

SENATE VOTES TO LIFT CREDIT BAN

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The Senate passed and sent the House today legislation suspending for the duration of the war a section of the Neutrality Act prohibiting American citizens from extending credit to agencies of belligerent governments, including United States allies.

Chairman Connally, Democrat, Texas, of the Senate foreign-relations committee, which approved the measure by a 13-to-1 vote a few minutes earlier, explained that the resolution would facilitate the sale by American manufacturers of planes and other equipment in Canada.

Senator Johnson, Republican, California, told the Senate he would not block immediate action because he had been assured by State Department officials and Connally that the measure would not "in any way militate against the enforcement of the so-called Johnson Act," prohibiting loans to nations whose debts to the United States are in default.

BOWEN TO HEAR JAP DEMURRERS

Counsel for Thomas S. Masuda and Kenji Ito, Seattle Japanese attorneys, indicted on charges of acting as agents for Japan, today demurred to the indictment.

Arguments on the demurrers will be heard by United States District Judge John C. Bowen. If the Court sustains the arguments, the indictments would be dismissed.

At the same time, counsel for both defendants requested a bill of particulars, in which the government would be required to elaborate on the charges.

Masuda is being represented by Frank E. Hammond and Henry Clay Agnew. Ito's counsel are Samuel B. Bassett and George H. Crandell.

Dad Protests Rule 'Hiding' New Baby

Keep Old Jalopy, Brother, Maybe Buy All New Rubber

Tire-rationing board rules are having a chastening effect. It would appear, on owners of shabby, late-model cars who have smiled patronizingly as they whizzed past cars of ancient vintage, or "orphan" cars which are no longer being made.

One of the classifications under which passenger tires are rationed is "obsolete" and behind that simple term lies many an interesting story of motorists who have clung loyally to cars which, though still serviceable, lack modern appearance and convenience.

But these motorists are today getting tires and owners of new cars, unable to comply with strict rationing regulations, must continue to use their present rubber.

Many Sizes 'Obsolete'

Under amended rationing rules, there are nearly 40 tire sizes classed as "obsolete." Broadly considered, these are tires which the government would not use in any defense work either because of their old-style design or because they fit cars no longer in active demand.

Memories of early-day motoring are revived by some of these sizes, still to be found on tire dealers' shelves.

Take the 30x3, for example. That was used as a front-wheel tire on the celebrated "tin lizzie" rear wheels took another size. Many of the "obsolete" tires were, of course, made in the days before the present low-pressure tires were visualized. Some of the older sizes—like the 33x4½—required between 75 and 70 pounds of air pressure.

Some "obsolete" tire sizes fit cars manufactured about 1930.

Asked whether the government would lift restrictions on the press and radio as soon as the war ends, Bracken said peace would bring "nothing but unemployment for censors."

BABIES AHEAD OF AIR-RAID GUARDS

The West Seattle and Columbia police precinct stations may be used by the Municipal Defense Commission as air-raid warden zone offices, but the air-raid aides must not interfere with the one-day-a-week baby clinics held in the police stations by the Health Department, the City Council harbor and public grounds committee ruled yesterday afternoon.

The rooms sought by the raid wardens have been used by the free baby clinics and Dr. Frank M. Carroll, health commissioner, said this "child-health program is important and the clinics must not be ousted. Dr. Carroll said some civilian-defense people had suggested the raid warden quarters displace the clinics.

Committee members headed by Mrs. F. F. Powell voted to draw an ordinance that will safeguard the clinics and at the same time let the air-raid wardens use the buildings six days a week. The wardens will have to move out during clinic hours, it was agreed.
