INDIES INSURANCE LISTINGS BANNED

NEW YORK, Tuesday, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Marine underwriters announce today that they have quoted a new war-risk insurance rate for the Netherlands East Indies and Burma areas "in view of the increasing seriousness of the Far Eastern situation."

The charge for such insurance had been \$10 per \$100, covering cargoes moving between Western Hemisphere points and ports east of Calcutta, India. Rates still will be quoted, the underwriters said, but only on application.

Intercoastal Ships May Be Back in April

AUSTRALIA GETS 8 SHIP CARGOES

The Australian government has announced the names of eight ships operating in the Pacific and Atlantic seaboard ports, which have assigned their cargoes short of destination.

These include the Goegs Silver Star, the Harry Luckenbach, the Coast Farmer, the James Lykes and the Admiral Halstead.

Among the companies which are the Pacific Steamship Company, the Silver Java Pacific Company, the American Mail Line, the Luckenbach Steamship Company, the President Lines, the Lykes Brothers Steamship Company and the Matson Navigation Company.

Caught in War Zone In the announcement, made by S. Lane, Australian customs representative, New York City, it was stated that all the vessels bound for New York East destination were caught in the war zone and had to discharge their cargoes at various Australian ports.

It also was stated that to protect the interests of property of the consignors or other American owners of the cargo, the Australian government requisitioned these cargoes. It is probable that similar action will be taken in respect to other Australian cargoes, it was announced.

Owned Not to Lose "Provided the goods are in sound, marketable condition when taken over by the government, the owners are not involved in loss," the government announced.

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5,000 ALIENS REGISTER HERE

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Union to Use Stadium For Ship Builders

PORTLAND, Ore., Tuesday, Feb. 10.—(UP)—Expecting thousands of applicants for Portland shipyard jobs, the American Federation of Labor Boilermakers' Union announced today that application blanks will be distributed Thursday morning at 10:30 in Multnomah Stadium.

Tom Ray, union business agent, said the Stadium was selected because it's the only place big enough to hold the crowd.
