sumed that most of them would. Governor Langlie's proclamation said that all firearms must be registered with the State Patrol. The new area is roughly outlined within borders running from Harper west to the Willamette Meridian, near Bangor; north to the shore line on Hood Canal to a point between Bangor and Vinland, then north along the tideline to Foul-

Registration blanks for firearms will be obtainable from local authorities, stores and other convenient points, it was revealed. Responsibility for such registration rests strictly with the owners or possessors, officials point out. Issuance of the proclamation was at the request of Rear Admiral C.
