

NATIONS OUGHT TO UNITE TO STOP ANARCHY

Former-Diplomat Andrew White Suggests That Police Forces of the World Cooperate to Run Down Reds.

Bloodthirsty Criminals Have an International Organization, and Authorities Should Combine in Similar Manner.

Courts Must Mete Out Quick Justice to Ruthless Assassins, if Terrible Evil Is to Be Eradicated.

By Publishers Press, Special by Leased Wire. CHICAGO, Saturday, June 2.—Great interest is manifested in the suggestion made by Andrew D. White, former ambassador to Russia, that the nations of the world should cooperate to effect the suppression of anarchy. Mr. White believes it time to stop the murderous attacks of irresponsible creatures whose work is becoming so common, and who have killed so many of the ablest men in the United States and Europe.

He thinks the police departments in America and Europe should be empowered by the nations to work together to track the homicidal maniacs to their lairs and bring them to quick justice.

"Take our own country," he said: "three of our own Presidents have fallen by the hands of these men. They were splendid, upright, able Presidents. It is not mean to say that the tendency appears to be increasing instead of decreasing. The recent affair in Spain calls our attention vividly to the danger. If we are to believe reports, there are secret relations between the anarchists of Europe and America. To deal with the anarchists properly there must be similar relations between the police departments of America and Europe. I would not undertake to say just how these powers could be put to work, but it would be a difficult matter to arrange. Every anarchist should be kept under the closest watch so that all their movements back and forth across the ocean would be known. The terrible evil of anarchy will have to be put down with an iron hand for society to be safe."

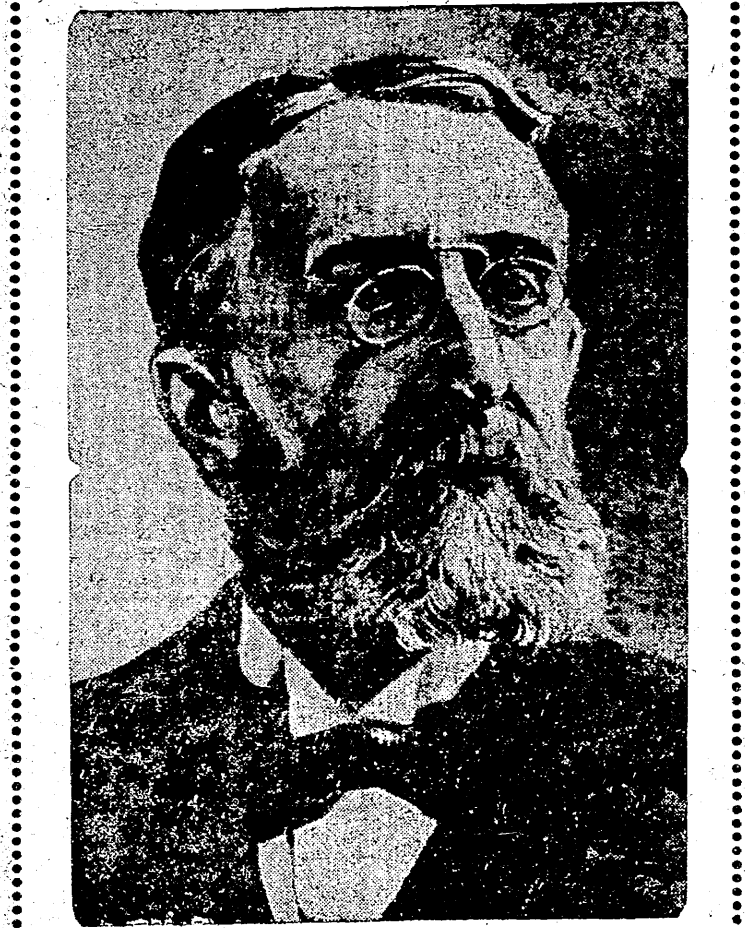
Swift Punishment. "Not only should there be a union of the nations in the matter, but laws should be enacted for the swift and severe punishment. The people must be educated to consider anarchists as the deadly enemies to society. In regard to the case of the Chicago anarchists as the best handled case of record, all things considered. The punishment meted out was not swift, but it was unrelenting, and its effect has continued to this day. The anarchists were not to be trifled with. Another excellent instance was the way the assassin of McKinley was brought to justice. It does not mean that the condone of tranny and oppression. Sometimes the flaunting of wealth has tended to make anarchy more rampant. In many instances have great men been sacrificed by the irresponsible anarchists who were influenced by teachings that had no reason or justice in them."

MADRID OUTRAGE PLEASER PATERSON ANARCHISTS

NEW YORK, Saturday, June 2.—The anarchists of Paterson, N. J., headquarters of the Italian Red party in the United States, have gone into contact because of the attempt to assassinate the King and Queen of Spain. They look on the attempt as one of the greatest things that has been done by their clan for many months. "We are only sorry because the man who threw the bomb did not succeed," said Ludovico Comandini, editor of "La Questione Sociale," the chief organ of the Italian anarchists of the country. "If the men who have been arrested in Madrid need money, a collection will be made among the 100 Italian anarchists here and forwarded. We do not care for any anarchists had left Paterson for Europe within the past few weeks."

JAPAN PUTS SPIES ON AMERICAN WARSHIPS

Subjects of Mikado Take Positions as Servants and Then Make Drawings of Vessels for Their Government.

Secret Agents of Far Eastern Empire Also Enter Service at Navy Yards in Order to Secure Secrets.

Authorities at Washington Issue Orders Excluding Brown Men From Employment in All Branches of Marine Work.

NEW YORK, Saturday, June 2.—Roused by the discovery, it is said, that the Japanese government has been securing important information as to the equipment and personnel of the United States navy through Japanese servants employed on United States battleships, Secretary Bonaparte issued orders today excluding all Japanese from employment in the navy, afloat or ashore. Their places are to be filled by native-born Americans, white or colored.

One of the contributing causes for this unusual order is referred to in a story told by officers of the North Atlantic squadron now anchored in New York waters.

Less than a month ago a midshipman discovered a Japanese steward making remarkably accurate drawings of the turret section of one of the newest type of battleships. Search of his personal effects disclosed the fact that he had been working secretly for weeks on plans of the ship, and was a remarkably fine draughtsman. The case was reported at once to the navy department, as well as similar discoveries said to have been made at the Brooklyn yard.

WILL OPEN PART OF SHOSHONE RESERVATION

REPORT ON PACKERS TO GO TO CONGRESS MONDAY

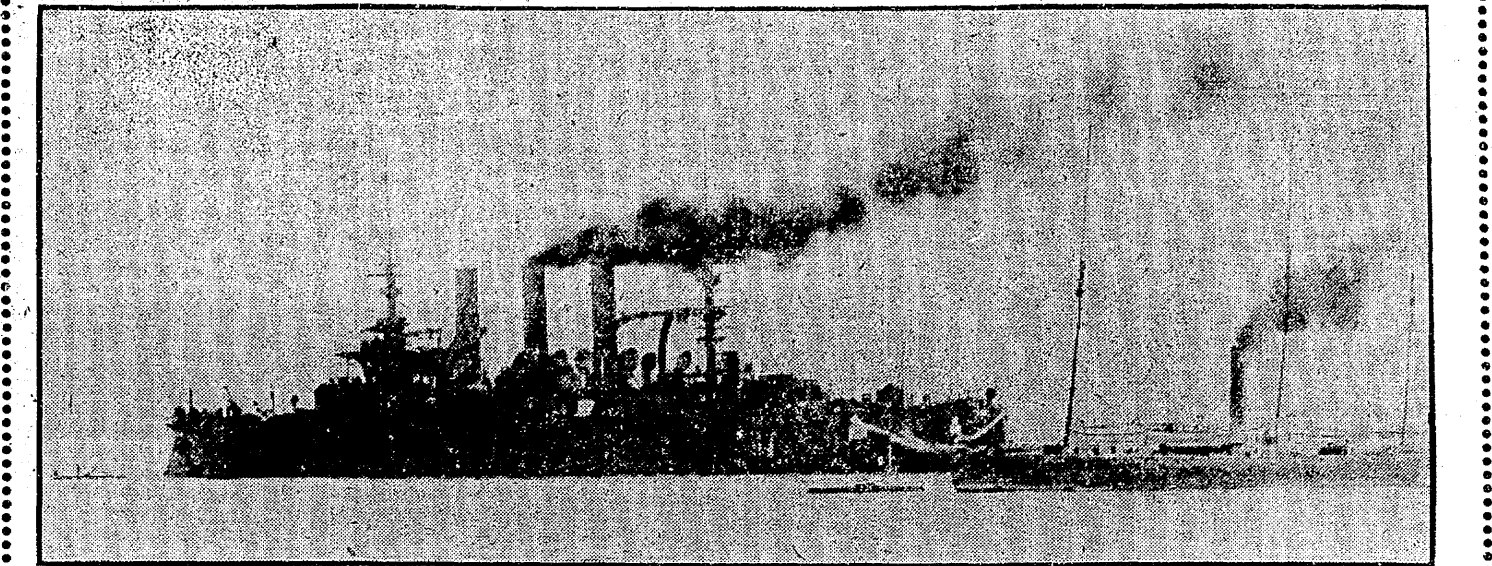

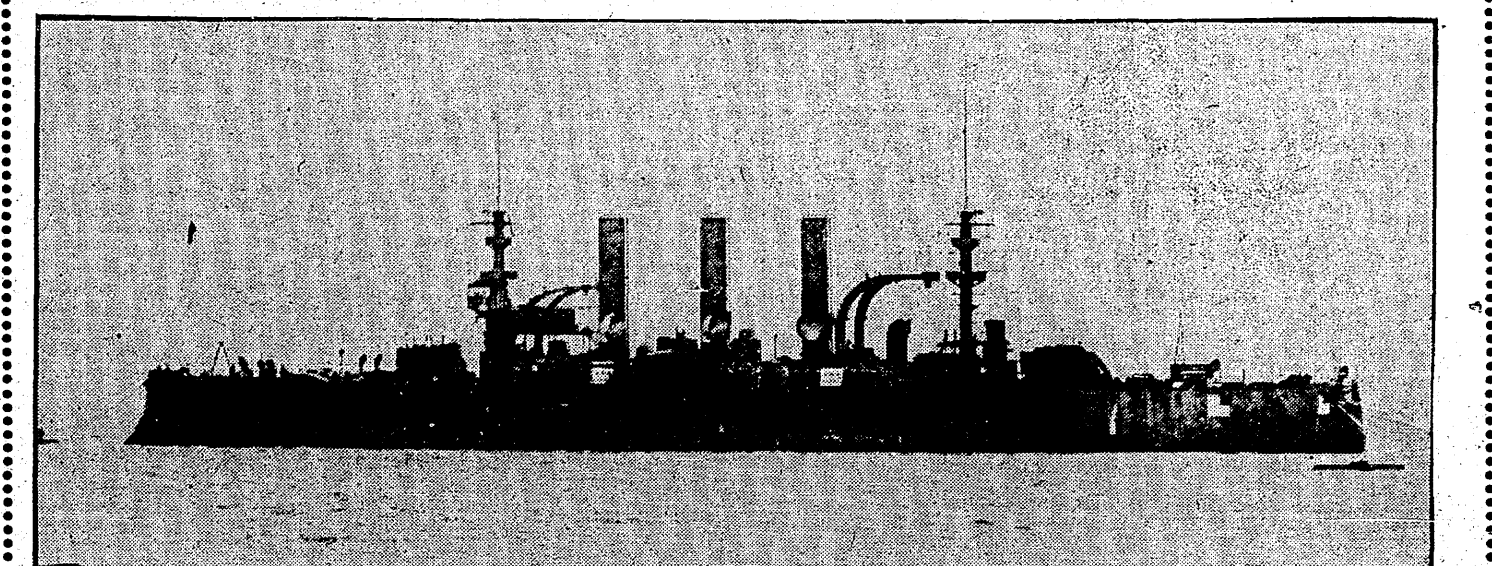

NEBRASKA MOORED IN THE HARBOR

FOR the first time since the battleship Nebraska has been under course of construction, the big fighter left her dock propelled by her own machinery yesterday. Shortly after 6 o'clock last night the battleship, with Robert Moran at the wheel, steamed from her dock and proceeded to the city buoy. The vessel will remain at the buoy until Monday. Today the vessel's dock will be dredged. During the time the warship has been lying in her slip the tide has carried sand and other refuse into the dock.

The vessel yesterday was operated by the ship crew. According to Mr. Moran she worked perfectly. During the past two weeks the vessel has been undergoing a dock trial. Her big propellers were revolved daily. So far everything has operated to the satisfaction of her builders.

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DEMOCRATS HAVE AN EXCELLENT CHANCE

Have Confined Their Efforts in Oregon to the Election of a Few Candidates and Prospects of Success Are Good.

For First Time in the History of State Nominations Have Been Made by Means of the Direct Primary.

Besides Officers to Be Elected the Question of Woman's Suffrage Will Come Before the People.

The Times Special Service. PORTLAND, Ore., Saturday, June 2.—Tonight witnessed the closing of the political campaign, which has been waged with feverish activity during the past few weeks. On Monday citizens of Oregon will vote on state and county tickets and everything is over but the shouting. Despite the fact that 40,000 more voters registered as Republicans than recorded themselves as Democrats, the followers of Jefferson have made a gallant fight and have bright prospects for landing some of their candidates.

For the first time in the history of the state, candidates nominated by direct primary, and for once machine politics have had nothing to do with naming the tickets of either party. For the first time also, the people have a chance to select a United States senator, a majority of the legislative candidates being pledged to cast their votes for the candidates receiving the highest popular vote. In Multnomah county, Sheriff J. M. Word, who made a record by suppressing the liquor traffic and driving the green cloth out of town, stands an excellent chance of reelection. Frank J. Bryan is the only one of the candidates for whom there is any possibility of success.

Limit Their Efforts. The Democrats have confined their efforts to the election of a few candidates, and have not attempted to elect John M. Gearin, Governor Chamberlain and C. V. Galloway for congressmen to succeed Binger Herman, now under a disbarment for complicity in the land frauds. In Multnomah county, Sheriff J. M.
