

JAPANESE SEES ALIEN-FREE CHINA

Japan appreciates Germany's need of a non-aggression pact with its former enemy, Soviet Russia. Dr. Kenzo Takayanagi, professor of international law at Tokyo University...

Germany was in danger of being encircled by the Allies," Dr. Takayanagi said. "Russia, in turn, saw the pact as a device to divide the Orient, Russia might like to conclude a treaty with Japan that would drive a wedge between England and Japan."

"It is best for Japan to come to terms with all powers. If Soviet Russia doesn't infiltrate her propaganda into Japan and China, it would be to everyone's advantage to settle our differences," he said.

Japanese college students look upon the Far Eastern war not as an assault on the Chinese nation but as a desperate battle to annihilate Generalissimo Chiang, two of the students in the party said today.

"We feel the Chinese are being exploited by the generalissimo in the same way the Germans are being whipped into conflict by Hitler," said Tonoa Senda, student at the Tokyo University of Commerce...

Manosuke Suzuki, studying economics in Tokyo's Waseda University, said Chiang Kai-shek was bitterly prejudiced against Japan, yet was leaving China open to an economic invasion by countries like France and Great Britain...

Corcoran, Cohen Status Same FLEET TO GATHER FOR MANEUVERS

WASHINGTON, Thursday, Sept. 14.—President Roosevelt has announced that the status of Thomas Corcoran and Benjamin Cohen, administration attorneys, had not been changed by an executive order reorganizing the White House staff.

Corcoran is employed by the R. F. C. Cohen by the Power Policy Committee. Both have attracted attention as bill-phrasing consultants and contact men for the administration in its dealings with Congress.

Mr. Roosevelt's statement was made at a press conference during a discussion set off by mention of the so-called brain trust.

The brain trust, Mr. Roosevelt said, was a two-headed Corcoran-Cohen banshee which had been created and then finally laid to rest by the press.

High Court Upholds Berry's Conviction (Continued From Page One.) fense is a felony and was committed by Berry with the pliers as recited. So far as the law is concerned, each of the appellant co-conspirators inflicted the wounds on Baker and entertained the same intent as Dr. Berry, who committed, as he announced he intended to commit, a felony (mayhem) on the person of Baker.

Dr. Berry, prominent Olympia physician; James Reddick, 28, Olympia taxicab driver; and William K. McAloon, 50, former Montesano night marshal, also were sentenced to twenty years in prison on their first-degree assault convictions, and Robert H. Smith, 33, Brady, dairyman, was sentenced to ten years in prison on a second-degree assault conviction.

By a ruling of the attorney-general, the State Parole Board will determine the minimum terms. The majority opinion said: "We stand not agreed with the

argument on behalf of appellants to the effect that no matter what felonious purpose the pliers may have in mind the crime of kidnapping is absent unless he is seeking a ransom. The essence of the crime of kidnapping is the unlawful secret imprisonment; and what was the motive of Berry and his three friends in commission of the crime is comparatively unimportant."

As to the assault convictions, the majority opinion said: "Argument for reversal on the first three assault convictions is not sound. The complaining witness was permanently injured; however, his recovery from the injuries inflicted by appellants does not operate to save the offenders from conviction of assault in the first degree."

The attack on Baker occurred a year ago the night of August 19. Two men, armed with a pistol and a take arrest warrant, entered his home only a few blocks from the Capitol grounds, forced him into a car and drove away to a gravel pit east of Olympia. Baker testified he was beaten, tortured with a pair of pliers, threatened with mutilation and death.

Smith Saved Baker Smith, in testimony, was credited with having prevented Dr. Berry from carrying out an expressed intention to shoot Baker. Baker, at that time proprietor of an automobile agency here, fought free of his bonds when his torturers left and walked to town and notified authorities.

Dr. Berry was arrested shortly after Baker's return home. The three other defendants were taken into custody hours later. All have been in custody since.

The baldish 57-year-old physician readily admitted his part in the assault upon the former Coast Guardsman, said it was the result of Baker's attack upon Dr. Berry's young wife during a Fourth of July party sponsored by the Berrys at Mt. Rainier.
