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BROKERS STOP WAR POLICIES

A Seattle firm did a landslide business for a few hours this forenoon in selling war and bombardment insurance, but was notified at noon by the national company it represents to discontinue accepting applications.

D. K. MacDonald, president of Carter, MacDonald & Co., insurance brokers, said he was instructed by the New York office of the war and bombardment insurance firm to withdraw all acceptance of such policies, and that the order applies to all Pacific Coast cities.

Lloyd's of London still was accepting applications, but a stop order from that firm also was expected.

No more insurance on war or bombardment damage will be written on the Pacific Coast until national companies and the government determine some new basis for issuance, MacDonald was notified.

Seattle property owners, "from small dwelling owners to shipyard operators," deluged several insurance firms before the withdrawal order.

"The telephone's been ringing all morning and the office is full of people wanting the policies," one executive said. "We are writing insurance every minute."

Since last Thursday the rates had jumped six times. Policies were written only for "cash on the line."

Long-Distance Telephone Lines 'Snowed Under'

Long-distance telephone communications to and from Seattle since yesterday were carrying "a tremendous load," it was reported by Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company officials.

"While we have been preparing for something like this," one said, "we are swamped with calls. We are calling down all the operators we can get."

Many of the calls were from service men reporting for duty or notifying friends and relatives they were leaving; civilians calling veteran and civil-defense organizations to volunteer for assistance, and persons calling newspapers and broadcasting stations for information on war developments.

Plane Drops Word Of War to Arnold

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., Monday, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of the Army Air Corps, was hunting quail with Donald Douglas, airplane manufacturer, near here yesterday when Japan declared war.

Pilot James Camp of the sheriff's Aero Squadron flew into the hills, sighted the general and dropped a note to him. Immediately, General Arnold returned to Bakersfield and departed by plane for March Field.

War Orders Stop Japanese Travel

Seattle Japanese were being barred from travel on airplanes, busses and trains today on orders of the War Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Officials of transportation firms said that all Japanese are not to be sold tickets until their citizenship has been established. Japanese in uniforms, they said, however, are not to be questioned.

All Military Posts Closed to Civilians

SAN FRANCISCO, Monday, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Headquarters of the Army's Ninth Corps Area issued this order today:

Henceforth all entrances to all military posts in the Ninth Corps Area will be closed to civilians, except those on official business. The order was issued by Maj. Gen. J. L. Benedict, commanding the IX Corps, which includes all the western states.

American-Born Japanese Loyal, Editor Asserts

His people are 'on the spot'

American-born Japanese "will remain unwaveringly loyal to the United States," James Y. Sakamoto, leader of the second-generation group in Seattle, said last night.

Sakamoto, blind editor of The Japanese-American Courier, added that the 8,000 American-born Japanese in the state will be the "first to uncover any saboteurs" among pro-Japanese elements.

"I don't look for any undue violence against us," Sakamoto said. "There may be a little hysteria—an occasional outburst up and down the Coast. But I have a lot of confidence in American fair play. Americans are fair to the underdog. And the American-born Japanese are in that spot now."

Sakamoto helped organize the Japanese-American Citizens' League in Seattle in 1930.

The league issued a statement last night to President Roosevelt, pledging allegiance to the United States. The pledge was made "without any reservation whatsoever," Sakamoto said.

The league was founded here with nine chapters and less than 1,000 members. It now has fifty-four chapters and 15,000 members throughout the United States, with the largest chapters on the Pacific Coast.

The editor estimated there are about 6,000 Japanese aliens in the state. Most of them, although born in Japan, have spent half their lives in the United States, he said. Under immigration laws applying to Orientals, they cannot become citizens. Children born to them in this country, however, are American citizens.

Loyalty to U. S. Urged
The Courier, in its Thursday edition this week, will call for Japanese in America to remain loyal to the United States, Sakamoto said.

"We also will ask this nation to prosecute the war to the earliest possible victory."
"The main thing is national unity and we will ask the Japanese to do their part by remaining loyal and calm and doing everything they can to help win this war for the United States."

Whidby Island Base Vital, Says Wallgren

WASHINGTON, Monday, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Senator Wallgren, Democrat, Washington, views the Navy's development on the northern part of Whidby Island in Puget Sound as a defense base of prime strategic importance, a statement issued by his office said today.

Wallgren, said in the statement that the planned defenses for the Sound area would give it "as impregnable a defense as any part of the United States." He said the contracts already had been let by the Navy for work totaling more than \$3,000,000 on the island.

GUARDS PATROL CANAL LOCKS

The Coast Guard today had inaugurated a 24-hour patrol at each end of the Government Locks, leading from Puget Sound to the Lake Washington Ship Canal, and every craft passing through the locks was scrutinized closely.

The United States Engineers' office said, however, that there has been no curtailment of the use of the locks. Pleasure craft as well as others can pass through, subject to the regulations previously in effect.

Chief of these regulations is the one which prohibits any person from boarding or leaving a boat in the locks or at either end.

Turpin Awaiting News of Stepson

Evert Turpin of Seattle, member of the Railroad Retirement Board, anxiously awaited war news from Honolulu yesterday to learn of the safety of his stepson, R. D. Mitchell, 21 years old, a gunner aboard the battleship West Virginia, which one news report said had been sunk in Pearl Harbor.

Turpin resides at the Claremont Apartment Hotel. His stepson enlisted four years ago in Kansas City, Mo., and the young man's services was to have been concluded last September.

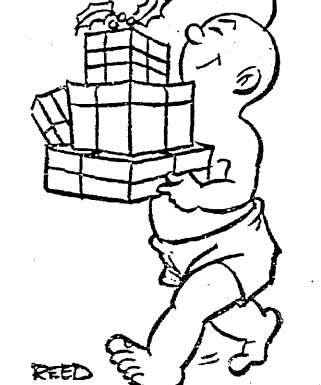
