

STATE GRANGERS BOARD SETS 13 TO REELECT KING MINIMUM TERMS

VANCOUVER, Wash., Wednesday, June 14.—(AP)—Ervin E. King, master of the Washington State Grange the past six years, was unopposed for a fourth two-year term as elections began this morning at the fiftieth annual convention here. Nominations had been closed. All other positions were contested. The elections were expected to last all day.

Minimum terms were set by the State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles in Olympia yesterday for thirteen persons sentenced to the state reformatory from King County, according to the Associated Press.

In announcing the sentences, William J. Wilkins, board chairman, said about 25 per cent of youths sent to the reformatory from throughout the state were involved in automobile cases and about 75 per cent of the inmates there are from broken homes.

Prisoners from King County and sentences were: Sid L. Roccia, statutory offense, eighteen months; Orvil R. Larson, arson, two years; Harlan Bates, burglary, three and one-half years; Norman Wick, assault, five years; Lisle A. Westad, arson, five years; Gale Olsen, burglary, two years; James R. Higgins, burglary, five years; William Nanko, burglary, three and one-half years; Harrison Green, burglary, two years; Jerry Cameron, automobile theft, twenty-one months; Aaron Wickstrom, burglary, two years; Sigfred L. Hill, burglary, two years, and Thomas Johnson, burglary, three years.

Forty squealing Japanese show girls bounced off a train at the Union Station yesterday afternoon for their last appearance in the United States at the Music Hall Theatre here Saturday and Sunday.

The Japanese maidens are not equivalent to American chorus girls, according to Tom C. Girton of San Francisco, who managed their appearance at both world fairs as well as in several other American cities. Girton said the girls are students at the famous Takarazuka School for Girls, which controls most of the Japanese theatres.

Now ranging from 16 to 23 years, the girls entered the school when 12 years old and after four to seven years of study they were sent out to sing, dance and act in the theatres controlled by the wealthy families.

None of the girls can speak English, but through an interpreter, the star of the show, whom Girton called the "Japanese Jeanette MacDonald," made it known that she "very much" likes America. The star, Fukuko Saso, also said American men are "very nice."

Between now and their week-end performances, the girls are being entertained by Seattle Japanese. They also plan to make several sightseeing tours, including one tomorrow to Mount Rainier. They will sail from Seattle Tuesday on the Japanese liner Hikawa Maru.

She attended Mills College on a trustee scholarship and entered the University here as a sophomore. She is a member of Pi Beta Phi, social sorority, and recently was elected to Phi Sigma Iota, Romanic language honorary.

NEW YORK, Wednesday, June 14.—(AP)—Eleanor Holm, the former Olympic swim star, flashed a new diamond-studded platinum ring inscribed "I love you" today and disclosed that her divorce finally has come through.

The news, she said, came in a telephone call from her ex-husband, Art Jarrett, radio singer, who told her: "I'd like to wish you luck."

Miss Holm said his wish would come true September 19, when she will become Mrs. Billy Rose, wife of the Broadway showman in whose Aquacade at the New York World's Fair she is featured—just twenty-four hours after Rose gets his final decree from Fanny ("He Was My Man") Brice, the "Baby Snooks" of radio.

"We'll have a small, quiet wedding in New York," Rose said, "and when the fair closes we're going to retire to a farm in New York State."

TREASURY TO DO BUYING FOR U. S.

MAN HURLS SELF AT MOVING TRAM

In an attempt to dive under a moving street car on the West Seattle trestle, Pete Bilecki, 45 years old, struck his head on the rear steps and suffered a severe head injury at 8:58 o'clock this forenoon.

He was taken to Harborview County Hospital. His condition is serious.

Bilecki broke from the grasp of Fire Capt. R. F. Isham to make the jump.

First Attempt Failed

Isham had held the man after Bilecki had been dragged forcibly from in front of another street car.

At 8:25 o'clock E. E. Hagen, operator of an inbound Fauntleroy car, was forced to bring his trolley to a halt on the trestle at 11th Avenue Southwest and West Spokane Street when Bilecki refused to move from where he was sitting in the path of the car.

Hagen and Isham, a passenger in the car, removed Bilecki and Isham agreed to detain him until Hagen could reach First Avenue South and call police.

Dives at Rear Wheels

A few minutes later, as an inbound West Seattle car approached, Bilecki tried to wrench himself from Isham's grasp and plunge in front of it. Isham blocked the first attempt, but Bilecki slipped from his grasp an instant later and dived toward the back wheels. He was saved from plunging underneath the trolley when his head hit the rear step.

Patrolmen Arthur Gunterman and Conrad Simmons arrived just after the leap. They said Bilecki told them he lived near the scene, but that he received his mail at the home of a friend at 3825 22nd Ave. S. W. He refused to tell why he tried to dive under the cars.
