## CUNDEMNED U.S.AIDES

RICHMOND, Calif., March 19.— About 1,000 men had quit their jobs today at the Todd-California & Richmond Shipbuilding Corpora tion and company officials said they believed they had been lured by prospects of more money on ten-hour shifts falsely rumored to be in operation at competing shipyards.
Union and federal officials said

the rumors of longer shifts might have been started by subversiv groups seeking to hamper war pro

duction. Union leaders condemned the resignations, which began late yes-terday and continued until midnight.

#### 'Un-American.' Says Unionist

Tom Crowe, international representative for the A. F. of L. International Brotherhood of Boilerternational Brothermood of Boiler-makers & Shipbuilders, Welders and Helpers, termed the men's action "un-American."

Company officials said they had

received a telephone call from Paul R. Porter, chairman of the shipbuilding stabilization committee of the War Production Board.

"The men who tonight walked out of the Richmond shipbuilding yards in defiance of the union leaders are stabbing their country in the back," Porter said. "If they don't yet know that there is a war on then they should be escorted by loyal workers to the nearest Army recruiting station before the day is over and given a chance to get into the fighting zone. I call on them to return to work immediately.

"Any rumor that the men will find work elsewhere on a 10 hour shift is without foundation. There can be no change from the three 8-hour shifts to the two 10-hour shifts without the approval of the W. P. B., the Navy and the United States Maritime Commission.
