U. S. MAY DOUBLE OUTPUT OF ARMS

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Budget Director Harold D. Smith today called in ranking Army and Navy officers to prepare the war budget, and the Supply Priorities and Allocations Board demanded a "victory program" which probably will double the nation's armament production.

Smith made no estimate of the projected expenditure, but in other quarters estimates ranged from \$33,000,000,000 to \$50,000,000,000 a year.

It seemed generally agreed that the budget for the first year of the new war will approximately double the peak spending of \$18,522,000,000 in the last year of the first World War.

\$3,000,000,000 a Month
 Defense spending had reached \$1,500,000,000 a month on the eve of the Japanese attack. By means of 24-hour production in vital munitions plants, the government hoped to boost this pace to \$2,000,000,000 a month before summer and to \$3,000,000,000 a month eventually.

The size of the budget being prepared will depend upon the prospects for this step-up, rather than upon any predetermined goal, officials explained.

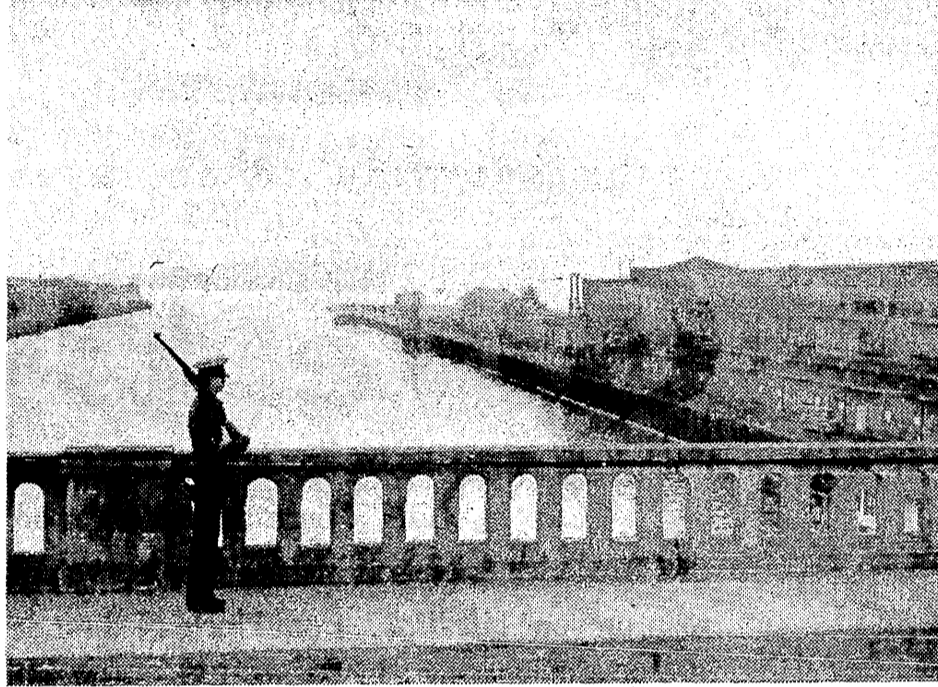
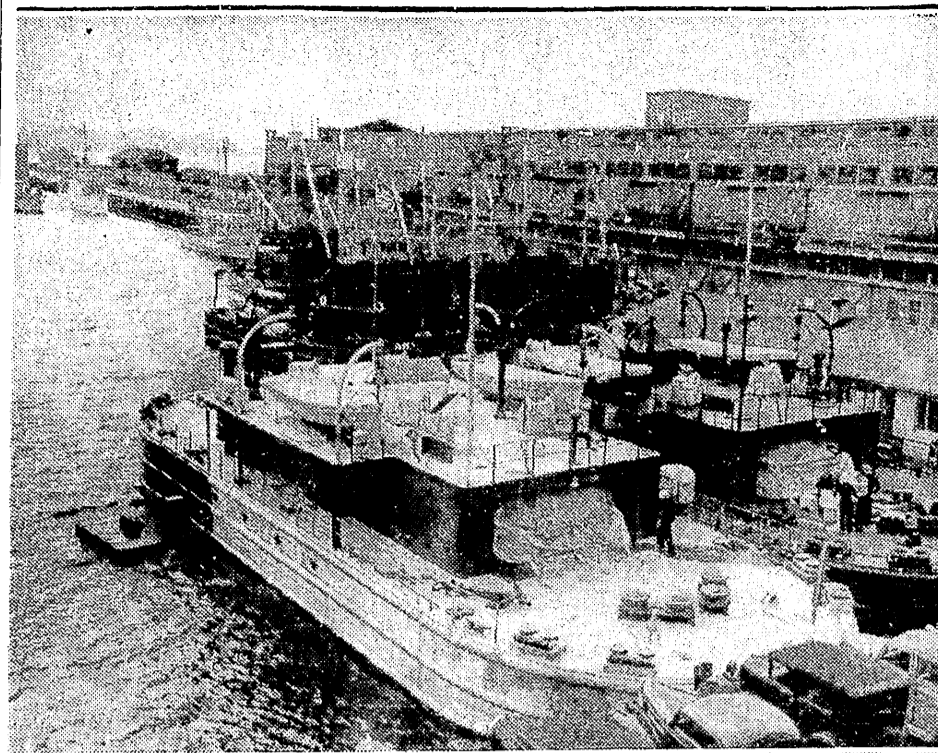
Details of how money will be spent may be scarce in the war budget, for military reasons.

Huge Program Likely
 But the Supply Priorities and Allocations Board left no doubt that the effort would be all-out, the expense heavy. The board declared that "every activity of our national life and our civilian economy" must be marshalled in an all-the-way victory program.

The board mentioned no figures, but other defense officials said the victory program called for a \$150,000,000,000 outlay.

Kin of Emperor To Direct Defense

TOKYO, Tuesday, Dec. 9.—(Official radio picked up by Associated Press)—Emperor Hirohito's brother-in-law, Gen. Prince Naruhiko, Higashikuni, has been appointed commander in chief of National Defense Headquarters, it was announced today.

He succeeds Gen. Otzoo Yamada and will retain his post also as supreme war conciliator.

It also was announced that Lieut. Gen. Asazaburo Kobayashi has been appointed chief of staff of General Headquarters, replacing Lieut. Gen. Torashiro Kawabe, who had held that post only since September 12.

A postage stamp auction was held in Havana to raise war relief funds.

Harborview Gets Tags Ready To Identify Raid Patients

Harborview County Hospital today was getting several thousand identification tags ready for use in the event of air raids.

The tags are ordinary heavy-paper express tags, but hospital attendants were putting longer strings on them so they may be tied to a patient's wrist.

When the patient enters the hospital, a clock stamp will record the time of admittance and a medication stamp will record what preliminary treatment he has been given.

Harborview went on a war-time basis last night. All lights were out except in the operating and delivery rooms, which were heavily screened, and except for faint blue bulbs which shone dimly in the halls and wards.

Fifty emergency cots were installed and the residence staff and nurses were put "on call" in a similar fine imposed along with a sentence of 10 years in prison. Both men have appealed.

Doctors and nurses carried flashlights, but the lights were dimmed with blue paper.

George Browne Pays \$20,000 Racket Fine

NEW YORK, Tuesday, Dec. 9.—(AP)—The \$20,000 fine imposed on George E. Browne, resigned head of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (A. F. of L.), when he was sentenced to eight years in prison for violation of the federal Anti-Racketeering Act, was paid in cash today by his attorney.

William Bioff, West Coast union leader, convicted with Browne of extorting more than \$500,000 from motion picture producers under strike threats, has not yet paid a similar fine imposed along with a sentence of 10 years in prison. Both men have appealed.
