

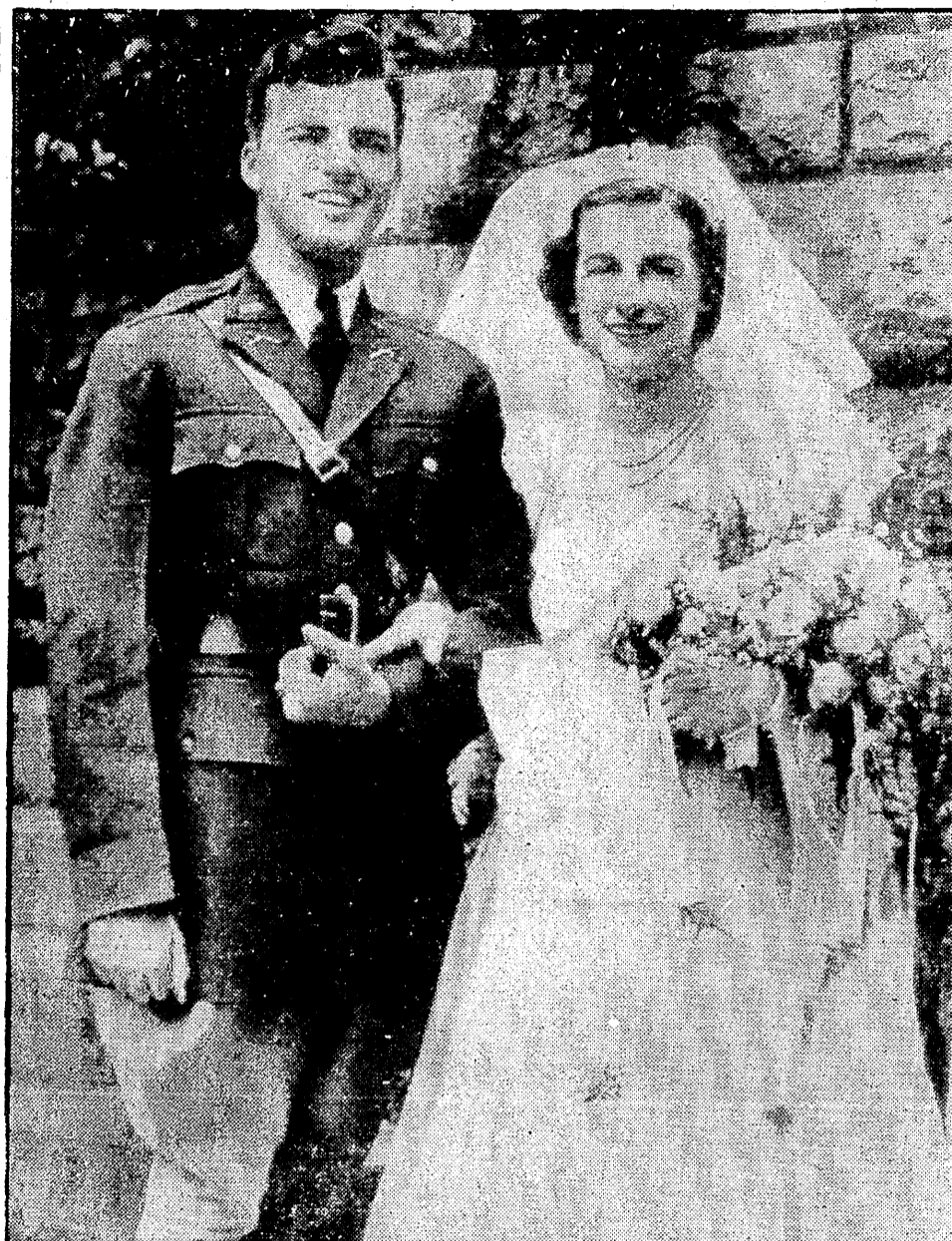

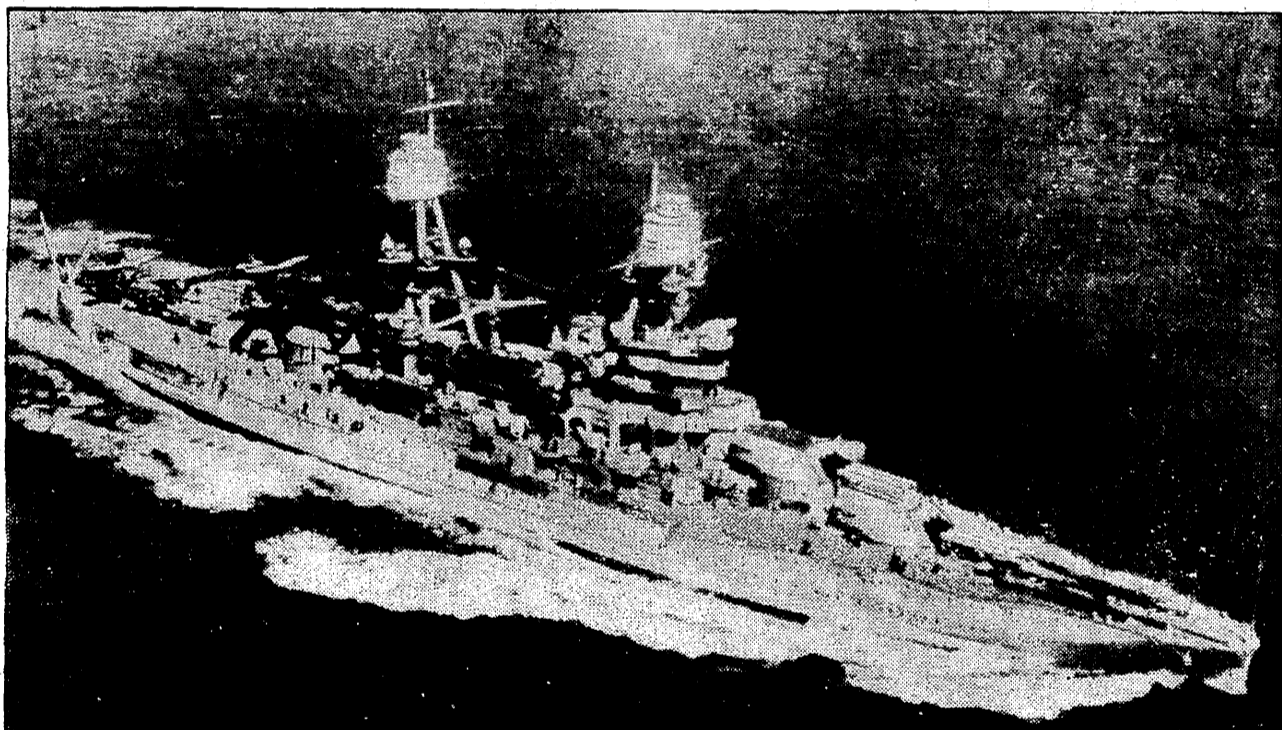

## Alien Japanese Ends Own Life

LOS ANGELES, Saturday, Dec. 13.—(AP)—After praying throughout the day, Nao Hamano, 45 years old, one of 432 alien Japanese arrested on suspicion of espionage, strangled herself in jail yesterday with her silk stockings, police said.

The woman had been in mental distress since her arrest at a rice-cake factory Thursday, officers said. On her person they found a \$3,000 Japanese war bond.

## Attempt Made To Cut Army Telephone

SAN FRANCISCO, Saturday, Dec. 13.—(AP)—An attempt to cut military telephone wires to an anti-aircraft post was disclosed yesterday. Federal officials said the person arrested for the act said he only wanted a stretch of the cop-

per wire to sell. He was to be charged with injuring government property. The man described himself as an itinerant farm laborer. Authorities said the man admitted trying to sever the wire, but whether he was successful and at what place the act was discovered were not disclosed.

## U. S. Newsmen Held in Rome

BERNE, Saturday, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A Swiss news agency dispatch from Rome yesterday said Italian authorities arrested six American correspondents in reprisal for the arrest of Italian newspaper men in the United States. The agency did not name those arrested. Ten other United States citizens were reported held.

WASHINGTON, Saturday, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Randolph Paul, New York attorney who has been a part-time tax adviser of the Treasury in recent years, assumed full-time status yesterday with the title of assistant to Treasury Secretary Morgenthau.

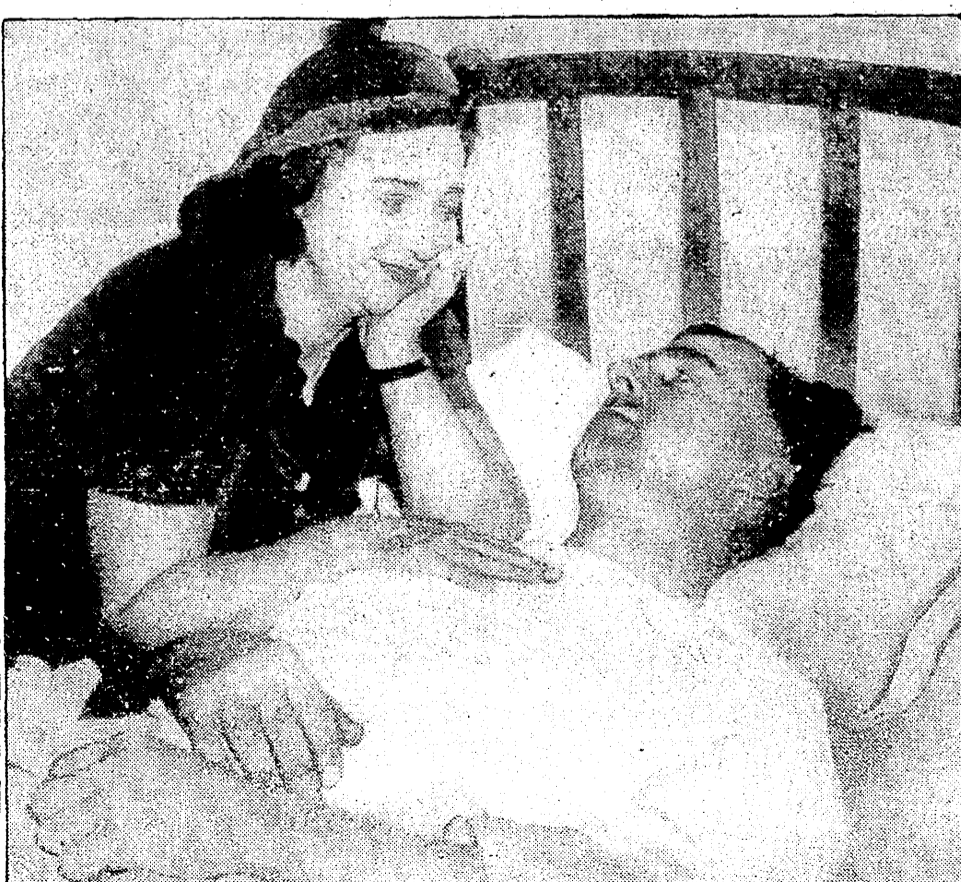
