

U. S. EASES CURB ON JAP FUNDS

The Treasury Department, having virtually completed the seizure of Japanese who are considered dangerous, has relaxed restrictions on Japanese financial transactions almost to a pre-war basis, the Associated Press reported from Washington, D. C., this afternoon.

Subject to requirements for reports, the Treasury removed all restrictions from financial transactions by Japanese nationals who have lived in this country since June 17, 1940. The only exception to this ruling is in the case of assets of Japanese businesses which have been seized since the war broke out.

\$100 Expenses Allowed Japanese who have come to this country since June 17, 1940, still must get special licenses from the Treasury to use any bank funds or other assets, except for the minimum \$100 a month permitted them for living expenses.

Federal Reserve Bank officials in Seattle said they have not received a copy of this new order that, in any event, it will not affect the status of Seattle's Japanese banks, which are in the hands of the Treasury Department. Withdrawals and deposits cannot be made, the officials said.

The banks virtually have been closed since the war started, although doors have been opened.

Some May Reopen The new order said that business owned by Japanese who have been in this country since June 17, 1940, may reopen unless Treasury agents have been placed in them to keep that shut.

At the outbreak of the war, the Treasury Department blocked all business transactions of Japanese nationals regardless of time of residence. Americans were prohibited from entering into financial transactions with nationals.

ALIENS HERE TO HAVE HEARINGS

Plans for the establishment in Seattle of an enemy alien hearing board, to determine whether aliens accused of subversive activities should continue to be held, were under way today.

The board, to consist of three members, will be appointed within the next few days by the United States attorney-general from a list of 10 persons recommended by United States District Judge John C. Bowen and United States Attorney J. Charles Dennis.

Power to Be Limited Power of the board will be limited to making recommendations to the attorney-general, who will determine finally whether the accused persons should be interned, paroled or released.

At present, 150 enemy aliens and eight American citizens, all accused of some form of subversive activity, are being held in detention quarters of the Immigration Service building, 115 Airport Way.

The eight American citizens will be given hearings before a United States commissioner to determine whether they should be held for the federal grand jury.

Hearings Secret The 150 aliens, including 119 Japanese, 29 Germans and two Italians, will be given secret hearings before the board.

Dennis said the hearings are not a matter of right, but are being granted in order to give the accused persons an opportunity to present facts in their own behalf. Dennis added that a relative or friend of the enemy alien may attend the hearing, but such a person will not be permitted to object to questions or make any argument concerning any phase of the proceeding or otherwise act as an attorney.

War Department's Job Dennis was informed that persons whom the attorney-general determines should be interned will be turned over to the War Department, which will arrange for his subsequent detention.

R. P. Bonham, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said certain relatives and friends of enemy aliens being detained will be permitted to visit the accused persons Tuesday and Friday afternoons.

Funeral services for William Spencer Pond, member of a pioneer Kansas family, veteran insurance man and widely respected 35 years, were set for today in Bonney-Watson Funeral Parlor, 1016 Broadway, at 10 a. m. Saturday after a short illness.

Mr. Pond, recently a resident of Burlington, King County, was born in Leavenworth, Kan., in 1856. His father and mother were Midwest pioneers, moving from Connecticut in 1856 as a part of the Connecticut-Kansas colony which was organized in the church of Henry Ward Beecher to help Kansas a free state.

In 1932 Mr. Pond came to the Pacific Coast, entering the life-insurance business in San Francisco and Portland, in 1931 he moved to Seattle to become vice president of the National Life Insurance Company of Vermont. He came to Seattle in 1936. He later became assistant manager of the Northern Life Insurance Company and had been active in that firm until his recent illness.

Mr. Pond was a member of the Life Underwriters' Association, the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, the M. C. A., and the Pilgrim Congregational Church, and a charter member of the Amphibian, Wayne Stone, Bakerfield, Calif., and Jay Stone, Fresno.

Before coming to Seattle, Mr. Stone lived in Vancouver, B. C., where he was general manager of a department store. Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen E. Stone of Fresno, Calif., his wife, Mrs. Gladys, and two sons, Grant Stone, both of Seattle, and two brothers, Wayne Stone, Bakerfield, Calif., and Jay Stone, Fresno.

Funeral services for Charles James Ross, who as manager of a cigar store in the White Building for more than 20 years, died Friday at his home, 425 1/2 Broadway, at 10 a. m. Saturday after a heart attack at his home at 216 W. Boston St. Born in Baltimore, Md., he lived in Seattle from 1911.
