TOKYO, Wednesday, Dec. 10.— (Official radio picked up by Associated Press.)—Loud-speakers shouted Japan's most tremendous news of war successes so far—the sinking of two of Britain's mighti-set country chips and the landing Arai said that his commission as

acknowledged by Britain but there was no indication of other loses to substantiate the Japanese report that Britain's newly massed naval strength in the Far East had been nullified.)

Boast of Supremacy

Japan already had boasted of naval supremacy of the Pacific after her Sunday air smash against the United States Fleet. In a virtual broadside of com

muniques which kept crowds gathered in front of radios and newspaper bulletin boards, the army and navy sections of the Imperial Headquarters: Said Japanese landing parties had

been set ashore successfully in the Philippines north of Manila in joint land-sea-air operations against Phil-ippine resistance; Declared that previously reported

occupation of the United States Pa-cific island of Guam had been con-firmed and that Japanese military and naval forces now were securely

and naval forces now were securely established there.

A British tug was reported sunk in Haiphong Bay.

A member of the navy press section of Imperial Headquarters asserted that "all Japanese aircraft carriers in the Pacific still are carrying out their tasks with full force" contrary to rumors abroad that one had been sunk. The communiques said Japan had lost not one warship.

one warship. Two Transports Lost

The Japanese acknowledged only The Japanese acknowledged only that two transports had gone down and two others were damaged, with no loss of life on any of them, and that 51 planes were missing, 13 army planes and 38 naval.

Wild excitement greeted the broadcast, cut into all Japanese networks, and Emperor Hirohito dispatched a message of congratulations to Adm. Isoroku Yamamoto, commander in chief of the com-

commander in chief of the combined fleets.

Capt. Hideo Hiraide, spokesman of the naval press section, urged restraint, however. He said at a national rally that Japan had smashed the main British and United States naval forces in the Pacific, but must be prepared to carry on the war for

Contrary to British and American expectations, Hiraide declared, the qualitative strength of the Japanese fleet had risen tremendously since the 1922 Washington conference, where, he said, Britain and the Uinted States forced on Japan an inferior (5-5-3) naval ratio in hopes of preventing a Japanese naval vic-tory.

'Let Actions Speak

But the smash on Pearl Harbor, the officer declared, has reversed the ratio and "the Japanese navy will continue to let actions speak in proving to the world the superiority of the Japanese navy." The Privy Council met in a 15-

minute plenary session with the Emperor, Prime Minister Gen. Hideki Tojo and other cabinet members present. (A radio report heard by C. B. S. in New York said an important foreign-policy deci-sion had been discussed in Tokyo and might be announced today.)

Turkey to Remain Neutral, Say Nazis






