Next to beans, Dunham lists the consumption of hot coffee. At all meals this beverage is consumed in unbelievable quantities with food, tea, milk and lemonade following in that order.

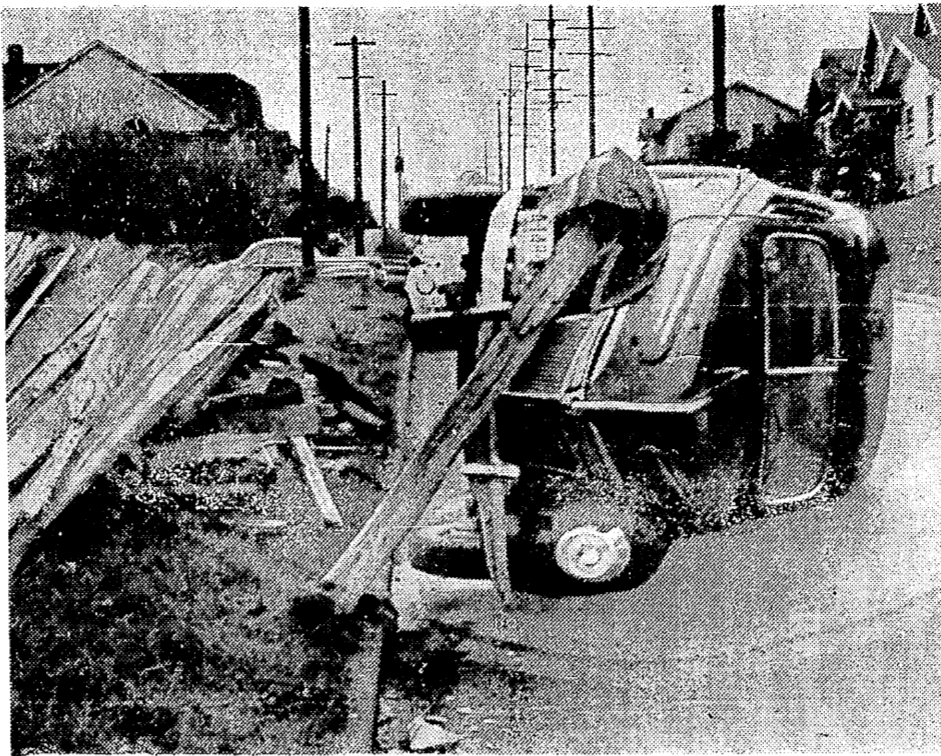
Dunham makes no distinction between star and extra on location jaunts. "They all eat the same things or go hungry," he says.

Driving an automobile is much more difficult than it appears, 5-year-old Donna May Treleven discovered yesterday.

Donna May and her mother, Mrs. Joseph W. Treleven, were moving the last of their possessions from their former home at 2114 N. 36th St., to a new home at 1238 Henderson St., yesterday. Mrs. Treleven was gathering together the last armful and told her daughter to go out and wait in the car.

The little girl got into the car and released the brake.

The machine rolled downhill more than a block, then crashed against a pile of lumber on the parking strip and overturned. The girl was uninjured and apparently "not at all frightened," according to Traffic Investigators Gordon N. McDougall and Charles A. Rouse.

"It's a good thing she collided with the lumber pile," McDougall said. "Because if she'd have gone a few feet farther, the automobile would have gone over a 30-foot embankment."

### O. C. D. Fitness Unit Abolished In New Set-Up

WASHINGTON, April 15.—(AP)—The much-discussed division of physical fitness, formerly part of the Office of Civilian Defense, was abolished today by Paul V. McNutt, federal security administrator.

Many of the members of the division's staff were dismissed effective May 1, and their activities absorbed immediately by McNutt's office of Defense Health and Welfare Services.

McNutt announced that nine of the 36 division employees, together with Director John B. Kelly, Philadelphia contractor and nationally-known athlete, would be retained in the consolidation.

Kelly, with a staff of two, will have headquarters in Philadelphia and will hold the title of assistant director of defense health and welfare services—without compensation.

All of the various sports "coordinators" established by Kelly throughout the country to promote bowling, table tennis, tennis, horse-shoe pitching and other activities were dropped by McNutt, although he noted in a statement that he hoped they would "continue to promote these vital community programs" on their own.

### Russ Launch Victory Loan

KUIBYSHEV, Russia, April 15.—(AP)—A victory loan of 10,000,000,000 rubles (about \$2,000,000,000) was launched in a profusion of red banners and speeches yesterday, and Russians were given their choice of interest coupons or lottery tickets as revenue from the issue. The bonds mature in 1962.

### COURT UPHOLDS CURFEW ON JAPS

United States District Judge Lloyd L. Black today denied a writ of habeas corpus to Mary Asaba Ventura, American-born Japanese, who contended the military curfew regulations unlawfully restrained her of her liberty.

The Court commented that if she is loyal and devoted to the United States she should be willing to conform to military regulations.

Had the writ been granted, a precedent would have been established whereby other Japanese could obtain exemption from the regulations.

Judge Black also ordered the dismissal of her petition which requested Lieut. Gen. John L. De Witt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command, to show cause why Mrs. Ventura should not be released from evacuation regulations as well as those applying to the curfew. Mrs. Ventura's husband, Mamerto S. Ventura, a Filipino, is treasurer of the Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers' Union, Local No. 7.

Hideo Saiki, American-born Japanese gardener at Bellevue, first Japanese arrested in Seattle as a curfew violator, was sentenced yesterday by United States District Judge John C. Bowen to serve 15 days in the county jail.

Mitsuyuki Yamagita, 27 years old, Japanese bartender, was taken into federal custody yesterday on similar charges. He was bound over to the Federal Grand Jury by U. S. Commissioner Harry M. Westfall and is being held in \$250 bail.

### POST-WAR U. S. TO FACE CRISIS

Post-war problems, involving maintenance of employment and rehabilitation of nations, today appear as great as problems posed by the war itself, Eric T. Johnston of Spokane, vice president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, told 600 Seattle Master Builders and their guests last night at the Olympic Hotel.

"Political and economic ideologies of the democratic and totalitarian forms of government will be thrown into strong contrast after the war," Johnston said.

"In the post-war world, Russia will loom as a tremendous influence on the European Continent, and the democratic way of life and action must rise to new heights of accomplishment if it is to survive."

### Harvey Band Searches For New Vocalist
