

MAN ADMITS HE SHOT JAPANESE

Walter Credell, 45 years old, Negro, 1302 Yoster Way, confessed yesterday that he shot James M. Hara, Japanese proprietor of a drug store at 14th Avenue and Yester Way.

Credell, a pick-up truck operator at the Quartermaster Depot, confessed in a written statement to Capt. Clyde V. Dailey, head of the homicide squad.

Credell told Dailey that when he entered the drug store he was whistling "God Bless America." He declared Hara made a disparaging remark. Credell said he became angry and shot Hara with a .38-caliber revolver. Police said accounts given by witnesses did not bear out Credell's statement.

Credell also said that about two weeks ago his wife told him that she had been in the drug store and that Hara "didn't seem to want to wait on her."

Credell was arrested at 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning at East Marginal Way and Hudson Street by Detective Lieutenants M. J. Griffin and James Lawrence and Patrolmen Claude E. Rix and C. D. Norris. The revolver, from which one shot had been fired, was found in Credell's room.

Hara was recovering from a flesh wound yesterday in Columbus Hospital.

Major Conway Is Promoted To Lieut. Colonel

Promotion of Maj. Harold J. Conway of Seattle and Port Townsend to lieutenant colonel was announced yesterday by the War Department. Colonel Conway, an ordnance expert, is executive officer of the Ordnance Training Center at the Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland.

A graduate of Queen Anne High School in 1918, Colonel Conway was an engineering student at the University of Washington when he received an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point. Upon graduation from West Point, he was commissioned in the Coast Artillery. He was one of the first Army officers to become a professional engineer in aviation ordnance. In 1940 he served as ordnance officer of the Ninth Corps Area during extensive maneuvers in Western Washington.

Oregon Sits Up After Damaging Snow, Ice Storm

PORTLAND, Or., Saturday, Jan. 10.—(UP)—One of the worst snow and ice storms to strike Oregon in years had abated last night for military authorities to allow publication of the story.

The storm struck heavily through most of Western Oregon, causing traffic and communication interruptions, in some instances for several days. Power lines crashed from the weight of ice formed when snow changed into freezing rain.

Automobile accidents were numerous, resulting in at least three deaths. Damage to trees and shrubs also ran high.

Schools were closed in the Lower Columbia River Valley for two days because of slippery streets and overloaded public transportation facilities. Other schools in the state were shut down because of fuel shortage.

Glendale Country Club Is Oasis for Men Guarding City

Every Monday and Friday afternoon soldiers from anti-aircraft guns guarding the city go to the Glendale Country Club, one truckload at a time, to use the club's showers, to change their clothes, and lounge for a few precious minutes drinking a bottle of pop in the warm lobby.

A corporal on a telephone keeps contact with the guns—just in case. But for a little while all the rest of the young soldiers are just kids who have shed steel helmets, and heavy winter uniforms, and responsibility, to yell and joke under the warm spray of the showers.

The locker room resounds like a college dressing room after a football game.

He Would Like to Talk

Out in the lobby a white-haired man, old beyond his years, named Fred Adler, and his wife, stand near the shower room door. They sell the soldiers bottles of pop, change quarters into nickels for those who want to play the slot machines, and do other favors.

The soldiers pay little attention to the white-haired man. He speaks little to them—only smiles and bows. Age cannot speak to youth, Fred Adler, who was in one of Adolf Hitler's concentration camps only last June, who was once decorated for bravery as an lieutenant of the Austrian army back in another world, cannot tell the soldiers what he aches to tell them.

Persecution and ruin have not made Fred Adler complain. For himself, after 61 years of life, and now, finally, he chuckles at it. Only he does not joke about "his soldiers."

They'll Learn About War

"Listen," he says. "They are laughing. They are such nice boys. They are raised in this country which seems like heaven to my wife and me, and so they laugh. But they have things to learn. They will learn about war. Perhaps they will not learn all I know about war and starvation and bombing and robbery. I hope not."

Fred Adler left Germany with his wife only by the merest whim of circumstance and came to the United States on the last ship leaving Lisbon. Now through arrangements made by Jewish friends, they are custodians at the club.

on horse to obtain horses and wagons.

"One of these firms recently placed an order for 100 horses," Dinsmore said, "but this is probably an exception. All the horse and mule markets already reflect the growing demand, but to date purchases have not actually boomed."

Dinsmore reiterated his opinion that the nation's 14,000,000 horses and mules would be sufficient to meet any increased demand. He said the normal price advance of \$25 to \$30 per head from now until March undoubtedly would be increased.

Prices \$65 to \$300

The secretary listed prices as ranging from \$65 for poor animals to \$300 for good ones. He said delivery animals would command from \$125 to \$150, and good draft horses from \$400 to \$600 a pair.

Dinsmore said most transportation firms, contemplating a changeover to horses, were planning to use vehicles with ball-bearing metal wheels and extremely light chassis.

The association, Dinsmore said, was recommending conversion of light trucks into horse-drawn vehicles by dismantling engine and radiator and attaching a shaft. He said it had been found that such vehicles could run on pneumatic rubber tires for two years after the tires became obsolete for motor-driven hauling.

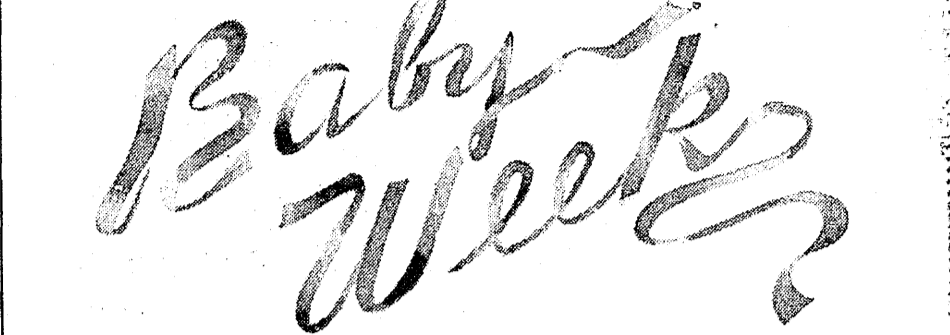
Snyder Appointed Air Cadet
