FLYER'S WIDOW WINS \$37,500

SPOKANE, Tuesday, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Possibility that a United States Supreme Court test might develop from the Livermore-Northwest Airlines suit here was seen today by court attaches after a Superior Court jury had awarded Mrs. Lorna Livermore a judgment of \$37,500 against the airline. Mrs. Livermore had asked \$75,000.

Mrs. Livermore sued the company for the death of her husband, Joe Livermore, pilot who was killed while flying a Northwest mail plane from Missoula, Mont., to Spokane the night of December 18, 1936.

The case was believed here to be the first in the nation where an air line was charged with negligence in the death of one of its pilots.

The company was charged with laxness in relaying information to the pilot as he was flying westward, and with failure to assist him sufficiently when he was lost over Elk River, Idaho, shortly before he crashed near Kellogg.

Japanese Asks Understanding In Asian War

The Rev. Dr. Yutaka Minaguchi Japanese pastor, said yesterday in an address to members of the Optimist Club, that a Chinese victory in the present Sino-Japanese war would not result in peace.

"Some people say that if Japanese goods were boycotted the war would be over in twenty-four hours," Dr. Minaguchi said. "But even if the Japanese should lose, there would be counter-attacks and the goal of peace would not be attained."

Dr. Minaguchi appealed to the American people to understand the situation of the two nations instead of taking sides.

WOODRING URGES LIMIT ON PLANES

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Chairman May, Democrat, Kentucky, of the House military affairs committee, said today Secretary of War Woodring had told the committee he favored placing a top limit on the number of planes the Army Air Corps may acquire under President Roosevelt's \$552,000,000 defense program.

The secretary, accompanied by Gen. Main Craig, Army chief of staff, and members of the Army General Staff, gave the committee confidential details about the new armament program at a closed meeting lasting more than two hours.

May said afterward he would start public hearings tomorrow morning with Maj. Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of the Army Air Corps, as the first witness.

FIVE PERILED IN BLAST AND FIRE

Leo McCombs, new north district fire marshal for King County, began his new duties last night when an \$8,000 fire destroyed the home of H. A. Medgard at 517 N. 148th Street.

McCombs today pointed to the blaze, which endangered the lives of five persons after a furnace from burns received in an automobile-trailer fire, caused by an oil stove December 30. His divorced wife, Margaret, lives in Puyallup.

Completely Destroyed
Only the chimney and a stone fireplace of the home stood after the flames burned themselves out before the eyes of Mr. and Mrs. Medgard, their two sons, Lawrence and Harry, and a friend, Wayne S. Bateman.

The Medgards and Bateman escaped through a rear door when the explosion rocked the house on its foundations. Flames enveloped the front portion of the building within a few minutes.

McCombs estimated damage to the building at \$6,000 and to the furnishings at \$2,000. Only about 25 per cent of the loss was covered by insurance.

Trailer Fire Proves Fatal

Cable Stealer Sentenced

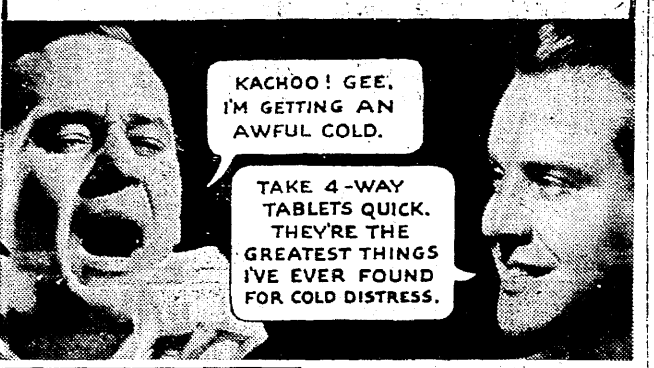
