

WILKINS GETTING READY FOR ARMY

Superior Judge William J. Wilkins today was preparing to replace his black robes of office with the uniform of a major in the United States Army.

Judge Wilkins received word last night that he is ordered to report to the Judge Advocate General's office in Washington, D. C., May 15. He expects to leave the first of next month, after cleaning up pending court cases here.

Judge Wilkins is a veteran of the First World War, having served in France as a lieutenant. He was decorated twice for gallantry in action.

JAPANESE MUST LEAVE SEATTLE AREA

mander of the Fourth Army and the Western Defense Command.

Soldiers will be detailed from Fort Lewis to handle the removal. Japanese will be removed from two areas in Seattle, under the present orders. The areas generally are the northwest section of the city and the entire South End. Their detailed designations follow:

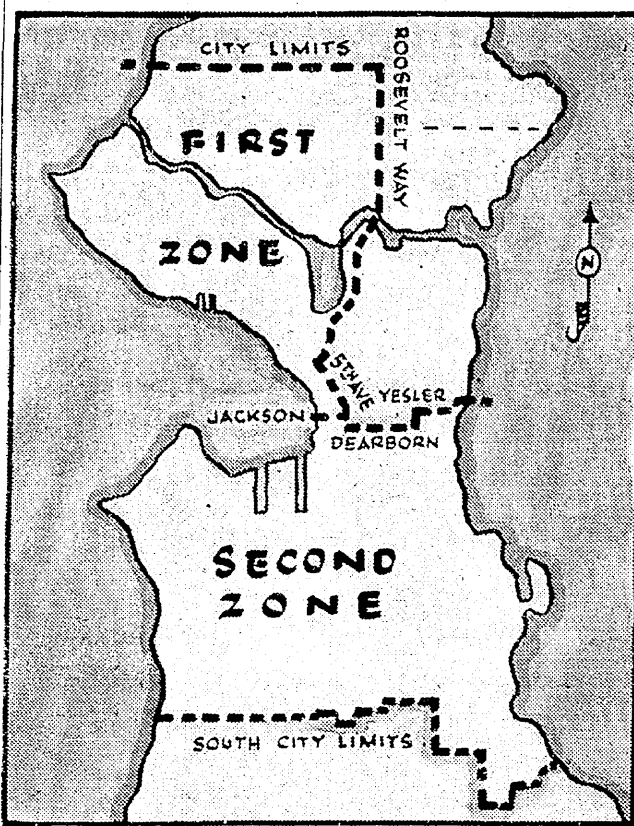
1. All that portion of Seattle within the boundary beginning at the point at which the north city limits meet Shilshole Bay; thence easterly and following the north city limits to Roosevelt Way; thence southerly and following Roosevelt Way, Eastlake and Fairview Avenues, Virginia Street and Westlake Avenue to Fifth Avenue; thence southerly to Maynard Avenue; thence southerly in Maynard Avenue to Jackson Street; thence westerly in Jackson Street to Elliott Bay, and thence northwesterly and northerly and following the westerly city limits to the point of beginning.

2. All that portion of Seattle lying generally south of an east-west line beginning at the point at which Jackson Street meets Elliott Bay; thence easterly along Jackson Street to Fifth Avenue South; thence southerly in Fifth Avenue South to Dearborn Street; thence easterly in Dearborn Street to 23rd Avenue; thence northerly in 23rd Avenue to Yesler Way and thence easterly in Yesler Way to Lake Washington.

The garden areas adjacent to the city are expected to be included in further orders.

The Seattle evacuation is part of a general order which calls for the evacuation of 12,800 Japanese from the Pacific Coast during the next ten days.

All Japanese in Area No. 1 must register Saturday and Sunday between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon at 2100 Second Ave.



Here are the two zones from which Japanese will be evacuated next week, as the result of an Army order today. About 1,000 Japanese are in each area, the Wartime Civil Control Administration said. Note that the orders did not affect Japanese who live in the University, Capitol Hill and First Hill districts. Presumably, their evacuation will follow later.

Those who are in the second area must register on the same days and during the same hours at 1319 Rainier Ave.

The evacuees in the two districts will proceed, or will be transported, to the assembly center at Puyallup next Tuesday, Thursday or Friday, as indicated when they register.

The Army asked that the head of each family register for the entire family, thus saving time.

Evacuees will be permitted to use automobiles to transport themselves to the assembly center, the Army said, if such automobile is registered in advance. Those not having transportation will be taken to Puyallup by train or bus.

Col. Karl R. Bendetsen, assistant chief of General De Witt's staff, said the tempo of evacuation is being increased all along the Coast.

The Seattle evacuation will be the first since the removal of 239 Japanese from Bainbridge Island late in March.

The next move here, it was expected, will be the removal of remaining Japanese in Seattle, those in the valleys to the south and those on Vashon Island.

The agricultural division of the Wartime Civilian Control Administration announced today that 70 per cent of Japanese farm lands have been transferred to other operators. Most of the transfers have been made in California, it was said, and operators still are being sought for Japanese farms in the Puget Sound area.

DRAFT Deferments Are Temporary; Local Boards Make Decisions

Who may be deferred in the draft? Who is a dependent? These are among the questions answered by Clarke Beach, of Wide World, in this second of five daily articles on the Selective Service System.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(Wide World)—Are all married men deferred in the draft?

Nearly all local boards deferred all married men before the war, but now a great many of the boards are deferring only those who have dependents.

Before long it probably will be a general practice not to defer married men if there are no children and if the wife can be self-supporting.

Who are dependents? They may be a wife, divorced wife, child, parent, grandparent, brother, sister, a physically or mentally handicapped person or some person under 18 who is depending on the registrant's earnings for support.

Unborn Baby Dependent

An unborn, adopted or illegitimate child is rated a dependent. No healthy son, daughter, brother or sister over 18 can be claimed as a dependent.

Can the registrant list deferment if the dependent was acquired after registration?

Only if he proves he did not undertake the support of the dependent so he could avoid military action as it did last in Congress.

Is it likely that men with dependents will be inducted later? A bill is pending in Congress which would provide limited compensation for dependents of inducted men; men who did not contribute toward the support of dependents more than Congress allotted them would not be deferred.

Deferment Requests

Can anyone but the registrant himself file a request for a man's deferment?

Yes. A dependent, such as a divorced wife, pending in Employment also can file such requests in case the registrant's services are urgently needed in war industry.

Are all persons working in a war industry deferred?

No. Only those employed in "critical occupation," a job which can be filled only by a man with special training and skill. Nor can all men holding "critical occupations" be deferred—only those who cannot be replaced without a serious loss of effectiveness in the plant. There must be a shortage of such men.

While the Selective Service System insists that no war industry be impeded in its work because of induction of necessary men, it depends on industry to find replacements who are not subject to induction and to hire for critical jobs no men who are likely to be called for military service.

Women's Employment Urged

Selective Service urges increased employment of women, older men and young men who are not physically 100 per cent perfect.

Should war industries refuse to hire men who are liable for induction?

No. Selective Service officials urge that there be no discrimination against prospective inductees in the

matter of hiring; but it cautions against hiring them to fill critical positions unless they have special skills, which other available workers do not possess.

Are any deferments permanent? Only those expressly stipulated in the Selective Service Act. Occupational or dependency deferments are on a 6-month basis. If the reason for deferment continues, however, the board may renew the deferment for 6-month periods.

Who is expressly deferred under the act?

Ministers Deferred

Ministers and theological students and certain officials, including congressmen and judges. Ministers include Christian Science readers, Salvation Army commissioned officers, lay brothers of the Catholic Church, a Jewish cantor who is the spiritual leader of his congregation, commissioned officers in the Volunteers of America, Lutheran Christian day-school teachers and certain officials of the Mormon Church.

May anyone engaged in civilian work be deferred on occupational grounds?

Yes, if he is a necessary man in work essential to continuance of civilian activities, which support the war effort. These include activities which provide food, clothing, shelter, safety and other requisites of daily life.

Are farmers deferred? Yes, on the same basis as other industries, which support the war effort. Local boards are advised to consult the county war boards, which act in cooperation with the Agriculture Department, to obtain information on regional farm-labor shortages and on the importance to the war effort of the crop the farmer raises.

General Hershey has remarked, however, that he saw no reason for deferment of farmers who produced only enough for their own needs and did not contribute to the nation's food basket.

U. S. Employee Deferment

Are employees of the federal government deferred?

They may be, if the head of the agency certifies that the employee's duties are clearly related to the war effort, and that he can be replaced only with difficulty. This type of deferment, like others, is on a six-month basis.

What students are deferred? Students in approved schools for military pilots, students of meteorology, air navigation, naval architecture, chemistry and physics, advanced medical students who give promise of becoming qualified doctors, applicants for enlistment in the Navy and advanced R. O. T. C. students.

For what other persons has Selective Service recommended deferment?

Basic Is Individual

Always on an individual rather than on a group basis, it has advised boards to defer dentists, architects, druggists and veterinarians where there are local shortages; merchant seamen and officers and trainees for the merchant marine; apprentices with one year's training in war industry; some irreplaceable key men in labor relations and the motion-picture industry.

Are local boards compelled to follow the advice of national headquarters?

No. They are free agents so long as they comply with the Selective Service Act.

MOTHER SAVES 2 CHILDREN IN FIRE

Mrs. Donald Flaherty led her two sons, Donald, 8 years old, and Billy, 5, to safety last night when a fire broke out in the rear of the grocery store at 7612 Aurora Ave., which she and her husband operate.

Patrons in the Arabian Theatre, adjoining the store, were led quietly out of the theatre's exits by employees, although the fire did not actually reach the theatre.

The greatest damage was done in the Lewis hardware store, 7618 Aurora. The La Vern Beauty Salon, 7614 Aurora, also was damaged. Firemen said total damage was about \$2,000.

Mrs. Flaherty's nephew, Jack Rowley, discovered the flames after they had gained considerable headway in the alley on which all back doors of the stores and theatre open. Mrs. Flaherty awakened the children, who were sleeping on a balcony in the rear of the place, and Mrs. Flaherty led her sons to safety without panic.

Battalion Chief J. M. Kennedy said the fire started from a cigarette carelessly tossed in a refuse heap.

WORLD UNITY IS U.S. TASK--G.O.P.

CHICAGO, April 21.—(AP)—The Republican National Committee feels the United States is obliged to help bring about "an understanding, comity and cooperation" among nations of the post-war world, a stand Wendell L. Willkie characterized as an "abandonment of isolationism."

Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, however, said he thought it "a great mistake" for the committee to have expressed any policy on post-war action as it did last in Congress.

Other leaders, including Joseph W. Martin, Jr., committee chairman, and Clarence Budington Kelland, committee executive director, expressed approval of the committee's work which included a demand for relentless prosecution of an offensive war for peace with victory.

Willkie, 1940 presidential nominee, said Republicans should see to it that in the forthcoming primaries candidates who will espouse these principles are nominated.

"Thus the Republican Party can win and become a great force for liberal, enlightened government," Willkie asserted.

Responsibility Toward Peace

Taft said the committee had "drawn the teeth" of Willkie's proposed resolution advocating approval of an active role for the United States in world affairs so that no one could take exception to the language employed. Walter S. Hallahan of West Virginia, who presented Willkie's proposal to the committee, said the final resolution was a victory for Willkie.

Taft didn't expand on his "teeth-drawing" remark, but it evidently had no effect on the final resolution. The committee's final declaration there was no such phraseology as Willkie used in Point 3 of the proposed statement he submitted to the committee.

Willkie's point 3 contained the recommendation that the party resolve "to undertake now and in the future, whatever just and reasonable international responsibilities may be demanded in a modern world."

Offensive War Urged

Of the national war effort, the committee said:

"We demand the prosecution of an offensive war, relentlessly and without reservation, whatever it may cost in wealth, energy and human life, until the United States and its Allies have won a complete victory over their enemies."

Navy's Award Clears Accused Union-Thomas

DETROIT, April 21.—(AP)—R. J. Thomas, president of the United Automobile Workers, a Congress of Industrial Organizations affiliate, said today recent award of the Navy Department's "E" flag and buttons for excellent production to the National Stamping Company and its employees should clear up any reflections on their work resulting from the Genevieve Samp case.

The union head's statement was made in an open letter to the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, accusing newspapers of distorting news of the case "in a manner prejudicial to labor."

After Genevieve Samp was suspended from her local union and from her job, when fellow workers brought charges of "conduct unbecoming a union member," a congressman reported he was informed she was dismissed because fellow workers objected to her attempts to speed up production of defense materials.

Subsequently Miss Samp, in a public statement admitted she contributed to disturbances in the plant which had nothing whatever to do with increasing production.

"Charges brought by the local union were withdrawn and Miss Samp went to work in another union plant," Thomas' letter said.

The letter stated that newspapers which carried the story of the "E" awards "needed to recall that the National Stamping workers had but a few weeks previous been held up to scorn as defense saboteurs."
