mary Corak, bartenders in the Empire Tavern, Jn Western Avenue; William Mc-Phee, bartender in the Mecca Tavern, in First Avenue, and Adella Lindsay, bartender in the Madesto Tavern. A. L. Maslan, appearing at attorney for McPhee, and Sylvester Garvin, counsel for Kukutcha and Mrs. Corak, obtained the continuances of their cases.

The young Chinese are preparing to leave if they must. There are plenty of soldiers in China, but if more are needed we are ready."

Although Kay himself is well over the 30-year-old age limit for China's fightling men, there are geveral hundred Chinese in Seattle less than 30, eager and willing to go. The Chinese Patriotic Association of Seattle is watching every move in the Orient, Kay said.

"Some have already left for China." Kay said. "These are the fighting men who studied aviation in this country and now in China are ready for anything. Young people who are left are watching China closely. They will do anything to help. They are ready to back their country to the limit."

Secret Meetings Here

Secret Meetings Here Kay said Chinese are meeting secretly in Seattle, and the young Orientals who are ready to take

up arms against Japan prefer not to make their preparations public. Leaders in Japanese circles here pointed out that their countrymen who were born in Japan are "too old" to fight, and most young Japanese in Seattle are Americanborn citizens who probably never will be called to action for Japan.

The Spud Hill fire is in the Cispus district, half way, between Mount Rainier and Mount Adams, about ten miles south of Randle. It started from lightning July 27.

Court Dino Grandi, Italian ambassador to London, proposed the conversations to British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, who recently exchanged friendship let-ters with Premier Mussolini.

Yesterday, the government said, Sir Robert Vansittart, British permanent undersecretary of foreign affairs, notified Count Grandi the proposal had been accepted.

Rome and London have been at odds since Britain insisted on imposition of sanctions against Italy during Italian conquest of Ethi-opia. The tension was renewed with the outbreak of the Spanish
