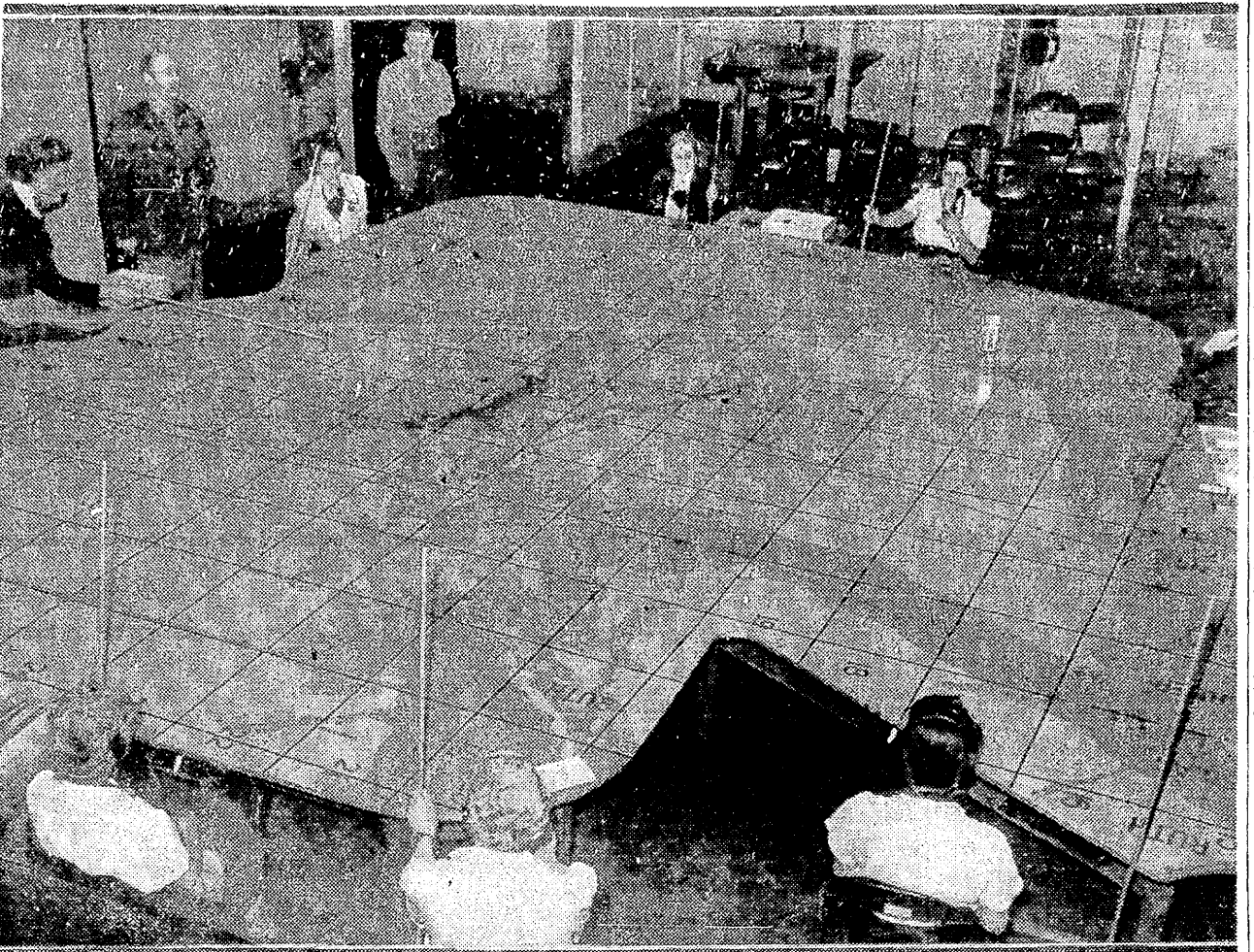


2,303 ALIENS SEIZED BY U. S.

Key West Naval Base Guarded in Blackout

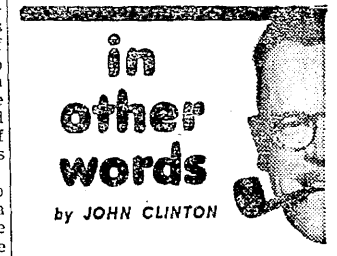
