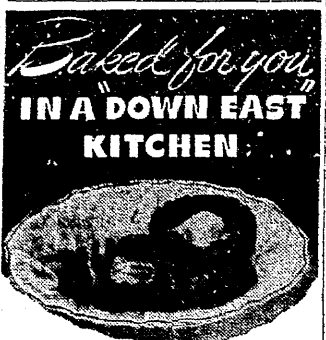

**BRITISH, NAZIS SHELL CONVOYS**

DOVER, Friday, Oct. 25.—(AP)—British pilots bombed the French coast heavily for nearly an hour tonight, covering the passage of a British convoy after long-range artillery on both sides of the Channel had been in action.

During the afternoon British guns fired on a small German convoy in the Straits, a smoke screen obscuring the result.

Tonight, the German artillery answered with a like bombardment of a British convoy, and the British guns roared again. Then the R. A. F. attacked.

(A direct hit on a British destroyer was scored today by a German plane in an attack on a convoy off the east coast of England, informed sources said tonight in Berlin.)

Great sheets of flame lit up the cloudy sky and the glare reached all the way across the Channel to the English shore.

While the artillery roared about dusk, German planes launched a mass attack upon the British convoy and its barrage balloons. There was a sharp battle, as every ship returned the fire with all guns. The noise increased when British fighter planes joined the engagement.

German planes dropped some thirty bombs around the ships. No direct hit was reported but some might have been struck by splinters.

threatened by the American Legion and other groups in an effort to get them to repudiate their signatures.

Browder complained that removal of the Communist Party from the ballot was approved by Supreme Court Justice William H. Murray, although four times as many signatures were acquired than the legal minimum of 50,000.

Producing a copy of the petition, Browder said that it listed the words "Communist Party" in plain letters which would make it impossible for signers not to be aware of what they were doing.

In Green County, he said, 160 out of 200 signers questioned in connection with the court ruling had testified that they did not know what they were signing.

"Clearly these people had all been intimidated and brought into court under the threat that their livelihood would be lost," Browder said. "We could not get any more evidence than you could in a Hitler election in Germany," he added.

Sol A. Rosenblatt, counsel for the Democratic National Committee, emphatically denied the assertion.

"We want nothing to do with Mr. Browder, or any of his kind," Rosenblatt shouted.

Asserting that his party had complied with state laws, Browder said it was his conclusion that the Democrats wished to force the Communists to do what he said they had done voluntarily in 1938—support the Democratic ticket.

"That's rather an unjustified conclusion," observed Senator Gillette, Democrat, Iowa.

"Politics is based on assumptions," Browder replied, "and the assumption that Communist votes would be impossible of going to Willkie and therefore would go to Roosevelt."

Browder said the Communists cast 106,000 votes in New York in 1938.

**Reserves to Be 'Veterans' Upon Arrival at Camp**

When the 11 officers and 250 men of the 11th Battalion, Marine Corps Reserve in Seattle, are inducted into active service next month at San Diego, Calif., they will be greeted like veterans and not as newcomers, Lieut. Col. Emmett W. Skinner of Washington, D. C., assistant to the director of the Marine Corps Reserves, told officers of the unit last evening.

The high-ranking officer was guest of the battalion officers at the Washington Athletic Club. During a dinner meeting he told them that preparations have been made at the Corps base at San Diego to accommodate them.

"There is one thing you must expect," Colonel Skinner said, "and that is that you must undergo a hardening-up process. You will be with men who have been in the Corps for years. But the actual induction into service will not be embarrassing. Each of you will be 'one of the fellows.' You will be as much a part of the Marine Corps as men who have been in it for years."

Maj. C. H. Baldwin, battalion commander, spoke proudly of the men in his outfit.

"Our battalion represents a cross-section of the highest type of citizens in the state," he told Colonel Skinner. "They are high school graduates, business men and men from various trades, all of whom have volunteered to serve their country."

Major Baldwin likewise praised Lieut. Col. Prentice Geer, U. S. M. C., inspector-instructor, who has helped train the battalion.

Capt. G. McGuire Pierce, battalion adjutant, said the 11th Battalion is one of nine Pacific Coast Marine Corps Reserve units which will report to San Diego next month and is one of the twenty-three throughout the nation which is entering active service. The battalion will leave Seattle by train at 9:15 o'clock the morning of November 7.

Colonel Skinner was to leave Seattle today to meet officers of other reserve units in this area.

**ITALIANS BOMB TOWNS ON NILE**

ROME, Friday, Oct. 25.—Italian bombers attacked numerous places in the Nile Valley, which Egyptians regard as their real homeland, and Italian troops came off best in three clashes with British motor units in Egypt and Sudan, the high command said today.

Port Said, at the Mediterranean end of the Suez Canal, an air field at Catbhour, northwest of Cairo, and defense works at Aboukir, fourteen miles east of Alexandria, all in the Nile Valley, were bombed and fires were caused "everywhere," said the communique.

Except for a few raids against military objectives along the Suez Canal, Cairo and Alexandria, the Italians previously have refrained from attacks against the Nile Valley proper, announcing they were not waging war against the Egyptians but against the British in Egypt.

It was off Aboukir Bay that Britain's Lord Nelson smashed the French fleet of Napoleon in 1798 in one of the famous naval battles of history, cutting him off from reinforcement and ultimately forcing his withdrawal from Egypt.

British Again Inflict Losses in Sudan Fighting

CAIRO, Friday, Oct. 25.—(AP)—A British patrol inflicted casualties on an Italian unit and put it to flight in an engagement outside Kassala, in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, the British command asserted today.

It was the second British success reported in this region in as many days.

**Young Scavotto Gets Post In Warner's Office**

Prosecutor B. Gray Warner this afternoon announced the appointment of Donald Victor Scavotto, who was inducted as an attorney earlier in the day, as a civil deputy prosecutor.

Scavotto, 23 years old, son of City Councilman James Scavotto, has served for three years as a clerk in the prosecutor's office, while completing his law course at the University of Washington.

Mrs. Margaret Butterfield, a nurse, 921 18th Ave., who testified Superior Court that her husband tossed utensils and food about their kitchen because he did not like her cooking, this afternoon was awarded an interlocutory divorce decree by Presiding Judge Donald A. McDonald.

Mrs. Butterfield said her spouse, Allson E. Butterfield, failed to support her adequately after their marriage in May, 1934. Butterfield, a truck driver, did not contest the action.

**U. S.-Born Japanese Are Declared Loyal**

American-born Japanese would remain loyal to the United States in case of war even if the United States should disown them, James Y. Sakamoto, American-born Japanese editor and editor of a Japanese newspaper in Seattle, yesterday told the members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Sakamoto said Japanese born in this country are taught by their parents that loyalty to the nation of their birth is the higher essence of ethics. The editor explained that the Japanese-American Citizens' League was organized in 1930 to further this loyalty and to make members better citizens. He said the league now has 10,000 members. Sakamoto said he hoped and prayed that the United States would not become involved in the present world crisis.

Miss Barrie asked "reasonable" alimony and attorney fees and re-manded the court that Barrymore is receiving a \$1,000 a week allowance from a receiver named to conserve his assets.
