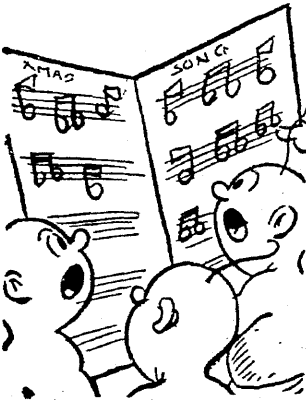
Originally, Congressman Warren G. Magnuson was to be the main speaker, but he was summoned back to the national capital when war broke out.

### Civilian Pilots' Meeting Called

All civilian airplane pilots have been asked by the Seattle Unit, Aircraft Owners and Pilots' Association, to meet at 7 o'clock tonight in the Mayflower Hotel to discuss reinstatement of licenses and civilian defense activity, according to Dr. Herbert L. Hartley, president of the group.

The Civil Aeronautics Authority has canceled all private pilot licenses in the United States and can reinstate them only upon receiving proof of citizenship. C. A. A. inspectors will attend the meeting.

### Irish Meeting Canceled

A meeting of the American Friends of Ireland, scheduled for next Sunday night, has been canceled because of uncertainty of war conditions, officials of the group announced today.

### C. I. O. Council O. K.'s War

The Seattle Industrial Labor Union Council, affiliated with the Congress of Industrial Organizations, supports the declaration of war against Japan, Conrad Espe, president, said today.

### SMALL FIRE IN HOUGHTON YARD

Fire, which broke out at 9:30 o'clock last night in the tool room of the Lake Washington Shipyards, Inc., Houghton, did only a small amount of damage before it was extinguished, the Kirkland Fire Department said today.

The cause of the blaze was not determined, the department said. The company is building Navy vessels.

Two fires in sawdust piles on Harbor Island excited many citizens during the blackout early this morning. The fires were along 125th Avenue South, between the Seattle-Tacoma shipyards and the Fisher Flouring Mills.

The Fire Department was called at 5:45 o'clock this morning to put out the smoldering fires.

### City to Drop Old Rail Bill

A horse-and-buggy days ordinance no longer enforced in Seattle was in the process of being stricken from the books today.

The ordinance prohibited movement of railroad trains through the city at a pace in excess of six miles an hour.

Councilman David Levine has an ordinance that will allow 20-mile speeds across the street intersections where there are no overpasses or underpasses. The Council public safety committee today recommended Levine's bill for passage.

### Demo Meeting Off

Because of the war emergency, the meeting of the Seattle City-Wide Women's Democratic Club, Inc., scheduled for tomorrow evening in the Mirror room of the Olympic Hotel, has been postponed indefinitely. Mrs. Stella Buckley, president, announced today.

### 10 U. S. CITIZENS, 166 ALIENS HELD

Ten American citizens and 166 aliens, all of whom are accused of some form of subversive activity, were held today in the Immigration Service jail, 815 Airport Way, on orders of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The 176 persons, whom the F. B. I. classify as "enemies," include six American-born Japanese, two native Americans and two naturalized Germans. The breakdown of aliens is as follows: 116 Japanese, 28 Germans and two Italians.

H. B. Fletcher, agent in charge of the Seattle office of the F. B. I., said two women are among those held. Under the internal security program instituted by the F. B. I. when war first broke out in Europe, all suspicious persons were investigated and placed in three classes—those known to be dangerous, those about whom there is little doubt, and those who are merely suspected. Agents said nearly all of those interned here fall in the first two classifications.

It is expected that those being held will be given hearings later to determine disposition of their case.

### Pope to Broadcast Christmas Message

VATICAN CITY, Wednesday, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Pope Pius XII. will broadcast a Christmas Eve message during which he will impart the apostolic blessing to all Catholics, it was announced today.

The Pope will speak when he receives the College of Cardinals in its customary day-before-Christmas gathering. His message will be broadcast at 2:30 a. m. (Seattle time) on radio wavelengths of 49.96 and 19.84 meters.

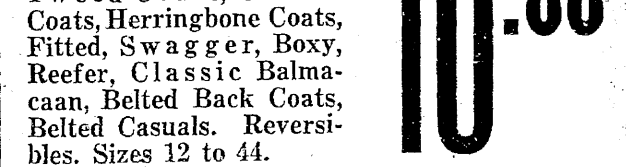
