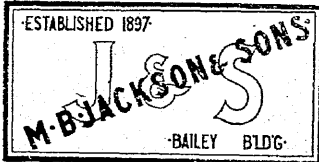

## THIEF BUSY WHILE OTHERS SLEEP

Goets Through Ballard Store in Absence of Proprietor at Church.

W. F. McLean Misses \$12.00 From Till When He Returns From Revival.

**BALLARD, Saturday, April 22.**—While in this town was enveloped in an atmosphere of peace and the business of the day was suspended for the public service, Friday same reverend who needed salvation more than the men and women who were seeking it crept into the store of W. F. McLean and H. S. Brode, professor of biology at Whitman College, and another professor to the University made the following announcement yesterday:

The biological department of the University of Washington announces work for the summer of 1905 at the marine station. The station is located on Friday Harbor, the county seat of San Juan, one of the island counties of Washington. The station is a little village of some 400 inhabitants, and is situated in a quiet harbor, an inlet of one of the many islands which surround the city. It is a quiet and restful spot, and yet is kept in touch with the outside world by mail steamers which arrive every other day from the cities of Seattle, Bellingham and Anacortes. It is a favorite location for marine work, for the region is rich both in plants and in animals. The view and surroundings are delightful; eastward the Cascades, Mount Baker towering above the lesser peaks; and to the west, and around the region are the dark, cool fir woods, covering hill and valley.

The university has leased a large building on the wharf, and this is headquarters of the business portion of the station. The building is fitted up as a laboratory for marine work, for the region is rich in plants and in animals. The view and surroundings are delightful; eastward the Cascades, Mount Baker towering above the lesser peaks; and to the west, and around the region are the dark, cool fir woods, covering hill and valley.

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## TO MAKE DISPLAY AT EXPOSITION TELLS POLICE HE WAS ROBBED

Western Washington to Have Fine Mining Exhibit at Portland.

From present indications the Western Cascade District will make a great showing in its mineral display at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. The exhibit will consist of several hundred tons in weight. Whatcom County miners have organized for the purpose of displaying the mineral resources of their section at the Portland exhibition, when it is expected that much foreign capital can be induced to invest in promising properties now lying idle for want of capital.

Renewed activity is being shown on mining properties in the vicinity of Index. Considerable machinery is being put in place and new on the development work will be pushed with vigor.

The fear expressed by many miners that the merger of the Washington smelters and refineries, into the trust, would prove a severe blow to the local mining industry, proves to be wholly unfounded, as the relations heretofore existing between miner and smelter remain as heretofore.

**Work at Wayside Mine.**  
Expensive permanent development work is now being carried on at the Wayside mine. The new shaft, which is now being sunk to the fifth level and by August 15 will be completed to the sixth level. Then a complete new double deck hoisting plant will be put in operation, thus greatly increasing the output of the mine. Steam power is to be superseded by electricity, the power being obtained from the Columbia River, about four miles above the mine. To complete this system, the Wayside Company has recently purchased the old Hubbard ranch, upon which is found a natural reservoir, from which the water supply will be directly taken. The Red Bird vein, owned by the company, also extends under this ground for a distance of more than 1,500 feet. It is expected that with the completion of the work on hand, the Wayside mine will ship from three to four carloads of ore daily.

**Building Smelter at Keller.**  
The Keller and Indiana consolidated smelter is in course of construction at Keller. Its water supply coming from the Sams Pool River, and the mill race, which will tap the vein on the property at a very low level.

## COUNT BORN AMBITIOUS

Anna Gould's Husband Aspires to Be French Ambassador at Washington.

**PARIS, Saturday, April 22.**—Count Boni de Castellane, the husband of Anna Gould, is taking an unusually active interest in politics here. He is heard quite often in the chamber, mostly when foreign politics is being debated, and his remarks are often greeted with applause. There are many here who believe that the Count is preparing to enter the diplomatic service and might eventually become French ambassador to Washington.

Recent French newspapers have lately quite often contained articles on foreign political subjects from Count Boni de Castellane. He is a driving force in the French party in the city. Hon. & Barley Company to work in its fields and a petition was quickly circulated asking the company to discontinue the Orientals. Frye, head of the department of botany at the state university, it is stated that the survey will be conducted by Prof. H. S. Brode, professor of biology at Whitman College, and another professor to the University made the following announcement yesterday:

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## HERVEY ESSER SAYS THREE MEN HELD HIM UP FOR \$80.

## MUST NOT FULFIL THREAT

Court Orders J. B. Goddard Not to Sell Any Property or Stock in the Income Company.

John B. Goddard, formerly a preacher of the gospel, now president and general manager of the Mutual Income and Investment Company, was made defendant in a suit brought for divorce by Alice Goddard in the superior court yesterday. The abandonment of the wife, February 23 of this year and cruel treatment extending over a much longer period are the specific allegations upon which the wife depends to secure a legal separation. The woman averred that her husband had been guilty of adultery and started any such proceedings that he would dispose of all his property and interests in the Mutual Income and Investment Company and that he was obtaining a restraining order prohibiting him from disposing of any stock in the Income Company and from taking any other holdings until after the case is heard.

Goddard obtained considerable notoriety through the fact that he was the prosecuting witness against "Kid" Preston, who is now awaiting a sentence of four years in the penitentiary for entering the Goddard house last night and holding up Goddard at the point of a gun.
