Lady Astor's Son Hurt in Collision
LONDON, Thursday, Oct. 28.—(AP)—John Jacob Astor, son of Lord and Lady Astor, and three other Oxford University undergraduates were injured today in an Oxfordshire automobile-truck accident.
The others were W. D. Ormsby-Gore, son of the British colonial secretary, Peter Wood, son of Viscount Halifax, lord president of the council, and Hugh Fraser, brother of Lord Lovat. The injuries were not critical.

Fugitive Robbers Of Priests Captured
SANTA FE, N. M., Thursday, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Two Oklahoma escaped convicts, accused of binding four Catholic priests with a tire chain and robbing them "even of our rosaries," were en route here today to face charges of highway robbery.
The men, Wallace McCullough, 24 years old, and Francis Thomas Dose, 29, were captured south of Pagosa Springs, Colo., after wrecking the priests' car and hijacking another machine. They admitted the robbery.

lodged at a log jam near the Jackson ranger station, Chief Game Protector Harold Loughary, Protector Fred Rice and Forest Ranger Stamford Fioe said they were considering dynamiting the jam today.
The storm was reported the worst in years in the Hoh district. High rolling waves on Lake Crescent flooded roads along the shore. It was reported.
The Seattle offices of the Weather Bureau reported that the worst of the storm also is over for the Olympic Peninsula area, although fresh to strong southwest winds will continue to blow along the Coast and at the mouth of the Columbia River during the next twenty-four hours. Small-craft warnings replaced storm signals along the Coast this forenoon.
Rain totaling .75 of an inch, nearly as much as had fallen in the city in the month's previous rainy spells, fell in Seattle last night.
Hoquiam power wires were torn out when a wall of the Lytle Building, in the city's central business district, crashed to the street at the height of the gale. Flashing wires and tumbling debris narrowly missed pedestrians and motorists. Aberdeen wires also were blown down.
The storm's effect also was felt in Bellingham, where sidewalk planks were ripped out, trees uprooted and small craft in the harbor buffeted about by the gale.
The Weather Bureau said the highest wind velocity was recorded at North Head at the mouth of the Columbia River, where it reached sixty miles per hour.
The Weather Bureau said Seattle will have occasional rain tonight and tomorrow and moderate southerly winds. Tonight will be cooler. Yesterday's maximum temperature was 65 degrees and this morning's low, 58.

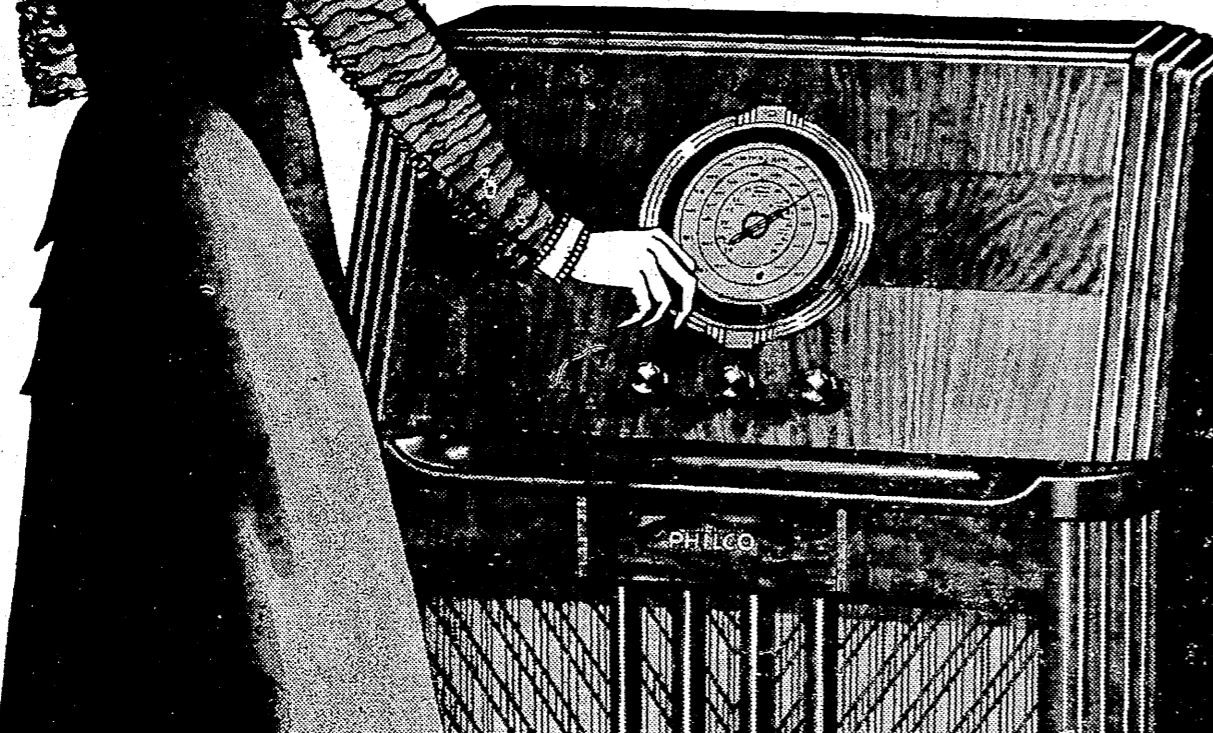
Trial Put Off In Anrooney Slaying
Hearing of the second-degree murder charge against Mrs. Marlene Collier, 23 years old, scheduled for Monday, was stricken from the trial calendar yesterday by presiding Superior Judge Roger J. Meakin.
Deputy Prosecutor Edward B. Henry, who said the action was agreeable both to state and defense counsel, reported that the case would be reset later.
Henry said the delay was caused by the absence from the city of Dr. Gale E. Wilson, county autopsy surgeon.
Mrs. Collier is charged with the slaying August 2 of Fred Anrooney, operator of a Renton tavern where she was a waitress. She told police she shot in self-defense.

INTERBAY GROUP ASKS PLAYFIELD
The Seattle Park Board today took under consideration the possibility of leasing a plot at 13th Avenue West and West Dravus Street, owned by the school district, for a playground for Interbay children.
A delegation of mothers in the district told the board their children have no suitable place to play.
A request for a playground for Pleasant Valley children, at 34th Avenue West and West Ray Street, was continued for further investigation. Before the property can be purchased from King County for \$1, claims of \$9,000 against it must be satisfied, the board was notified.

Two Japanese Blame War On Chinese
Japan's position in the current Chinese-Japanese conflict was defended yesterday afternoon by Kenji Ito, Seattle attorney, and Isaku Okamoto, consul for Japan in Seattle, in talks before the Seattle League of Women Voters.
After prefacing his talk with the remark: "Public opinion in the United States is strongly anti-Japanese," Ito said he "doubt about it." He placed the blame for the undeclared war on the Chinese.
"The trouble in Shanghai did not start with the shooting of a Japanese officer and his aide by the Chinese," Ito said. "That act precipitated the trouble." The Chinese brought the conflict from North China into the Shanghai area."
Okamoto told the women's organization that Japan constantly has attempted to avoid conflicts with China.

20,000th Plane To Span Continent
Transport planes of United Air Lines flying along the midcontinent airway tonight will record the twenty thousandth coast-to-coast passenger plane trip over that route, setting an international record for long-distance scheduled passenger plane operations.
A single-engine mail plane carrying two passengers completed the first coast-to-coast passenger schedule in 1927 through connections at Chicago of Boeing Air Transport and National Air Transport, later merged into United Air Lines.
The 1927 flight required thirty-three hours and fourteen refueling stops. The fare was 15 cents a mile. Tonight's anniversary flight is scheduled to take fifteen hours. Fares are one-third of ten years ago.

Tuberculosis Group To Discuss Seals
Mrs. Bethesda B. Buchanan, executive secretary of the Washington State Tuberculosis Association, and Dr. Donald G. Evans, director of the State Department of Public Health, will speak at a meeting of the board of trustees of the Anti-Tuberculosis League of King County at a luncheon meeting to be held at 11:30 o'clock tomorrow at the Y. W. C. A. Trustees will discuss plans for the 1937 Seattle and state Christmas seal sale.
Newman H. Clark, league president, pointed out today that 871 persons have died from tuberculosis in Seattle and King County during the past three years, and urged support in the sale which begins November 26.

Boat Float Approved
Establishment of a float for small craft at the end of West Barton Street near the Fauntleroy ferry dock was approved today by the Board of Public Works. The float was asked by the West Seattle Commercial Club.

Board O. K.'s Tram Wages
Details of a new wage scale for Municipal Street Railway operators were approved today by the Board of Public Works. The scale is based on the decision of the City Council to pay street car men \$150 a month maximum for 175 hours work.
