CAPT. EMIL JACKSON He commanded ill-fated Cleveleon

Capt. Emil Jackson, veteran master mariner who commanded ships plying to Hawaii, the East Coast and the Orient during the war, said today he would like to see his old ship, the Cleveleon, returned to the United States.

The Cleveleon was rebuilt and equipped with all of the Bureau of Marine Engineering and Navigation requirements for passenger carriers. It was one of the biggest ships in years at the Todd Shipyards in Seattle and was watched with interest by marine experts.

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
