F. B. I. RAIDS HEAVY TOLL OF ALIEN NEST IN HOBOKEN, U. S. 'SUBS' HOLDS MANY IS REPORTED

Famous Seamen's Institute Searched for Stranded German Sailors Regarded as Potentially Dangerous

HOBOKEN, N. J., March 28.—Sixty Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and policemen swooped down today on the Seemannshaus Deutsches, better known locally as the Seamen's Institute, and took into custody 60 to 68 residents as potentially dangerous aliens.

Search Is Slow The search proceeded slowly. Most of the residents still were there four hours after the raid, which was made before 6 a. m.

JAPANESE HERE OBEY MILITARY CURFEW ORDERS

Seattle enemy aliens and all Japanese, including American-born, joined in observance of an Army-imposed, coast-wide curfew at 8 o'clock last night.

Minor Violations Elsewhere H. B. Fletcher, special agent in charge of the Seattle office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said the curfew order will be enforced strictly, with no exceptions, even to Jewish refugees from Germany who have been unable to become citizens of the United States.

Germans Report St. Nazaire Attackers Fail in Effort to Explode Craft Near Docks and Lose 14 Boats

LONDON, March 28.—British Commandos invaded St. Nazaire, the great Nazi submarine base on the French Brittany coast, early today in what appeared to have been an attempt to duplicate the First World War coup of Zeppelins and destroy the harbor locks by blowing up an old warship crammed with explosives.

Prelate Confirms Princess Elizabeth WINDSOR, Eng., March 28.—(AP)—Princess Elizabeth was confirmed by the Archbishop of Canterbury today in the private chapel of Windsor Castle.

SUMMARY OF TODAY'S WAR NEWS While official reports of action around Australia produced little news today, a Sydney, Australia, newspaper man reported that American submarines in the Southwest Pacific have sunk a Japanese aircraft carrier, five destroyers and 30 transports.

Another unconfirmed report from Rome said a large British fleet, including two battleships, was headed for the Indian Ocean to meet a Japanese fleet reported operating from the occupied Andaman Islands and Rangoon, Burma.

Port Moresby was raided again and Allied planes raided Koepang, on occupied Dutch Timor Island.

Corregidor Fortress underwent another series of attacks, but a War Department communique said anti-aircraft fire kept bombers high and damage was slight.

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
