"No, we will develop Korea, but not tax her. The question of Japanese projection in Korea is misunderstood in this country. Korea is a weak nation and needs protection. Japan has no intention of making her a vassal or a state of the nation. But she intends to dominate Korea's foreign relations in order to preserve the peace of the Fareast. So long as it is otherwise, Korea is liable to become the prey of other nations. To prevent this Japan has taken on herself the work of looking after Korea, but in no wise is it intended to interfere with her internal affairs."

"Will your country sell Sakhalin Island to help pay off the debt." was asked.

"Japan will not sell her possessions, the replied. "It is too valuable in coal, oil and mines, and Japan intends to develop the property."

ALDERMEN ENJOINED FROM PASSING FRANCHISE

Kansas City's Council Prevented by Court From Extending Gas Company's Privileges 30 Years.

RANSAS CITY, Mo., Saturday, Dec. 20.—Judge H. L. McCune, in the circuit court here today, rendered a decision holding that there was no cause for charges of conspiracy recently filed against the city council, which threatened to pass over Mayor Neff's veto an ordinance granting a thirty-year's franchise to furnish the city with natural gas.

But he issued a temporary order restraining the council from passing the ordinance containing an extension proceeding, which the court held to be il-

ordinance containing an extension provision, which the court held to be illegal.

The council had threatened to pass an ordinance granting to the holders of the present artificial gas franchise a franchise to furnish natural gas. The ordinance covered a period of thirty years, but stipulated that in case the supply of natural gas gave out, the company was to have the privilege of returning to the use of artificial gas. This latter clause is held by Judge McCune to be illegal.

The company already holds a thirty-year franchise to sell artificial gas at it at housand feet, and the new ordinance provided for 25-cent natural gas. Judge McCune gave the city council the right to pass an ordinance with the objectionable clause left out.

Work of Oriental Fishermen at Nanaimo Calls Forth Indignant Protest

NANAIMO, B. C., Saturday, Dec. 30.—
One hundred and fifty tons of herring to the boat, credited to at least half a diozen Jupanese fishermen for a single night's work, has been productive of a highly indignant protest to the inspector of fishermen by the white fishermen of Nanaimo, who claim that the Jupanese, by the use of drag nets, are making enormous hauls and are rapidly depleting the fish, and ask that some restriction be placed on the wanton slangiter.

The small fish were unsaleable and must be left until next season to grow. 
