

# STATE C. I. O. ASKS JAP EVACUATION

OLYMPIA, March 9.—(AP)—The Washington State Congress of Industrial Organizations was on record today as unequivocally endorsing the war policy of President Roosevelt and recognizing that production of "tanks, guns, ships and munitions must be doubled and redoubled again to smash the Axis powers and safeguard American democracy."

Approval of the President's policies was given last night as delegates wound up a quiet two-day industrial council session which was in marked contrast to the 1940 meeting here and the one which followed in Tacoma last year when left and right-wing groups clashed bitterly on many issues.

**Japs' Removal Asked**

Evacuation of American-born and alien Japanese from the Pacific Coast was asked. Resolutions urged immediate work on the Alaska Highway; requested Governor Olsen of California to grant full pardon to three marine firemen who recently were paroled after serving short terms for leading a mutiny on the freighter Point Lobos which resulted in the death of the engineer; endorsed C. I. O. President Philip Murray's plan to establish a war labor board, and called for dismissal of the Dies committee investigating subversive activities.

**Tacoman News Head**

Earlier, Jack Bell, Tacoma, United Mine Workers' representative and former executive board member, was elected president to succeed Jack Doyle, Seattle, who did not seek reelection. S. J. Brozovich, Seattle, and H. T. Tucker, Aberdeen, were re-elected vice president and treasurer, respectively.

Executive council members named were Burt Sparks, Seattle; Parker Gallaspay, Everett; Dan Adair, Olympia; John Bator, Roslyn; Sam Perry, Spokane, and M. A. Mitchell, Tacoma.

Sole demonstration of the convention was that which developed when William Dalrymple, Oregon regional C. I. O. director, expressed the opinion that "all the money donated for the defense of Tom Mooney might as well have been used to plug the sewer." His announcement was greeted with boos and catcalls.

## 5,000 at Mooney Funeral Services

SAN FRANCISCO, March 9.—(AP)—Tom Mooney, eulogized as a far-sighted prophet of the menace of Nazism, was buried today after a funeral service yesterday in the Civic Auditorium attended by 5,000 persons.

Funeral orators, standing over his flower-banked bier at rites arranged by American Federation of Labor, Congress of Industrial Organizations and Independent unions, pledged themselves "to continue Tom's fight."

Mooney was sentenced after conviction of the 1916 San Francisco Preparedness Day parade bombing, which killed ten persons. Gov. Culbert L. Olson pardoned him three years ago.

Walter K. Billings, codefendant with Mooney who also was paroled by Governor Olson, told the funeral service crowd he was beginning a nationwide speaking tour in behalf of the freedom of Earl Browder, general secretary of the Communist Party in the United States. Billings, convicted of passport falsification, is serving a four-year federal prison term.

## Price Lauds Press, Radio Cooperation

WASHINGTON, March 9.—(AP)—Censorship Director Byron Price says cooperation of the press and radio in war censorship has been "excellent," but he warns that "dark hours may be ahead for free speech in the United States" if voluntary censorship fails.

Price discussed the voluntary censorship system in a radio forum last night. Lawrence Fly, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, urged development of "a skilled, professional unit unflagging in its vigilance and exact in its distinction between what is dangerous and what is merely disagreeable to the censor," and expressed the opinion Price's office was developing that kind of censorship unit.

Roy Larson, publisher of Time, said the nation could profit by England's experience, contending: "There is less censorship in England after nearly three years of war than there was in England after three months of war."

## Red Cross War Aide Dies

NEW YORK, March 9.—(AP)—Carl Taylor, 70 years old, New York lawyer, member of the original Red Cross Commission that went to France in 1917 to organize war work in Europe, and former president of the Board of Contracts and Adjustments, died yesterday of apoplexy.

### L. L. Hegland Will Direct Home, Rooms Subcommittee

L. L. Hegland has been appointed chairman of the home and rooms subcommittee of the Municipal Defense Commission's housing committee by Arthur Vander-Sys, chairman. Hegland's committee will work with Mrs. Jackson K. Holloway, chairman of the rooming service, which has branch offices in the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.

Home certifiers, under Hegland, inspect housing facilities before they are offered to applicants for single rooms or family-dwelling units through the branch offices of the homes registration office, 205 Rialto Building.

Expert advice on home reconditioning and remodeling will be available at the housing committee exhibit at the Victory Fair at the Ben Marche, which reopens tomorrow. F. Gilbert Black and Kenneth Phelan will be in charge, assisted by a volunteer from the rooming registry service. Applications for housing will be taken at the exhibit.

The vocational-guidance and pre-employment-training committee will meet Wednesday in Room 214, Rialto Building. Samuel E. Fleming, chairman, will preside.

Training of air-raid wardens in proper hand signals for directing traffic will be discussed at a meeting of the executive committee of the Seattle Traffic and Safety Council at 3 o'clock Wednesday, in Room 216, Rialto Building.

The Northwest Zone will enroll more than 300 new volunteer air-raid wardens tonight at its headquarters, 5400 Ballard Ave., with Capt. Bernard Wyse in charge. Applicants will fill out registration cards and be given training assignments.

Section captains of the seven air-raid zones in Seattle will meet tomorrow night in zone headquarters to discuss administrative and organization work.

The survey committee will meet tomorrow in Room 402, Washington Athletic Club. Nathan Eckstein, chairman, will preside.
