EDESON SCORES

Well-Known Star Makes His First Visit to the Queen City and His Play, "Strongheart," Is Well Received.

"The Sign of the Cross" and "The Marriage of Kitty" Come Later in the Week-Notes of Other Attractions.

That Robert Edeson in "Strongheart" is to remain in Seattle but two nights, on the very first visit of both star and play to this city, is a distinct dramatic calamity. Everyone who attended last ovening is telling his or her friends to be sure and see it tonight. But that will be impossible, for tonight's curtain rose. Whoever falled to book Edeson for a week here has much to answer for. When an attraction like "Strongheart' comes to town it is almost worth a midnight extra of the newspapers. From all points of view the performance is a genuine treat. One of the younger De Milles wrote the play for Edeson, and Henry B. Harris gave the comedy an admirably-balanced cast to interpret it. The result is a cheerful whole that gives one renewed confidence in latter-day acting. If there were more attractions like this there would be a mighty increase in the proportion of theatre-goers to the general population.

Like Clyde Fitch, who has dramatized a funeral, a death, a suicide, everything in fact, but a birth, William De Mille has been daring enough to turn out a play in which there is a passionate love interest and in which the fellow does not get the girl. If there is one thing that a great many play-goers like more than another, it is to see the positive assurance, at the final curtain, that the hero and heroine are destined to live happy ever after. But De Mille cruelly, though artistically, separates the lovers, It is the only logical conclusion, if one will consider the conditions for a moment.

"Strongheart" is a full-blooded Indian chief, whom the dramatist causes to fall in love with a beautiful white girl of Columbia College, New York. His love lsyeturned. At the moment of the discovery of their mutual love, Strongheart is bitterly denounced by the friends and relatives of the young woman. It is impossible to conceive that the sympathy of the audience was wholly with the Indian. Like a flash every auditor realized the race prejudice slumbering within his own breast.

Much as the desire of a negro to marry a white woman has caused "The Clansman" to be so potent a creator of race disturbance throughout the East, so "Strongheart" brings home a conviction to a white man that he would not like to have an Indian alliance in his own immediate family. "The meeting," said Baker, "was called by anti-annexationists in an effort to secure the appointment of a committee to go before the county commissioners with a petition to be allowed to incorporate as a city of the fourth class, but ended without anything being done. I do not deny that the men responsible for the meeting may be able to obtain the sixty signatures required for such a petition, but as far as that meeting is concerned, the anti-annexation movement fell flat.
