\$30,000 IS WON FROM 5 UNIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Attorneys for the B-G Foods Shops said today they would attempt to collect the entire judgment of \$30,000, awarded by a Superior Court jury yesterday in a libel action, from treasuries of five American Federation of Labor unions.

The judgment was returned after the jury of six men and six women voted unanimously on the first ballot that literature distributed by pickets had libeled the company.

The asserted libelous material consisted primarily of statements in handbills criticizing sanitary conditions and the quality of food served in the restaurants.

The judgment was against the unions, their officers and the San Francisco local joint executive board of Culinary Workers & Bartenders, which directed the strike. The unions were the bartenders, cooks, waiters, waitresses and miscellaneous employees.

Picket lines were placed around restaurants of the company here last May 23, as a result of a dispute arising from efforts of the unions to organize employees of the company.

John H. Painter and Ricardo J. Hecht, attorneys for the company, said the verdict was the first of its kind in San Francisco. George J. Conney, foreman of the jury, said damages were based on actual loss.

80 Pct of Oregon Women Register

PORTLAND, Or., April 15.—(AP) More than 302,000 Oregon women, or almost 80 per cent of all women over 18, signed with the Oregon Board for the Mobilization of Women in the recent campaign to enlist women for war effort.

In announcing the final tabulation today, L. C. Stoll, director of the United States Employment Service for Oregon, said the list already has proved of value in finding women workers for vacant jobs.

Park Entrance Opened
CODY, Wyo., April 15.—(AP)—The eastern or Cody entrance to Yellowstone National Park was cleared of snow today and opened to travel for the 1942 season.

Flight Sgt. John Graham Morrison, 21 years old, Royal Canadian Air Force, well known in Seattle through numerous visits, was reported "missing in overseas air operations" in word sent yesterday to his brother, Robert Wilbur Morrison, former Roosevelt High School football star.

The terse message from Canada gave no details, but said further information will be forthcoming. Robert Morrison, who lives with an aunt, Mrs. Elsie G. Beek, at 5518 33rd Ave. N. E., is closest of kin to John Morrison, their parents being dead. The flyer was in Scotland when last heard from by his brother, but at that time announced he was to be transferred to a more active unidentified zone.

Besides the brother and aunt in Seattle, Morrison has an uncle, F. Heber Beek, 5632 20th Ave. N. E., and two sisters, Mrs. Thomas Halkett and Mrs. William Stanchel, both of Victoria, B. C. Sergeant Morrison has lived chiefly in Victoria.

Graduation in Caverns
CARLSBAD, N. W., April 15.—(AP)—The boys who fly the highest are going to be graduated Sunday where it's lowest. Headed by Col. Thomas Gilbert, officers and graduating cadets of the Lubbock, Tex., Air Corps school will receive their wings in the United States Army Air Corps at a ceremony 750 feet underground in the Carlsbad Caverns.

Tacoma Stricken on Street
TACOMA, April 15.—(AP)—Henry C. Allen, 47 years old, was stricken on a downtown street in Tacoma last night and died while a police ambulance was rushing him to a hospital. Allen apparently was the victim of a heart attack, officers said.

JAP INTERNEES' PAY ATTACKED

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Senator Gillette, Democrat, Iowa, said today he might ask the Senate to investigate reports that interned Japanese nationals in this country "are being paid at a higher rate than our soldiers and others in the armed forces."

"I have a number of reports that, if true, would give ample reason for adopting more strict regulations of these interned aliens," the Iowa senator said.

Gillette said that much of his information had come from Kilsco Haan, Korean, who has been engaged in anti-Japanese activities in this country and the Hawaiian Islands for several years.

"One report is that Japs now interned were receiving more than \$50 monthly compared with \$21 monthly going to selectees," the senator said. "Another stated that Japs from California have been interned near the water-supply sources of Los Angeles where it might be easy to cause serious trouble."

"Still another is that in a Jap camp in North Dakota the interned Japs have been holding political meetings attended by Germans from the nearby community. My information is that guards outside the fence around the camp have been kept outside of hearing distance from these political sessions."

The senator said in an interview that interned Japanese were "fed well, clothed well, and have been entertained well" and he was considering offering this proposed four-point program:

1. Place all Japanese, both native and aliens, under United States authority and remove them from all Pacific Coast states.
2. Rescind all civil rights for Japanese in this country and Hawaii for duration of the war.
3. Draft all Jap males between 20 and 44 years for agricultural work under Army control and at basic Army pay. They might be used to produce vegetables.
4. Support all other alien Japanese with enemy funds now frozen in this country.

"The present frozen funds amount about \$130,000,000, with several hundred millions more that could be liquidated," the senator said.

Girl, 17, Fearing Theft, Hit - Run Charges, Hides

A 17-year-old Tacoma girl has been "in hiding" since Friday night, apparently in the mistaken belief that she is wanted here for automobile theft and hit-run driving, Seattle police revealed today.

She is Betty Butler, a senior in Stadium High School, and daughter of Mrs. C. H. Cook, Tacoma. Actually, police said today, it has been determined that the automobile involved was not a stolen machine. The "hit-run" driving involved only a couple of dented fenders.

The girl disappeared about 10:30 o'clock Friday night after Detective Lieut. W. J. Morgan of the police auto-theft detail stopped a car in which she was riding through Seattle's central business district with a Tacoma youth.

Morgan suspected the automobile had been stolen and ordered Miss Cook's companion to ride to Police Headquarters with him in Morgan's car after the youth was unable to produce proof of ownership. The officer instructed Miss Cook to follow in the car which the Tacoma youth had been driving.

The girl failed to appear at Police Headquarters. Her companion, meanwhile, made a telephone call that convinced police he was the owner of the car.

When Morgan and the youth returned to the place where they had left the girl, they found the youth's car abandoned nearby. It apparently had collided with two parked automobiles, denting a fender on each.

No word has been heard from Miss Cook since. Police throughout the Pacific Northwest have been requested by Mrs. Nell M. Carr of the police women's division, to watch for her.

"Betty has never been away from home even overnight," Mrs. Cook said today. "I know she is frightened. But her stepfather and I will stand behind her in anything that happens."

James A. Cranston Dead
SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—(AP)—James A. Cranston, 80 years old, retired commercial vice president of General Electric Company, fell dead of a heart attack while visiting at the office today. The veteran official was widely known in California and the Pacific Northwest, where he served the company for 33 years.

Special So. End Boeing Bus Set

Boeing workers who reside in the Rainier and Beacon Hill districts will get a special morning bus direct to Boeing Plant No. 2, beginning Monday, the Transportation Commission announced this afternoon.

"This coach will be routed directly to the plant so as to avoid coming into the congested area in the central portion of the city, and also to furnish rapid transportation to those wishing to avail themselves of this service," the commission said.

The plan will be tried for 30 days. Its continuation after that will depend on its patronage.

The coach will leave Fletcher Street and 57th Avenue South at 6:30 o'clock, Rainier Avenue and Alaska Street at 6:52, Columbia Way and Beacon Avenue at 6:56, 15th Avenue South and Snoqualmie Street at 6:58, and then go to the plant by way of 15th Avenue South and the Albro Bridge.

KINNE STUDIES UNION DISPUTE

Superior Judge James B. Kinne today had under advisement his decision on the petition of Ed M. Weston, business agent of the Seattle Boilermakers' Union, Local 104, seeking a court order preventing his suspension from the union by J. A. Franklin, president of the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers.

At the completion of a hearing of the case late yesterday, Judge Kinne said he would give his ruling tomorrow forenoon after studying law books.

Weston asks also that Franklin and other international union officials be enjoined permanently from interfering with the local union's business. Weston, the only witness to testify, contended that Franklin wrongfully ordered his suspension, without cause and without a hearing, after Weston was elected business agent last December.
