TECRETARY METCALE'S report deals with exclusion of Japanese children from San Francisco from San Francisco na of Japanese restau-of violence committed boycottina

There would be no objection whatever to excluding from the schools any Japanese on the score of age.

If failure to protect persons or property then the entire power of the Federal Government within the limits of the Constitution would be used to agione the observance of our treaty, the supreme law of the land.

SECRETARY METCALF SAYS:

A most effective boycott was maintained against nearly all of the Japanese restaurants located in San Francisco for a period of at least three weeks.
